Spade Slam Said Safer

One of the many advantages of the Jacoby Transfer Bid is that it keeps the play in the no-trump hand. This is particularly important after a two no-trump opening.

Playing at six spades, South simply won the diamond lead, drew trumps, discarded one of his clubs on a heart and made his slam. If North had been declarer, East would have opened the queen of clubs and South would have lost the first two tricks.

When this hand was actually played in a Texas duplicate game a few pairs arrived at six no-trump instead of six spades and one South managed to bring the contract home.

West opened the jack of diamonds and South decided that the ace of clubs was going to be in the West hand together with at least four diamonds.

Therefore, South won the diamond lead in his own hand, ran off three heart tricks in order to discard one of dummy's clubs and then cashed all five spades. He let his last heart go on the fifth spade and West who had discarded two clubs on the first four spades had run out of discards.

He did the best he could and let a club go whereupon South simply led dummy's last club and played low from his own hand. West had to play the ace and South had his twelfth trick.

Fits Rapped By Appling

SALEM (UPI) — Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr. suggested today that legislators stop throwing "a fit of pique" when an executive officer exercises his authority.

Appling was commenting on a bill to give the legislature control over space in the capitol. It was introduced on the heels of the discovery that a civil defense center is being built in the basement on executive order.

Appling said it is ironic that legislators who support giving the governor more authority "are the first to throw a fit of pique when he exercises his authority."

"Their present ludicrous posture reminds me of the dachshund who met himself face to rump while going around in circles," he said.

"This bill, conceived in frustration, again points up the basic schizophrenia of legislators who constantly seek to take over administrative functions," he said.



FOSSILIZED PLANT? — Bert Moore, 50, 1235 Owens Street, observes what he believes is a piece of a petrified cycad trunk, a flowering plant which was common in some parts of North America during the Miocene epoch—about 35 million years ago. Moore, a rockhound and one-time prospector, found the curio in the desert about two miles southeast of Paisley recently and left it with the Klamath County Museum. Mrs. Lloyd Seeley, curator of the museum, has shipped the object to the University of Oregon to be positively identified and catalogued. Cycads, believed to be among the earth's first flowering plants, survived in moist, torrid climate that was once characteristic of Southern Oregon. Fossilized remnants of the plants have been found at various locations in South Dakota but discoveries elsewhere have been rare.

Air Pollution Control Added To Transit Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate, in passing President Kennedy's mass transit bill 52-41 Thursday, adopted an air pollution control provision introduced by Sen. Maurice Neuberger, D-Ore.

The Neuberger provision empowers the housing administrator to withhold aid to any urban transportation system whose facilities and equipment fail to comply with air pollution control criteria established by the secretary of health, education and welfare.

"Recent studies by the Public Health Service," Mrs. Neuberger said, "reveal the ugly price we are paying for the benefits of motor vehicle travel in urban cities and suburbs. Motor vehicle air pollution in particular has been identified as the source of a broad spectrum of evils from the decimation of crops and livestock to the aggravation of human disease."

Although California now requires automobiles be equipped with devices to control motor vehicle exhaust, the Neuberger clause represents the first federal action to enforce air pollution control standards, the senator said.
