Flights Up At Airport

A sharp increase in flight operations at the Klamath Falls Airport has been recorded by City Airport Manager Joe Sawyer, who released figures on increased use of the facilities Tuesday.

Overall flight operations for the first three months of 1963 are up 4,771 flight operations, from 13,173 in 1962 to 17,944 during January, February and March of this year.

Air carrier operations increased 32; itinerant military, 787; itinerant civilian, 1,093; local military, 792; and local civilian 2,677.

The high increase in civilian flights was due in part to excellent flying weather during January.

Dunsmuir Delays Okay Of Interchange Plans

DUNSMUIR — Approval of a Highway 99 interchange plan between Dunsmuir and North Dunsmuir will be delayed two months or more, the Dunsmuir City Council decided Monday night.

The city planning commission is currently working on a city master plan with the help of James Campbell, planning consultant, and the council wishes to compare the community values as presented in the master plan with effects of the proposed interchange. The master plan will not be ready for presentation for about 60 days, the council learned.

Challenged on the council decision by Willard Hanlen, motel and grocery store owner, Mayor David Anderson said, "We're not going to be stampeded into anything."

He said in the two weeks since the presentation of the interchange by the division of highways, the city has obtained a number of concessions favorable to the city.

Herbert Miles, Redding, division engineer for the state division of highways, said his office did need to know if the Park Avenue phase of the plan was acceptable. He was told by the council to see if a slight jog in the street could save the restaurant and filling station now slated for removal.

Miles said the request for an offramp at the northern end of Siskiyou Avenue signed by over 300 petitioners could not be considered as it does not conform to interstate freeway standards. He said the unstable slope on the west side of the interchange will remain the problem of the state and not turned over to the city at the completion of the project.

Disaster Areas Designated

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Two Oregon counties, Lake and Malheur, were designated by Agriculture Secretary Orville Freeman today as disaster areas eligible to receive emergency aid as a result of flooding in January and February.

Sen. Maurine Neuberger, D-Ore., said an emergency fund of \$147,000 had been allocated to the Oregon Agriculture, Stabilization and Conservation Committee to share costs of restoration measures with farmers.

Loss In Timber Revenues Predicted From Appropriations Committee Move

A precedent established last week by the House Appropriations Committee may result in the loss of more than one-half million dollars annually in timber revenues to Klamath County and 17 other Oregon counties, according to reports from the nation's capital.

The move involves revenues received by the Oregon counties from the O & C Act of 1937, which stipulates that money collected from timber sales on lands once owned by a private railroad and since returned to federal ownership be included on county tax rolls.

Under the statute, the counties receive 75 per cent of the revenues while 25 per cent goes to the U.S. Treasury. This year there has been criticism that the counties have been receiving too large a share of the timber revenues, resulting in the suggestion that the formula "should be changed."

The appropriations committee has no power to alter the formula, but it did specify that hereafter management work and other related tasks involving timber sales on O & C lands be financed from the counties' share of the special revenues.

Under the new regulation, the counties would pick up the tab for O & C management costs which had formerly been incurred by the Bureau of Land Management. In past years, the counties have permitted BLM to deduct 25 per cent, or a third of their entitlement, to finance timber access roads. But this year the counties' financial responsibility has been extended to include administrative work.

The change would not affect the counties this year because BLM has received an extra \$1.3 million for O & C access roads work from the accelerated public works program.

The additional funds were allocated at a propitious time, since the House Appropriations Committee had lopped off \$540,000 from the BLM budget request for forestry management work and

directed that it come out of the counties' money.

The committee approved \$8.8 million for forestry—a \$540,000 cut in the budget but a \$322,500 increase over last year. All told the committee reduced BLM's budget request by nearly \$3 million and slashed the forest service budget request by about \$7 million.

During fiscal year 1962, the counties divided more than \$13 million of the O & C pie, of which \$368,063.24 went to Klamath County. The county's portion was \$388,589.03 in 1960-61 and \$332,810.04 for the previous year.

The 18 counties are Benton, Clackamas, Columbia, Curry, Klamath, Coos, Douglas, Jackson, Lane, Josephine, Lincoln, Linn, Marion, Polk, Multnomah, Tillamook, Washington and Yamhill.
