New Air Force Chaplain Begins Assignment At Kingsley Chapel

Following a tour of duty in Turkey and a whirlwind visit with relatives and friends, Chaplain and Mrs. William A. Thoresen and son arrived in Klamath Falls on March 11 to make their home at 812 Westbrook Drive.

Chaplain Thoresen, who holds the rank of captain, has been assigned as chaplain for Kingsley Field, replacing Chaplain Jefferson E. Davis Jr. The Davis family was scheduled to leave April 5 for a new Air Force assignment in Crete.

A native of Chicago, Ill., and a pastor of the Lutheran Church of America, Chaplain Thoresen entered military service in 1943, serving as a chaplain's assistant at Sheppard Field, Tex. Returning to civilian life, he earned a bachelor of arts degree from Luther College in Decorah, Iowa, and a bachelor of divinity degree from the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Gettysburg, Pa.

The 43-year-old captain entered the Air Force Chaplaincy in 1953, served a tour with the Strategic

Air Command, then returned to parishes in Chicago and Macomb, Ill. He was recalled to active duty in 1959 and stationed at Wright Patterson Air Force Base in Ohio before going to Turkey for two and a half years.

Chaplain Thoresen met the former Alice Ottensmeyer of Brookings, S. D., in Chicago in the early 1950s. At that time he was a seminary student and editor of the National Student Lutheran magazine, and she was working with the National Student Lutheran movement. They were married in her home town of Brookings in 1959.

The couple and their son, Stephen, 20 months, have been busy for the past month meeting base personnel and establishing themselves in the community. With the arrival of their furniture this week, they are finally getting comfortably settled in their new home.

Captain and Mrs. Thoresen will be affiliated with Hope Lutheran Church, a member of the LCA Synod, and will be received into membership this Sunday.

Besides his chaplain's duties at Kingsley Field, Chaplain Thoresen will also assist in the religious activities of two radar squadrons located at Red Bluff and Klamath, Calif.

Klamath Basin Churches Observe Holy Week With Special Services

Special services and choral programs have been planned by several Klamath Basin churches to observe Palm Sunday, April 7; Maundy Thursday, April 11, and Good Friday, April 12.

Palm Sunday, the Sunday preceding Easter, commemorates in Christian churches the entry of Christ into Jerusalem when people strewed palm branches before Him. The Thursday of Passion Week, Maundy Thursday, is sacred as commemorating the act of Christ in washing His Apostles' feet on the occasion of the last supper. Good Friday, the last Friday in Lent, is observed in commemoration of the crucifixion of Christ.

ZION LUTHERAN CHURCH
Rev. Norbert E. Dey has announced the 11 a.m. Palm Sunday sermon text at Zion Lutheran Church will be "Why the Crowd?" The Holy Communion will be celebrated during the service, and the Girls' Choir will sing the Palm Sunday hymn, "Ride On, Ride On, in Majesty," under the direction of Mrs. Herman Wolf. Mrs. Robert Dunlap will accompany at the organ.

Holy Week services will include the Maundy Thursday Communion service at 7:30 p.m. "The Last Supper" will be the sermon text.

"The Burial" will be the theme of the Good Friday Tenebrae Service at 7:30 p.m. The Service of Darkness, an ancient traditional service of meditation on the suffering and death of Christ, will be observed.

As Old Testament prophecies and their fulfillment in the passion of Christ are read, candles will be extinguished to symbolize the darkness of spirit and intense sufferings of Christ. Hymns appropriate to the readings will be sung, and as the service ends, the church will be in complete darkness and meditation.

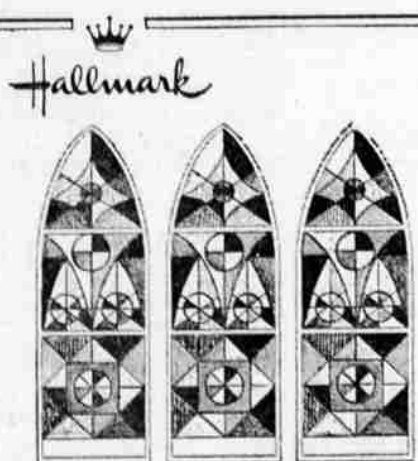
