CD Building Sparks Row

SALEM (UPI) — Senate President Ben Musa and House Speaker Clarence Barton Friday charged "expedients for construction of a Civil Defense headquarters in the Capitol basement were not approved by the Board of Control as required by law."

In a press release, Barton and Musa said they would "initiate inquiries as to the responsibility for this improper waste of state money for the Civil Defense center without authorization from the Board of Control."

Earlier Friday Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr. suggested legislators stop throwing "a fit of pique" when an executive officer exercises his authority.

The bill was introduced after legislative leaders learned the Civil Defense center was under construction.

NBC Teevee Cameramen Visit Area

A crew of cameramen and technicians of Brinkley's Journal, NBC television program, from Washington, D.C., were in Klamath Falls Monday to film local scenes of the lumber and potato industry and a meeting of Great Decisions Monday night at the home of Dr. Marion Luten.

The group was aided by Ben Kerns, chairman of Great Decisions in Klamath Falls.

Klamath Falls was chosen as a Far West representative city. Scenes were filmed at the Weyerhaeuser Plant, the company logging operations at Diamond Lake, of scenes in the city and of potato sorting and packing at the George Chin Ranch.

The film strip will be released for national coverage about the middle of May on the Brinkley Journal program on KOTI-TV.

Films were made also en route to the West Coast at Little Rock, Ark., and Montrele, Colo., a small town centering a cattle and sheep production area.

The "grass roots" coverage was suggested to Brinkley, a South Carolina native, by the Foreign Policy Association, which publishes facts for Great Decisions.

The Brinkley Journal group in Klamath Falls includes producer and researcher, Ted Yates; researcher, Mrs. Judy Williams; production manager, Arthur Mills, Washington, D.C., and a camera crew from Burbank, Calif., Dexter Alley, cameraman; Fred Pearce, assistant cameraman; Jim Cannon, electrician, and Ted Mann, sound technician.

Funds Boosted For Lakeview

LAKEVIEW — The State Board of Aeronautics added \$4,000 to the \$10,000 of state funds allocated to the Lakeview airport project at a meeting of the board on March 28, Howard M. Goodnough, member of the Lake County-Lakeview airport commission, met with the board.

Approval of the project, which includes re-surfacing of a runway and taxi-strip, is now being sought from the Federal Aviation Agency. The FAA had agreed to furnish up to 54.6 per cent of the cost and in August this amount was set at \$42,218, based on estimates at that time. However, the low bid of \$102,540 by the Hughes & Dodd contractors of Medford was higher than originally planned, and the added amount was needed from the FAA before the contract could be signed.

The airfield is now being bypassed by West Coast Airlines because of holes in the runway, and resumption of service is not expected before June 1 when the paving project is to be finished.

Charge Draws Innocent Plea

Otto Erlandson, proprietor of the Pastime Tavern, 804 Klamath Avenue, entered a plea of not guilty before Judge Robert Kerr in District Court Monday morning to a charge of illegal possession of a slot machine.

Erlandson was released after posting \$250 bail.

The defendant's attorneys filed a motion to suppress the evidence this morning.

At about 3:35 p.m. on March 30, city policemen and a liquor commission agent confiscated dozens of cases of liquor and a slot machine in a storeroom at the tavern.

Game Agent Arrests Critic Of Commission

C. E. "Red" Milhorn, of Beatty, has been cited for game violations by the Oregon Fish and Game Commission, the agency of which he has been an outspoken critic in his post as president of the Oregon Fish and Game Council, the Herald and News learned Monday.

Milhorn was cited by James Cromwell, U.S. Fish and Game Management agent, for having in his possession two live wood ducks and two Canadian geese without a permit from the federal government, as required by law.

The defendant is to appear before U.S. Commissioner David R. Vandenberg Jr., in the latter's office, Monday, April 29, to answer the charge. The penalty for the violation is from \$1 to \$500 and may include a jail sentence. Milhorn was not available to comment on the incident.

The Oregon Fish and Game Council has been critical of the Oregon State Game Commission and was one of the supporters for setting up an interim study committee to review the program of the commission. The study committee was established last month by the state legislature.

Man Held For Threat To Grocer

A Rocky Point man who was arrested Friday by a sheriff's deputy for threatening the life of a local grocer was released on \$500 bail the following day in district court, according to the Klamath County Sheriff's Office.

The charge said a threat was issued by Dustin Brumbaugh, 60, against the life of W. J. Easter, 71, of 1050 California Avenue, during a disagreement between the two men Friday and resulted in a county-wide search for Brumbaugh by city and state police and the sheriff's office, according to deputy Del Summers.

Acting on a tip, Summers later went to the Tomahawk Ski Bowl Lodge where he found Brumbaugh and apprehended him on a warrant for "threatening to commit a felony in the state of Oregon."

The incident is alleged to have occurred Friday when Easter and Brumbaugh became involved in a dispute about some tools which were stored in the former's grocery. Easter then sought the advice of a local attorney who advised Brumbaugh to leave the store. The defendant became angry and while leaving the premises threatened to return within an hour to "kill Easter," Summers said. Moments later, Easter advised local law enforcement agencies of the threat.

Easter is currently out on bail on two counts of contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

L. Streeter Services Set

PORT KLAMATH — Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. Tuesday, April 9, in Creswell for Lorin M. Streeter, 90, pioneer resident of the Fort Klamath community. Final rites and interment will be in the family plot in Pleasant Hill Cemetery, Creswell.

Mr. Streeter died April 5 in a rest home in Cottage Grove where he had been moved several months ago after being in a hospital there since last July. He had been active up to that time.

He was a native of Centerville, Mendocino County, California, born Jan. 12, 1873. He worked for the late P. D. Reeder with sheep and cattle and was a deputy sheriff of Silver Lake at one time.

In 1905 he married Nora Sellers of Creswell and in 1909 they moved to Fort Klamath on a 220-acre ranch which they continued to operate until the death of Mrs. Streeter in 1952. The ranch was then leased after he sold his cattle interests but he lived alone on the property until his last illness.

It was sold last year to Mr. and Mrs. Lee Hunsaker, former residents of Klamath Falls, recently of Red Bluff.

Mr. Streeter was the first rancher in the Wood River Valley to ship cattle by rail to California for winter pasture. He was an honorary member of the Wood River Pioneers and Old-timers.

Survivors are a brother, Arthur of Creswell, and two nephews, Wilbur Scott of Creswell and one in Bend.

Irrigators Talk Storm

Effect of late March storms on irrigation water outlook will be discussed at the annual water forecast meeting scheduled for 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 9, at the Klamath County Fairgrounds.

Snow survey records show that end of month storms deposited a good increase on top of a short snow pack.

Park headquarters at Crater Lake increased from 59 inches of snow containing 23.2 inches of water on Feb. 25 to 105 inches containing 35 inches of water on March 31. This is still well below average.

Agency Reports Employment Better

The number of job openings received by the Klamath Falls office of the Oregon State Employment Service during March increased 115 per cent over the February total and was about 10 per cent more than in March, 1962.

The number of applicants placed in March, 1963, was 128 per cent higher than in February and 20 per cent higher than March, 1962.

Employment increased slightly in Klamath County during March. The number of new or reopened claims for unemployment insurance was much less than during February. However, as of the week ending March 21, 1963, insured unemployment was 8.2 per cent of the covered labor force. This was a drop of 3.3 per cent from the week ending Feb. 21, 1963. Unemployment is significantly less than a year ago, Leonard Sysma, manager, Klamath Falls Employment Office, announced.

Unemployment is expected to rise during the first part of April primarily as a result of layoffs in logging and wood products. However this rise in unemployment is expected to be of very short duration. By the end of April employment will probably increase significantly with a corresponding decrease in unemployment.

The seasonal peak of unemployment has probably passed. Unemployment is not expected to rise to the February level before next winter.

Agricultural employment is expected to rise sharply over the next 60 days. The peak level of agricultural employment occurs during the potato harvest.

Following is a comparison of rates of insured unemployment for Klamath County: Week ending March 21, 1963, 8.2 per cent; four weeks ago, 11.5 per cent; one year ago, 11.1 per cent; two years ago, 15.8 per cent.
