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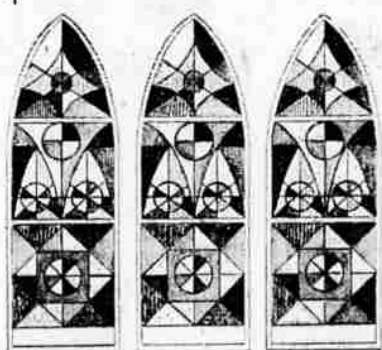


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## Light And Airy Shoes Step Into Spring

Light, airy and understated, the natural look is afoot for spring in many styles and silhouettes. The natural—or feminine—look means pumps, flats, walkers, slingbacks in easy, fluid lines. It calls for sun-drenched colors, in single and multi-color effects. It is interpreted in smooth and suede leathers, grained and brushed leathers, waxy and patent leathers—all made into foot-flattering shoes. Opened-up effect or closed-toe, open-back or open-side shoes are part of the new spring look at ground level. Large porches on vamp or sides, slim slingback straps or large vents are popular variations of the open effect, as are woven leathers, perforations, embroidered designs on vamp and toe.

Big girls take to little girls' styles in a huge variety of strap shoes — asymmetric straps, T-straps that connect at all points of the shoe, and wide sabot straps.

Casual footwear, led by moccasin flats and moccasin-front walking shoes, appear in every type of leather. Brushed leather, in flats and occasionally in boot shoes, is a new casual favorite. In keeping with the trend to lighter shoes, these casuals are made in brushed split leather. The leather has literally been split—thinned down—to lighten the shoe and add greater flexibility while retaining durability.

Toes and heels hold few surprises. Rounded toe is seen chiefly on casual and walking shoes, pointed toe on daytime and evening shoes, square toe in late-day and suit shoes. Heels tend to be lower, except for more formal occasions and costumes.

Warm blues, strawberries and greens and a wide variety of neutrals make color news. Joining bone and white among dressy neutrals are mushroom, oatmeal and sage green.



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
