Negro Comedian Claims Deals Made For Release

GREENWOOD, Miss. (UPI)—Negro comedian Dick Gregory charged Thursday night that the Justice Department had made a deal with Mississippi authorities in releasing eight "ring leaders" in voter registration marches.

"The Justice Department has made deals with these people and they're still making deals with them," Gregory told a nighttime rally of 400 Negroes.

He referred to action Thursday in which Federal Judge Claude Clayton postponed until fall a suit brought by the Justice Department asking for an injunction barring interference with voter registration.

Both Reach Agreement

Clayton acted after an agreement was reached between attorneys for the government and the city of Greenwood. The government agreed to drop its request for an immediate temporary restraining order and the city agreed to free temporarily the eight Negroes arrested during a march last week.

Justice Department attorney John Doar indicated the agreement was reached because the government needed more time to prepare its case. The hearing was at Greenville, Miss., about 50 miles from Greenwood.

Gregory, who appeared tired and shaken after nearly a week of voter registration march leadership, told the rally that the Kennedy administration isn't "worried about you because you don't vote."

Vows to Remain

The Chicago comedian had vowed to stay in Greenwood until the federal government sends in troops to counteract what he has described as police brutality and general discrimination against Negroes.

One of the many day-by-day activities of the chamber of commerce is the compiling of statistical information about Klamath Falls and Klamath County. All of this data is held on file for whatever use anyone cares to make of it; some of it is relayed each month to all chamber members in the publication, "Klamath Keynotes," as requested, or where its use is indicated, it is forwarded to industrial prospects, research organizations and governmental bodies.

Because of the current rash of talk to the effect that Klamath Falls is rapidly becoming a ghost town, a few facts might be in order to help put an end to such irresponsible and unfounded conversation.

While it is true that Klamath Falls has suffered a net loss of 45 persons, or 0.3 per cent, since the federal census was completed in 1960, Klamath County, according to the Oregon State Board of Census, has gained 3.4 per cent. Most of these additional 2,621 inhabitants live in the metropolitan Klamath Falls area or in the Klamath Basin.

The income from agriculture, Klamath County's leading industry, is up nearly 10 per cent over last year to approximately 38

FBI Grabs Attorney

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—The FBI held a Seattle attorney and a woman here Friday in connection with the interstate flight of Richard James Young, 36, suspected of robberies in Portland, Ore., and Kirkland, Wash.

The attorney, Ned E. Hett, 28, was placed under \$10,000 bond and ordered to appear in U.S. District Court for an extradition hearing on charges of accessory after the fact in the flight of Young.

The woman is Young's wife, Judith, 24, who was being held as a material witness and also under \$10,000 bond. She was to be returned to Seattle Friday.

Young, listed today among the 10 "most wanted men" in the country by the FBI, is wanted in connection with the \$53,000 robbery of the U.S. National Bank of Portland, Eastport Plaza Branch, on Jan. 24, this year, and for the \$2,200 holdup of a grocery store at Kirkland, Wash., last year.

Hett and Mrs. Young were arrested Thursday while driving a car purchased by Young in Santa Monica, Calif.

Utility Bill Faces Knife

SALEM (UPI)—A bill to repeal the 1961 utility service district law was killed Thursday night by the House Committee on Commerce and Utilities.

The law lets utilities divide up territory into exclusive districts.

The committee also killed a bill to create a state power commission to buy and sell electric energy.

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Cold War Favors America, Rusk Claims In Testimony

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Secretary of State Dean Rusk assured Congress Friday the cold war tide is running our way.

"The Free World is gaining in strength, both absolutely and in comparison with the Communist world," Rusk told the House Foreign Affairs Committee. He made the encouraging assessment in testifying in behalf of President Kennedy's request for another \$4.5 billion installment of this country's foreign aid program.

But Rusk said the struggle is far from finished and that any retreat from foreign military and economic assistance now would open the way for the start of a Communist take over in hot spots around the world.

He asserted: "Our adversaries remain powerful and determined. They are determined to 'bury' us. We must carry on until freedom prevails. We cannot win by yielding the field to the enemy."

"There is nothing that the Communists want more than to see the Yanks go home—not only from Western Europe but from the Mediterranean, South Asia, the Far East, Latin America, Africa, everywhere."

Rusk said, however, "If we Yanks come home, the Communists will begin to take over. Why any American would want to cooperate with that global Communist strategy is beyond my understanding. But that is what short cuts in our foreign aid program would mean."

Rusk coupled his plea for the embattled foreign aid program with a fresh warning to aid recipients that more will be expected of them in the future.

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He said more "self help" and "selectivity" will be the keys to future aid projects.

Rusk faced a relatively friendly audience in the Foreign Affairs Committee, although its newer members included several foreign aid foes. One of them, Rep. H. R. Gross, R-Iowa, has referred to the aid bill as "the foreign giveaway bill."

The measure also is likely to be cut when it comes before Rep. Otto Passman's House appropriations subcommittee. Passman has said that \$2.5 billion this year ought to be plenty, and that in future years the program should require even less.

Other congressional news: Academy: Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor and Edward R. Murrow, U.S. Information Agency director, were scheduled to appear before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee Friday to testify on a bill to establish a foreign service academy. The school would be built in or near Washington at an estimated cost of \$17.5 million. An estimated \$6.7 million a year would be needed to operate it.

Transit: The Kennedy administration's mass transit bill passed the Senate Thursday after being cut by \$125 million. Voting for the bill were 46 Democrats and 6 Republicans. Opposed were 24 Republicans and 17 Democrats. Under the Senate bill, the Federal

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
