WALL STREET CHATTER

NEW YORK (UPI) — From a technical standpoint, Richard T. Leahy of J. W. Sparks & Co. believes the market continues to act in creditable fashion.

He noted that advances, for the most part, are accomplished on increased volume while declines show on periods of restricted turnover. "In this connection," Leahy said, "it is my belief that the generally apathetic attitude currently prevalent toward the list may soon be resolved by an important upside breakout which might well carry the industrial index to new recovery highs."

Standard & Poor's says a further period of backing and filling is possible before a really decisive market move occurs. New commitments in situations offering sound investment value may be made on significant reactions.

Moody's Stock Survey notes that current favorable economic news has brought some strength to stock prices. However, it regards such movement as interim in nature and not suggestive of any major upturn.

United Business Service says that from the recent good behavior of the market it would appear that the period of consolidation and reaction may have been substantially completed.

Pentagon Halts News Story Probe

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara today called an abrupt halt to the latest investigation into the source

es of a news story concerning the TFX fighter plane controversy.

A brief Pentagon announcement said the investigation will be concluded today. A spokesman added that no lie detector tests have been or will be given to top civilian Pentagon officials questioned in the matter.

Deputy Defense Secretary Roswell L. Gilpatrick and the secretaries of the Air Force and Navy, among others, had signed statements agreeing to take such tests if they were considered necessary.

The inquiry, headed by Lt. Gen. W.H. Blanchard, Air Force inspector general, concerned a March 21 story in the Washington Evening Star saying that Air Force personnel had been subjected to "oral abuse" by representatives of the McClellan Senate investigating subcommittee.

The subcommittee is investigating why the contract for the TFX two-service fighter plane went to General Dynamics instead of the Boeing Co., which had the backing of most top uniformed defense officials.

The Pentagon announcement said: "The Air Force announced today that the inspector general of the Air Force intends to conclude today his current investigations of the unauthorized release of an Air Force document" which was the source of the story.

Asked how the investigation was being conducted, the spokesman said the inspector general is "assembling and evaluating" the material he has collected, including sworn statements from dozens of persons who might have handled the document.

The spokesman said the investigation was undertaken because

the McClellan committee was concerned about the source of the "leak." The extraordinary suggestions of lie detector tests caused reverberations throughout the Pentagon.

Through Tuesday, Blanchard's organization had questioned 60 persons in the Air Force, 41 in the office of secretary of defense, and 20 in the Navy. Some were amused. Not a few were indignant at being asked whether they were willing to be harnessed to a polygraph.

The irony of it was that the Defense Department acknowledged the leaked story had no secrecy classification. An official said today not even "real security leaks" had had such investigating.

Law Dean Differs With State Bar On Sections Of New Constitution

SALEM (UPI) — The dean of the University of Oregon law school differed with the State Bar here Tuesday on two key sections of the judicial article of a proposed new constitution.

One of the sections would give the State Supreme Court the power to make the rules of procedure for the state court system, subject to legislative review.

The other would have state court judges appointed by the governor. After two years, and then every six years, a judge would "run on his record," giving voters a chance to remove him if they wanted.

The State Bar is unhappy with both articles.
