IRS Expense Account Rules Spark New Fight

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has proposed another list of "do's" and "don'ts" for expense account tax deductions.

It came under fire almost before the ink was dry.

Thomas W. Power, general counsel for the National Restaurant Association, charged the new regulations would be "completely incomprehensible" to the average businessman.

The proposed rules generally allow the business executive to do a considerable amount of tax-deductible entertaining, and even bring the wife along in some situations.

However, each of these gatherings must meet certain IRS tests intended to show that the winning and dining was business-oriented.

"We believe the proposed regulations reflect a liberal view," IRS Commissioner Mortimer M. Caplin told a news conference.

Power said the big problem is that the average expense account spender will be unable to understand them.

By the time the businessman weaves his way through this labyrinth of technical mumbo jumbo he just won't know the answer," he said in an interview.

The new rules covering travel and entertainment deductions are the second set intended to implement a 1962 law.

Caplin said a series of public hearings would be held on the proposed regulations in about five weeks. The IRS then will decide whether there should be any changes before they are put into effect.

More Details Given

The first set of regulations released last year dealt with the record keeping portion of the new law. Those released Friday spell out in more detail what is deductible.

It is the entertainment portion of the expense account guidelines that has drawn most of the discussion in the past.

The new rules allow the expense account executive to deduct dinner for a potential business contact even if the two never even bring up business.

But the deduction will not be approved if they dine in an atmosphere where there are "major distractions, such as a floor show."

On the other hand, if a businessman decides to invite a client out for some "good will" entertaining after a business discussion, he can take him to a show and it will be deductible.

However, in order to get this deduction, this visit to the club must come after a "substantial and bona fide business discussion," according to the rules.

The rules also state that if the businessman's entertainment expense meets the requirements, then the expenses of his wife or his guest's wife also are deductible.

JFK Starts Vote Study

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy Saturday set up a 10-member commission to study the reasons why so many Americans fail to vote.

He asked the group, which includes politicians and professors, to report its conclusions by Nov. 30, a year in advance of the next national elections.

In the 1960 presidential election which Kennedy won, 61,833,341 persons voted out of a potential 106,482,000 of voting age. This was a percentage of 64.7.

In the 1962 congressional elections, 53.5 million voted, 49 per cent of the voting age population.

In a statement announcing his executive order setting up the study group, Kennedy said responsible Americans "are increasingly concerned with the widespread failure of our citizens to exercise their right to vote and restrictions which prevent many Americans from voting."

The commission was asked to pay particular attention to these factors:

Laws restricting registration and voting on the basis of residence, economic status or other reasons; registration procedures; absentee voting provisions; and the failure of qualified voters to cast their ballots.

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Nobel Prize Winners Slated To Address Doctor Sessions

DENVER (UPI) — More than 3,000 physicians will attend the week-long 44th annual session of the American College of Physicians here last week.

The doctors will hear reports on late developments in diagnosis and treatment of internal disease, and take part in lectures, discussions, clinics, and even color television presentations, on basic medical sciences and clinical investigations.

Two Nobel prizewinners are among the 450 physicians and scientists who will present material in the sessions Monday through Friday in Denver Municipal Auditorium.

Nobel laureate Sir Macfarlane Burnet of Melbourne, Australia, will give the annual Lilly Lecture at an opening session at 2 p.m. MST Monday.

The other Nobel prizewinner, W.F. Libby, professor of chemistry at the University of California at Los Angeles, will speak at the college's traditional convocation ceremony, in which more than 300 physicians will be inducted as fellows at 8:30 p.m. MST Thursday.

Burnet and Prof. Fritz Koller of Basel, Switzerland, will be made honorary fellows at the convocation, and two physicians will be elevated to masters of the college.

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Typhoid Makes Lively Ski Resort Ghost Town

ZERMATT, Switzerland (UPI) — An Italian waiter stepped sadly into the blizzard sweeping this mountain resort Saturday and tucked up the sign of the times over "Le Village," the town's top night club.

"Chiuso. Schluss. Cloture. closed."

For Zermatt, it was a sign of sorrow—the notification that this lively ski resort has turned itself voluntarily into a ghost town to help fight a spreading typhoid fever epidemic.

There were few left to read the sign. The frightened tourists had fled.

Hotels, cafes, bars and nightclubs closed their doors Saturday to help army medics track down the source of the disease, which has spread from Zermatt across Western Europe and into the United States.

The few remaining tourists took trains to the valley below and left the picturesque streets to the typhoid fever fighters.

Streets which only two weeks ago were packed with skiers and other vacationers were deserted except for army half-tracks, rumbling over the snow with medical supplies and blood and human waste samples from local residents and temporary hotel workers.

A blizzard blew across the village, increasing the air of desolation.

"It's not very good weather for skiing anyway," said Chamber of Commerce President Constant Cachin philosophically, surveying dreary scene.

By noon less than 100 tourists remained in Zermatt—thousands normally visit at this time of year. A few restaurants stayed open until Sunday but it seemed as though they would have nobody to serve.

A sign reading "dance all night to the Pigalle Boys" was partially obscured by a poster warning local residents they should immediately submit to tests for suspected typhoid fever.

Three persons have died and almost 400 have been hospitalized by the epidemic in the past two weeks alone—all of them either having spent a vacation here or having been in contact with someone who has.

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Walker Raps Cuba Action

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (UPI) — Former Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker said Friday night five battleships would have toppled Fidel Castro during the Cuban crisis last fall.

He said President Kennedy's behavior during the crisis "was the most encouraging thing I've ever seen."

"If you say boo, Khrushchev will run like a rabbit," Walker told a conservative rally.

Walker and evangelist Billy James Hargis drew an overflow crowd of about 1,000 persons, who paid \$1 admission to hear them.

Outside the hotel about 75 pickets, most of them college students, stood quietly in a light rain during the rally. A few carried signs. There was no trouble.

Walker and Hargis are on their "Operation: Midnight Ride," with 29 appearances scheduled in 19 states. They speak tonight at Flagstaff, Ariz.

The Albuquerque chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored Persons (NAACP) canceled announced plans to picket Walker and Hargis. No Negroes were among the pickets outside the hotel, although a few Negroes were in the audience.

Hargis spoke against the NAACP, and advised his audience to support the activities of such organizations as the John Birch society.

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18 Children Made Heirs

SALINAS, Calif. (UPI) — Eighteen children of two different parents became brothers and sisters Saturday in the largest formal adoption in California history.

The father of 10 of the children is Navy Warrant Officer Francis L. Beardsley, 47. A widower, he married Mrs. Richard North, the widow of a Navy flier who had eight of her own.

Saturday's proceedings gave all the children the name of Beardsley and made them legal heirs to both parents.

Monterey County Superior Judge Anthony Brazil said after conducting the ceremony that "This is a great day for all of you because now all the children are brothers and sisters to each other."

The youngest member of the family of 21, Joseph John, 1, was not involved as he is the offspring of Mr. and Mrs. Beardsley. The other children range upward in age to 19 years.

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
