Girl Shot By Suitor

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI) — "What a stupid thing, what a stupid thing."

A mother whose daughter was fatally shot kept repeating those words Friday.

Her daughter, Marcia L. Degen, 17, a senior at Crawford High School, was shot three times in the head by James W. Jungblut, 20, a junior at San Diego State College.

Eight schoolmates of the slain girl witnessed the murder-suicide which took place one block from Crawford High School, police said.

Witnesses said Jungblut approached Miss Degen on her way to school. They started arguing, and he took a .22-caliber revolver out of his pocket, fired at the girl and then himself.

Mrs. Richard L. Degen, mother of the girl, said Jungblut came to their home Thursday and threatened to shoot her daughter but her husband talked him out of it and Jungblut left.

Mrs. Degen said the two had been dating until recently when Miss Degen told Jungblut she didn't want to go out with him any more.

A note was found at the scene of the shooting, police said, which indicated Jungblut was having difficulty with Marcia's parents.

'Right To Work' Laws Said Harmful To States

DENVER (UPI) — Undersecretary of Labor John F. Henning Saturday said "right to work" laws, such as the one adopted recently in Wyoming, were harmful to the economy of the states that pass them as well as to the labor movement.

Henning, here for a regional observance of the 50th anniversary of the Department of Labor, said "right to work" legislation and any legislation to restrict collective bargaining is both damaging and unnecessary.

"Right to work states are the low wage states," Henning said. "In a right to work state, there can be no equality of bargaining."

He said the purpose of the laws, to ban union shops in the interest of employees who might not want to belong to the union, is unnecessary because federal law provides for removal of that requirement of employment by a majority vote of employees.

Some Industry Attracted

Henning conceded some "right to work states" in the Southeast apparently have been successful in attracting industry from the North. He said the Southern states have been referred to traditionally have been "low wage states" where they haven't sufficient funds for schools or a standard of living which we believe essential.

Henning said he did not believe there was any chance of passage for pending congressional legislation that would make labor disputes subject to compulsory arbitration. He said the result of such laws would be wage freezes, fol-

lowed by frozen prices in a trend "from which free men have never returned."

The undersecretary said collective bargaining "has been an incredible success in this country" and should not be eliminated by "such coercion."

Henning made his comments at a news conference at which he said unemployment is by far the most critical problem of U.S. labor. If the unemployment rate of the past five years continues, he said, the nation faces an unemployment rate of 7 per cent by 1967.

Joblessness The Problem

He pointed out labor disputes accounted for only .16 per cent of available employment lost in 1962, and that the unemployment rate of 1962 wasted more manpower last year than all the labor disputes of the past 35 years.

Henning recently was appointed head of the new Manpower Agency of the Department of Labor, which he said would coordinate various efforts of the department to help solve the unemployment problem.

He said the problem will continue until two goals are achieved — a substantial increase in the rate of the nation's economic growth and expansion of manpower training projects to fit workers for the demands of steady technological progress.

Millions Of Jewish Homes Observe Start Of Passover

"Why is this night different from all other nights?" That question will be asked in millions of Jewish homes this evening.

Tradition decrees that it be asked by the youngest son of the family.

It is answered by the head of the family retelling the story of the Exodus—the mighty act of deliverance by which God brought the children of Israel out of bondage in Egypt.

The question and answer are part of the Seder, a home worship service which opens the annual observance of the eight-day Passover season.

The Seder is probably the oldest continually observed religious ritual in the world. It has been celebrated for more than 3,000 years.

The service is built around a festive meal in which every dish has a symbolic significance.

Use Special Dishes

The Seder table is spread before dark, with the finest linens and best silver that the home can provide. Many families have special sets of dishes which are used only once a year, during the Passover.

At sundown, the mother lights candles on the table, and all members of the family gather around. The head of the family opens the ceremony by raising a cup of wine, as in a toast, and pronouncing an ancient blessing: "Praised art Thou, O Lord our God, ruler of the universe, who hast chosen us from all people and singled us out from among men . . . for Thy service."

Altogether, four glasses of wine are drunk during the meal. They recall God's four promises to Moses that the Israelites would be freed from captivity.

Other ingredients of the Seder feast include: —Matzo, or unleavened bread, which is a reminder that the Israelites had to flee Egypt so hastily that they had no time to bake regular bread but were compelled to subsist on flat unleavened loaves sun-baked on desert rocks.

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Tax Refunds Await Audit

SALEM (UPI) — Oregonians are going to have to wait a while longer for state income tax refunds this year, Tax Commissioner Fred Hoeft said today.

Hoeft told the House Tax Committee that the new tax commission policy is to audit refund claims before the refund is mailed.

In past years the refund claimed by the taxpayers was mailed soon after the return was received, and the return was audited later, "perhaps months later," Hoeft said.

Under the old system the tax commission then had to bill the taxpayer for return of any overpayment of the refund.

Hoeft said the handling of refunds would be slower, especially returns that are being filed now, just before the April 15 deadline.

Tax Committee Chairman Richard Eymann, D-Marcola, asked if the new policy did not have the effect of paying 1962 refunds out of the 1963-65 biennium budget, and thus help avoid a deficit in this biennium.

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Moisture-Caused Short Circuit Fired Sidewinder In Tragic 1961 Accident

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M. (UPI) — One of the worst blizzards in history whipped Mount Taylor in western New Mexico April 7, 1961, but high above a B32 jet bomber was clearly silhouetted against the blue sky as two jet fighters began a simulated attack.

The eight men aboard the \$8 million Strategic Air Command bomber, stationed at Biggs Air Force Base in El Paso, Tex., had been through the same procedure many times.

So had 1st Lt. James Van Scoy, pilot of a New Mexico Air National Guard F100A, as he lined up for his sixth pass at the massive swept-wing bomber.

It was shortly before noon two years ago — a date now marked as one of the major peace-time tragedies in the history of the Air Force.

A sidewinder missile accidentally fired from the wing of the F100 streaked straight at the B32 and blasted a wing off. The bomber plummeted into the storm below, spinning crazily.

Van Scoy, a veteran pilot, was safety officer for the 188th Fighter Interceptor Squadron of the Air National Guard stationed at Kirtland Air Force Base in Albuquerque.

As he always did before such training missions, he twice ran through safety checks to make sure the Sidewinders were secure.

Yet the red warning light flashed on his instrument panel. He immediately realized something had gone wrong, and shouted into the radio:

"Look out, one of my missiles has fired."

Before he had finished his sentence, Van Scoy was "counting parachutes."

There were five.

The B32 never had a chance against the Sidewinder, one of the most accurate and reliable in the Air Force arsenal of missiles. The heat-seeking missile, used by Nationalist China pilots in 1958 to shoot down Communist MIGs, went straight into a jet pod on the wing of the B32 and exploded, ripping the wing off.

The Air Force launched an investigation seldom equaled in size or intensity.

Investigators disclosed a buildup of moisture had short-circuited in-

side the wing of the F100, firing the missile.

There was nothing the stunned Van Scoy or anyone else could do. The Kirtland pilot, in fact, was promoted to captain less than a year after the investigation showed him blameless.

The wiring system in the F100 underwent certain modifications to assure that such an accident couldn't happen again, the Air Force Command in Colorado Springs said last week. In addition, electrical systems of all fighter interceptors were reviewed and checked to remove any possible malfunctions.
