Budget-Cutters Slash Funds For Hostesses, Veep Guard

WASHINGTON (UPI) — House budget-cutters decided today that the Secret Service will have to protect the vice president at the originally advertised cost and the Customs Bureau must get along with pretty hostesses to soothe distraught travelers.

These decisions by the House Appropriations Committee were among reductions totaling \$149.8 million in budget request of the Treasury and Post Office departments and the Executive Office of the President.

The committee approved \$5,997,026,000 for the three agencies in the year starting next July 1. It cut \$57.3 million from the Treasury request, \$91.9 million from the Post Office and \$117,000 from the Executive Office.

The total was about 2.3 per cent below the President's request but ran \$331 million more than was appropriated for the affected agencies for the current 12 months.

The cut appeared to fall short of announced Republican goals to hold most spending to this year's levels, but there was no dissenting report.

Protection For Johnson
An appropriations subcommittee headed by Rep. J. Vaughan Gary, D-Va., did not say how many of the 35 Secret Service agents requested to guard Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson had been disallowed. Secret Service Chief J. J. Rowley asked for \$322,000.

Chief U. E. Gaglianone had estimated the cost at \$100,000 and it was including enough to allow that level of protection.

The group asked that if more agents were needed "certainly the Secret Service should draw on its entire resources in order to provide whatever protection is considered to be advisable."

The Secret Service had asked for the new agents to give the vice president around-the-clock guards as authorized in a 1961 law.

As for the Customs Bureau interpreter-hostesses, the committee said it might be a good idea to have good-looking girls on hand to keep travelers' tempers calm while agents rifle through their baggage.

Too Much Luxury
But it said with the government operating in the red, even \$38,500 to hire nine hostesses was a luxury the country could forego.

However, the committee did allow the Customs Bureau 200 new jobs, including 37 positions for inspectors to watch for incoming

Communist propaganda and pornographic material.

It also made specific allowance in the Post Office appropriation for 50 new inspectors to check domestic mail for fraud, theft and obscenity.

The big Post Office budget cut was in operations. The committee cut \$68.8 million, saying programs which were supposed to be expanded and extended should be held to increases "which are absolutely essential."

The biggest employee increase, 3,776, was requested by the Internal Revenue Service. The committee cut \$32.3 million out of its budget request, telling the tax agency to get along with 1,277 new permanent and temporary tax collectors.

It was pointed out that the appraisals were made on the market value. There are 20,000 parcels of real property in Siskiyou County and seven appraisers. Also the taxpayers were told they could protest to the Board of Equalization.

In prepared literature, Taylor explained the laws governing the administration of the property tax are established on a statewide basis by the California State Legislature, pursuant to the provision of the state constitution. The law provides that the assessor deliver the assessment roll to the Board of Supervisors on or before the first Monday in July and appeals should be made before that date for consideration.

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Ratley said land 60 feet from his was appraised at \$237 an acre, while identical land belonging to him was appraised at \$2,000. In three appraisals of \$40,000, \$45,000 and \$29,445.71, by a real estate firm, state inheritance appraiser, and a bank, he finds the county appraisal of \$70,000 on the same land out of line by contrast.

Dr. Hugh Fate represented the property owners. He said the evaluation of his land went up 300 per cent and the property was taxed on improvements and land as subdivision property, which he says it is not. He also stated he would like to see the code that makes the law mandatory that taxes not be refunded and suggested an audit to ascertain why this part of the county spent three times as much in 1962 as in 1960.

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Irate Taxpayers Meet On Re-Evaluation Plan

MOUNT SHASTA—One hundred and fifty concerned and irate taxpayers met March 28 in Sisson School gym with L. D. (Babe) Taylor, Siskiyou County assessor, to try to resolve the tax re-evaluation of land in the Mount Shasta area. Accompanying Taylor were appraisers Gerald DeRose and Fred Fleck of the Yreka office. All three men joined in trying to explain the tax structure and policies to the property owners.

Dr. Donald Ratley declared every time he had his land appraised it went up, finally reaching a tax increase of 1,820 per cent from 1961. He wanted to know why unimproved land on Baker Road should be appraised at \$675 an acre, while right next to it the land cleared, fenced, and with a road was appraised at \$534. He protested that the assessment was not equitable.

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
