WALL STREET CHATTER

NEW YORK (UPI) — Kenneth Ward of Hayden, Stone & Co. advises investors to take a new look at a large number of stocks that are displaying renewed strength after a prolonged period of price weakness.

Ward suggested switching out of some stocks that appear to have run up too high, at least temporarily. But he advised against any general selling. Additional purchases made "carefully and discriminately" during periods of minor price changes "should prove timely and profitable."

Bache & Co. advises taking advantage of temporary low prices to buy oils, autos, trucks and savings and loan shares. It regards the stock market as basically strong.

In its stock market forecast, Ernst Associates, Inc., says the market has now reached a critical stage. The expected second challenge of 600-700 in the Dow-Jones industrial is under way. "The challenge should be unsuccessful, but the technical indicators are currently mixed. Although we do not look for 700 to be cleared on this run, traders and investors should remain flexible since the issue will be determined shortly," Ernst said.

Colby & Co., Inc., says that barring only international uncertainties there are enough plus factors in the domestic economy to make business gains of last year look puny by comparison—a condition that justifies the purchase of good common stocks.

Science Fair Scheduled At Ferguson

A County Science Fair for students in fourth, fifth and sixth grade science classes will be held at the Ferguson Elementary School April 17, 18 and 19.

The purpose of the fair is to encourage independent study and development of the research method and to recognize and encourage scientific potential in young students.

Individual elementary schools have been holding their own fairs in the past weeks and have been choosing individual gold and silver medal winners for competition in the county fair.

The youngsters work on special projects in scientific areas they haven't explored before. One of the requirements is that the students work independently with no help from parents or teachers. Work on the projects started about three months ago.

Winners of the county fair will go to Portland and enter their projects in the state contest at the Oregon Museum of Science for Industry.

Each youth at Portland will be representing about 1,000 of their fellow students back in their home city. Winners in Portland will receive the OMSI trophy and get a chance to compete nationally. Competitors at Portland will be representing several states in the Northwest.

A Portland business firm donates most of the trophies, but local students are hoping to get local industry to sponsor them. It would cost a local firm \$8.50 (the cost of a trophy) to sponsor a local winner.

Interested industries can contact Ingrid Miller or Malcomb East at Ferguson School. An open house will be held the last day of the county fair and everyone will be invited to view the winning projects.

Man Arrested In Salem On Contributing Charge

Ellis Ray Roach, 27, 2107 Modoc Street, was taken into custody from Salem police by Deputy Lee Saunders Wednesday and has been returned here to answer charges for contributing to the delinquency of a minor and also for sharing assistance with the recipient of welfare aid, the sheriff's office has reported.

Roach was arraigned in district court on the latter charge following his return here and will appear in court 3 p.m. Friday to enter a plea. The court also continued Roach's arraignment on the contributing charge pending the appointment of an attorney to represent the defendant.

The district attorney's office had been under investigation for several months on the misdemeanor charge. As a result of that investigation, incidents were revealed which led to Roach being charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor, the district attorney's office said. The child was the daughter of the woman from whom he is alleged to have received welfare assistance.

Deputy Saunders took Roach into custody after transferring Leonard Mackey, 37, from the county jail to the Oregon State Penitentiary.

Mackey had been taken to the penitentiary March 18 to begin serving a seven-year term for forgery, but was later returned here to be present when his attorney made a motion for a new trial. The motion was denied by Judge David R. Vansenberg at a hearing and Mackey was returned to the penitentiary.

Lost Card Trips Trio In Burglary

A student body card left at the scene of a burglary led sheriff's deputies to three youths who burglarized the cabin of Royce Brown, Bonanza, and escaped with firearms, musical instruments and other property valued at more than \$900, the sheriff's office disclosed Thursday.

Deputies Lou Bogart and Bob Hartley traced the youths, including a 13-year-old and two 14-year-olds, through the school card that one of the juveniles dropped in the dining room of the house at the time of the burglary.

One of the youths, all of Bonanza, is in the custody of juvenile authorities and the other two are expected to be taken to the juvenile home sometime Thursday, Deputy Bogart said.

All of the loot, including two rifles, two pistols, three guitars, binoculars, cameras, and miscellaneous items have been recovered, the deputies reported.

Bogart said the juveniles entered Brown's house through a 12x14-inch window pane about noon Friday, March 29, and carried off the loot to some cliffs on Short Lake Road, about three-quarters of a mile north of Bonanza, where they cached it.

The boys then returned to their homes, intending to return to the cache later. Several days later, Brown returned to the cabin from Canyonville, where he had spent several days, and discovered the dwelling had been ransacked.

The 16-year-old is a ward of the MacLaren School for Boys, Salem, and had been residing in a foster home elsewhere in the state before coming here recently to visit his parents.

Tach Stolen

Norman Johns, 21, OTI student, has reported the theft of a tachometer from his automobile while it was parked on the campus sometime Tuesday night or Wednesday morning, the Oregon State Police have reported. A student in the auto-diesel division of the college, Johns valued the instrument at \$25.

Police are investigating.

Registration for driver education sessions at Klamath Union High School will be held Monday, April 8, in Room 241N at KU. A \$5 deposit is necessary at registration.
