Like Sarah Bernhardt, he's still going strong but plans to slow down a little. The former tobacco auctioneer from Washington, D.C., is said to have an unlimited fund of funny stories which he deals out at the rate of one every 60 seconds. He holds the degree of D.L. (Doctor of Laughter).

His listeners get only a breath to recover from one laugh before starting another. His reputation, of national dimensions, is second only to that of the immortal Will Rogers.

Harding, laugh master of America, says, "I don't know how many more years I can keep going, but there's nothing gives me more pleasure than to help others have some too."

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Help Sought For Harvest

People in Klamath County who are seeking jobs and housing in strawberry and bean harvests in the Willamette Valley this summer may receive advance help from a representative of the Hillsboro Oregon State Employment Service Office, according to the local state employment office.

The representative will be at the Klamath Falls employment office, 242 Main Street, 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., Wednesday, April 10, to recruit family groups for strawberry picking and for later work in the Willamette Valley bean harvest this coming summer.

The employment service recommends this pre-season job-arrangement program since it helps those wanting these jobs to go directly to work in the valley when the season arrives. The local office will be in contact with the Hillsboro office as the season approaches and will advise picker groups of the exact date they are to report.

Workers can then be directed to jobs and to inspected, approved, free housing when required. One adult must accompany each group of persons going to these jobs.

People who desire work in these harvests may obtain steadier work and save time and money by making advance arrangements while the recruiter is here. The strawberry harvest usually begins early in June and continues about a month, while the bean harvest follows about July 20 and continues for six to eight weeks.

Tax Plans Considered

SALEM (UPI)—The House Tax Committee decided Thursday night against taxing incomes from the first dollar.

The committee indicated it will set a floor in the state income tax bill it is drafting.

The committee is considering a bill with a combined tax system: The graduated tax, plus a small flat tax to pick up low bracket earners.

House Speaker Clarence Barton suggested exempting the first \$1,000 of income from the flat tax. The committee did not make any final decision on where the floor will be set. It did, however, decide against an alternate plan for a filing fee instead of a flat tax.

The committee plans to continue work on its income tax bill Saturday.
