

Windy City Mayor Tops Republican

CHICAGO (UPI)—Mayor Richard J. Daley remained one of the most powerful Democrats in the nation today despite his smaller-than-expected win over Republican challenger Benjamin S. Adamowski.

Daley won his third six-year term Tuesday but saw his victory margin drop from 466,672 votes last time to about 150,000. The Republicans and independents boosted their representation on the 50-member city council to 10.

Some political observers said the strong showing would make Adamowski, previously best known for his charges of Cook County vote fraud in the 1960 presidential election, a possible candidate for governor next year. Adamowski, in admitting defeat, said he was "pleased and proud" at his showing.

"Here was this great machine that was going to annihilate me with 500,000 votes," he said, "and it came squeaking up to the finish line and barely made it."

He said he believed he would have won "if more people who call themselves Republicans had voted."

A combination of protests over taxes and a recent rash of gangland-style crime in Chicago were seen as factors in Adamowski's good showing — or Daley's poor showing, whichever you prefer.

Kennedy Plans Western Visit

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy will visit Colorado Springs, Colo., Ft. Bliss, Tex., White Sands, N.M., and San Diego on a tour of western military installations in June.

The White House announced Tuesday the President would attend graduation ceremonies at the Air Force Academy at Colorado Springs June 5, go to Ft. Bliss that night, visit White Sands June 6, and then fly to San Diego to witness naval maneuvers off the coast.

Congress Starts Drive For New Paper Dollar

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Take a good look at the \$1 bill in your wallet. Within three or four years it may be hard to find one that looks like it.

With strong bipartisan support, a drive started in Congress Tuesday to give the government authority to put into circulation a new type of \$1 bill. The main purpose: to avert danger that the Treasury by 1965 will exhaust its supply of silver for coinage.

The \$1 bills now in circulation are backed 100 per cent by silver. They are called "silver certificates." The new ones would be backed with a 25 per cent gold reserve. They would be called "federal reserve notes."

They would look much different, too. If the pending legislation is enacted, the \$1 bill will undergo its first big change in appearance since it was reduced to handy wallet size in 1929.

The design would be changed to make the new bills easily distinguished from the old. The government has not started working on a new design yet, but the size and color probably will be kept the same.

Entertainer Stirs Negro Vote Rally

GREENWOOD, Miss. (UPI)—Comedian Dick Gregory told a Negro rally Tuesday night that the Kennedys would send missiles rather than troops if they had to live the lives of Mississippi Negroes.

Gregory made the remark at a rally at Clarksdale, about 50 miles northwest of Greenwood, after he was manhandled here Tuesday by police who broke up Negro voter registration demonstrations.

"If Bobby Kennedy or any of his family came down here painted black, they wouldn't send troops but missiles," the Chicago Negro comedian said.

"Police here are a little lower than dogs," he told the Clarksdale gathering.

Gregory planned to return here today but there was no indication whether there would be any new demonstrations.

A policeman grabbed Gregory in one of a series of voter demonstration incidents Tuesday, twisted his arm behind him and marched him across the street when the comedian refused a command to move on.

Gregory said another policeman struck him in the back as he was being hustled away but did not injure him.

The entertainer came here to lend moral support to week-long voter registration demonstrations which have been broken up by police holding police dogs on leashes and by barricades.

Economy Run Cars Avoid Storm Front

OMAHA, Neb. (UPI) — The 36 cars in the Los Angeles-Detroit Mobil Economy Run moved across Nebraska today one jump ahead of a massive storm front and punished by gale winds.

Les Viland's Rambler American continued to lead the pack with a 29.26 miles per gallon average. Mary Hauser and her Chevy II was about one-half mile per gallon behind Viland in the cumulative totals up to North Platte, Neb. She averaged 28.71 for the 1,837 miles covered so far.

Mrs. Pat Sawyer, Hemet, Calif., gained on both Viland and Miss Hauser today, with a 28.21 average. Mrs. Sawyer got off to a bad start on the first day due to a disconnected vacuum line on her Corvair Monza, but she has made gains on the leaders since leaving Las Vegas.

The tightest contest was in the medium engine compact class where Bill Levy's Ford Falcon was one one-hundredth of a mile per gallon ahead of Bob Checkley, driving a Valiant Six.

Thursday the cars leave Omaha at 4:30 a.m. for the 500-mile length to Chicago, and will be on the road for 12 hours and nine minutes, attempting to average more than 41 miles per hour.

The 2,634-mile contest will end in Detroit Thursday.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Richard Burton's wife flew into the city Tuesday night, leaving her husband behind in London with Liz Taylor and announcing a mutual agreement to separate.

Notice of the separation between Burton and his wife, Sybil, was released by Mrs. Burton's lawyer, Aaron R. Frosch, shortly after Mrs. Burton flew here from Europe with the couple's two daughters.

Frosch's statement said that all financial and other arrangements between the couple had been concluded but that "divorce has not been considered or discussed."

There was some confusion as to the purpose of Mrs. Burton's visit here.

Frosch's announcement said she had arrived in New York "to visit Philip Burton, Richard Burton's father," for the Easter holidays. However, Burton was born Richard Jenkins in Pontrhydyfen, South Wales, the son of a Welsh coal miner.

Amended Mass Transit Bill Gets Labor Leader Support

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Labor leaders may have given the Kennedy administration's \$500 million mass transit bill the boost needed for passage in the Senate today.

Administration leaders predicted the bill to aid bus and rail facilities in urban areas would pass, but said it would be by a narrow margin.

AFL-CIO leaders Tuesday night ended their opposition to the measure after an amendment was attached to the bill which would protect transit unions if private transportation systems are taken over by municipalities.

The bill is the first major New Frontier proposal to come to a showdown in the new session and administration leaders worked hard at gathering enough votes to pass it.

The legislation would provide federal grants up to \$500 million over a three-year period to cities to help build transit systems that would move people in and out of town rapidly and reduce traffic congestion.

Most Republicans were opposed to the bill but Sen. Jacob Javits, R-N.Y., said he would vote for it, as did several other big-city Republicans. Javits said the urban transportation problem had become so severe it was time the federal government stepped in with aid.

Other congressional news:
BUDGET: Republican budget-cutters laughed off a Democratic attempt to label them as America-lasters. They promised to increase their economy drive despite the charge "we're putting America first, last and always, because we are terribly afraid about this unconscionable budget."

Rep. Ben F. Jensen, R-Iowa, said, Democrats said Republican cuts would cripple the home front, imperil defense and throw the space race uncontested to Russia.

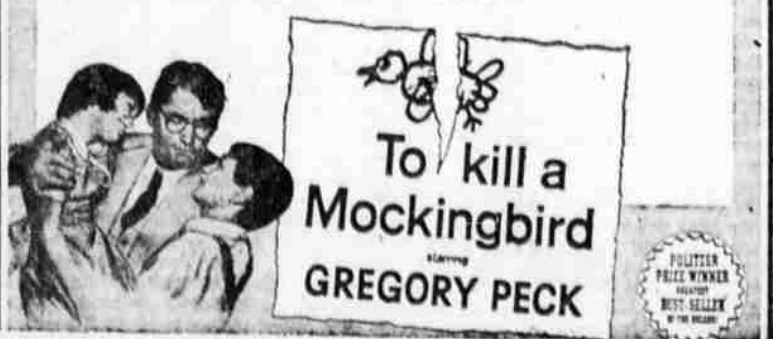
