SF Seals Beaten By Blades

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The San Francisco Seals' 8-2 loss to the Los Angeles Blades in their opening playoff game Monday night was "our worst game of the year," said San Francisco coach Bud Poile.

By Poile, it was one of Los Angeles' best showings against the Seals, who racked up a 10-5-1 record against the Blades during the regular Western Hockey League season. The second game of their best-of-three series will be played in San Francisco's Cow Palace, as will a third game, if necessary.

Blades player-coach Jack Bonass said after the victory that he got "100 per cent effort from everyone on the team." Twelve of the 14 Blades who took to the ice were credited with either a goal or an assist.

Seven Blades scored goals, Harold White getting two plus one assist. Los Angeles struck for three in the first period and added three more in the second and two in the third.

The Blades' Stan Maxwell was slashed by Orland Kurtenbach in the third period and taken to Memorial Hospital in Culver City with tendon and possible nerve injuries in the right leg.

As for Wednesday night's game in San Francisco, Bonass said, "It'll be a tough game in the small Cow Palace rink. They will be out to get us in the first period."

Poile said the Blades "got a couple of breaks and (goalie Jack) McCartan made a few key stops. We did miss our all-star defenseman Maurice Mantha."

Rice and Burnett tied for fourth in the open 100-yard dash. Burnett also turned in a fine 32 flat 440-yard dash.

Giants Break Slump, Losing Indians

Juan Marichal and Tom Haller, batterymates who played important roles in the San Francisco Giants' drive to the 1962 National League pennant, have boosted Al Dark's team back into the victory column, and it's a shame the Giant manager wasn't around to see it.

Dark was traveling to New York Monday to receive a sportsmanship award when the Giants broke a six-game losing streak with a 4-3 victory over the Cleveland Indians at Santa Barbara, Calif. The Giants scored all their runs in the fourth inning, climaxed by Haller's two-run homer.

Dark's eyes would have sparkled at the performance of the high-kicking Marichal, who turned in disappointing efforts in two previous spring training appearances. Marichal, an 18-game winner last season, allowed only two hits and one run in six innings and struck out nine Indians.

Three Hits For Mays
The Giants collected only six hits — three of them by Willie Mays, who led off the fourth in a single. Then Orlando Cepeda doubled, Felipe Alou tripled and Haller homered off Joe Schaffernoth.

Billy Pierce came on in the seventh inning and gave up a two-run homer to rookie Bob Lipiski of the Indians.

Veteran pitchers Robin Roberts and Bob Friend showed they're in mid-season form by firing four-hitters Monday. Although not going the full route, Joey Jay, Bill Stafford and Bob Shaw all turned in strong pitching performances.

Roberts, who hardly threw a ball in spring training last season before being cut by the New York Yankees, pitched the Baltimore Orioles to a 6-1 victory over the Los Angeles Dodgers. The Orioles rapped out 11 hits, including Brooks Robinson's two-run homer.

Pirates Blank Twins
The Pittsburgh Pirates beat the Minnesota Twins, 3-0, as Friend scattered four singles and faced only 30 batters. Donn Clendenon's two-run homer and Roberto Clemente's steal of home provided the Pittsburgh runs.

In other games, home runs by Roger Maris and Joe Pepitone earned the Yankees a 3-2 triumph over the Detroit Tigers; the Cincinnati Reds handed the Kansas City Athletics their sixth straight loss, 4-1; the Washington Senators scored twice in the 10th inning to down the Milwaukee Braves, 4-2; the Los Angeles Angels defeated the Houston Colts, 5-1.

Belinsky To Marry Van Doren

Sanders To Give Details

ATLANTA (UPI) — Gov. Carl E. Sanders said he would make public today the details of a state investigation into an accusation that former Georgia Athletic Director Wallace Butts and Alabama Coach Paul Bryant conspired to rig a football game last fall.

Sanders received a final report on the investigation Monday night from state Atty. Gen. Eugene Cook, but he refused to release its contents until his news conference today.

The news conference is scheduled for 1:45 p.m., EST.

"I don't think a midnight news conference would be a good thing," Sanders told newsmen who sought details of the investigation Monday night. "That might look clandestine and we don't want that."

To Aide Comment

A Sanders aide said the governor, who conferred briefly with Cook by telephone Monday night, definitely would have some comment on the investigation at his news conference.

Cook said over the weekend that the investigation report will show that Butts, who resigned his university post last February, passed "vital information" to Bryant just before the 1962 game in which Alabama beat Georgia, 35-0.

Both Butts and Bryant have denied the accusation contained in a recent issue of the Saturday Evening Post and Butts has filed a \$10 million libel suit against the magazine.

Give Secret Testimony

The Post article said Atlanta insurance man George Burnett overheard Butts give Bryant Georgia team secrets during a long distance telephone conversation eight days before the game.

Five Alabama football players gave secret testimony Monday at Montgomery, Ala., to a legislative committee investigating the Post allegation. The group included All-America linebacker Lee Roy Jordan, guards Jimmy Sharpe and Jimmy Wilson and ends Richard Williamson and Bill Battle.

Committee Vice Chairman J. T. McDow said Bernie Moore, commissioner of the Southeastern Conference, would appear Thursday. Moore has been making his own investigation, and the U.S. Senate Rackets subcommittee also is looking into the accusation to determine if federal gambling laws were violated.

Palmer Favored To Win Fourth Masters' Title

AUGUSTA, Ga. (UPI) — Kingpin Arnold Palmer bemoaned his misbehaving driver today but drew no sympathy from fellow pros who feel he can win his fourth Masters golf title even by using a brassie off the tee.

Palmer, of course, will stay with his driver when the first round shooting starts Thursday over the Masters' lush 8,900-yard layout and he'll be trying not only to become the first four-time winner here but also the first player ever to win titles back-to-back.

The remainder of the lineup probably will be the same as Saturday. Dave Johnson will catch, John Gray at first, Larry Guyer at second, Mike Kitching at shortstop, John Parisotto at third, Larry Binney in left field, Larry Smith in center and Tom Osa in right.

The Pelicans banged out 20 hits in the two games Saturday with Osa, Kitching, Binney, Guyer and Jackson leading the parade. There were eight extra base hits in the two contests while Ashland went hitless. Jackson also turned in a fine performance at the plate in addition to pitching a no-hitter. He had a triple and single in three trips for an RBI.

Rams Set Game In Portland

PORTLAND (UPI) — The Los Angeles Rams, who signed Terry Baker of Oregon State last week, will play an exhibition professional football game here Aug. 24, it was announced today.

The Rams will meet the Dallas Cowboys.

Promoter Harry Glickman of Oregon Sports Attractions also announced the San Francisco 49ers would meet the Minnesota Vikings here on Aug. 10 in another exhibition. Both will be night games, starting at 8:30 p.m.

Glickman said he had assurance from the Rams that Baker would be in action against Dallas, which has another ex-Oregon State great on its team — Sam Baker.

Palmer Favored To Win Fourth Masters' Title

"I wish my driving would be a little better," he claimed after spraying a few during Monday's practice round. "I've got a couple of days to work on it, anyway."

Peeling his glove off, the perspiring Palmer then headed for the barber to get a haircut, and most of the other competitors in the probable field of 82 believe that's all he needs to win his fourth Masters in the last six years.

Art Wall, one of the two men to break Palmer's monopoly since

1958, claims Arnie has to be the "natural favorite" any time he sets foot on this course.

"I'd have to say Palmer feels as much at home on this course as he does on his own," Wall said, putting on his golf shoes before starting his own practice round.

"You have to reckon his chances as being excellent. But I'd also say keep an eye on Julius Boros. I think he has the best opportunity among the so-called outsiders."

Wall, winner of the 1959 Masters, even thinks he has an outside chance himself.

"You never can tell who'll get hot and come on to win this one although it's extremely unlikely that a fellow playing here for the first time will do it," he said.

"There's a great deal to be learned about this course and it takes a while to do it," said Wall, who fired five birdies over the last six holes to beat runnerup Cary Middlecoff by one stroke in 1959.

Outside of Wall, the only other player besides Palmer to win the Masters in the past six years was South African Gary Player, who became the only foreigner in history ever to take home the title in 1961.

Player wound up in a three-way playoff for the crown last year, shooting a one-under-par 68 to finish second to Palmer's 71. Dow Finsterwald, the third man in the playoff, faded badly with a 77.

Palmer is only one of three men ever to win the Masters three times, having walked off with the traditional emerald green jacket in 1958 and 1960 as well as last year. The two other three-time winners are Sammy Snead and Jimmy Demaret, both of whom are competing again this time.

Snead, who will be 52 in May and is bothered by a spur on his left foot, finished a surprisingly strong second to young Dan Sikes in the recent Doral Open at Miami while the 52-year-old Demaret plays in only a half-dozen tournaments a year.
