

### Formal Polaris Treaty Inked By Britain, U.S.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Secretary of State Dean Rusk and British Ambassador Sir David Ormsby Gore today signed the formal agreement under which the United States will sell Polaris missiles to Britain for use on submarines the United Kingdom plans to build.

This was disclosed by diplomatic sources who said agreement on sale of the missiles, minus nuclear warheads, will be presented to the British Parliament early next week.

The agreement covers the sale not only of the missiles but fire control systems and other components necessary to make them an effective military operation.

The sales agreement specifies the price to be paid by Britain for the missiles, as well as the other components of the systems and any technical assistance needed in arranging for their use on British-built submarines.

Signing of the agreement carried forward the long-range plan agreed upon by President Kennedy and British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan at their meeting in the Bahamas last December.

### Morse Demands End Of Minority Rule

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., has called on Americans to end the "dictatorial, tyrannical minority rule" in Congress.

He told the closing session of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union convention here Friday that a small clique of "ultra conservatives" on key congressional committees have near veto power over legislation.

Morse blamed the situation on a system of seniority and rules of procedure in Congress.

The outspoken Oregon senator said that a nation-wide rail strike could stampede Congress and the administration into compulsory arbitration.

"It is my fear that the impact of automation upon such vital industries as the railroads... could force harmful and ill-considered anti-strike laws upon the nation."

Morse said he opposes exclusive compulsory arbitration because it "does not keep the negotiators guessing. If we get into a national emergency dispute... we must keep both parties guessing as to the procedure that will apply to them."

Morse said he is studying a new measure that would give to both sides a last-chance opportunity to agree on a voluntary basis to

some procedure that is mutually acceptable.

The delegates to the convention passed a resolution urging an end to the cold war and a review of U.S. policies toward Communist China.

ILWU President Harry Bridges told the delegates that world peace could best be achieved by allowing the nations of the world to choose their own destinies.

"Nations should hold a plebiscite under the supervision of the United Nations to choose their own political system," he said.

Delegates representing the ILWU on the West Coast, Alaska and Hawaii, as well as special guests from Australia and Japan, approved Bridges' self-determination proposal.

Bridges, Vice President J. R. Robertson and Secretary-Treasurer Louis Goldblatt were nominated for re-election without opposition.

The nominations will go to the rank-and-file on a referendum ballot, along with names of nominees for the International Executive Board.

### Count Tells Of Finesse

"Win at Bridge" is my first bridge book in more than 20 years. It outlines the simple method of bidding and play that I have found most effective after 35 years of play from the White House to a tent in Korea.

Here is a hand that illustrates how declarer may occasionally be just as sure of where a key card is as if he were looking right in the opponents' hands.

South looks over dummy carefully and counts 12 top tricks at no-trump with a two-way finesse for the queen of hearts to make his grand slam.

He has to take the finesse sometime or other, but the correct technique is to acquire as much information as possible first.

South wins the opening club lead and cashes nine more tricks in spades, diamonds and clubs.

He watches the fall of the cards and notes that East has discarded on the second club. This means that West started with seven clubs. He also notes that West follows to three spades and two diamonds so 12 of West's 13 cards 13 cards are known to be other than hearts.

This leaves West with one heart. South leads a heart to dummy's king. West plays the four of hearts and East is marked with the queen just as surely as if South had peeked.

### Birth Control Dispute Slated For High Court

CHICAGO (UPI)—Five members of the Illinois Public Aid Commission (IPAC), their controversial birth control program in danger of being ruled, sued and legislated out of existence, Saturday vowed to go to the U.S. Supreme Court to save it.

Commission Chairman Arnold Maremont and four other members hired a private lawyer Friday to carry their case to the courts.

The embattled program, offering free birth control information and contraceptives to women on relief in an effort to cut back the high number of illegitimate births, went into effect Monday.

Since then:

—The Illinois Senate passed a bill which would strip the plan of its most controversial elements by banning the information and devices to unwed mothers or married women not living with their husbands.

—The state auditor and state treasurer were ordered not to draw any warrants which would pay for birth control aid to such women.

—The IPAC's official counsel, State Atty. Gen. William G. Clark, condemned the program and said he supported a suit for a court injunction to prevent it from operating.

—The board of directors of the Chicago Association of Commerce and Industry called for the abolition of the Aid Commission.

IPAC Secretary Daniel Walker said the head of a Chicago law firm, Thomas C. McConnell, was hired because Clark's opposition to the birth control program "left us without a lawyer."

Opponents of the IPAC plan have claimed it amounts to a "subsidization of sin." Clark, in supporting the move for an injunction against the program, said it makes the state of Illinois "accessory to sexual promiscuity and prostitution."

A superior court judge is expected to issue the injunction this week.

### Life Preserver Date Extended

The State Marine Board reports that the Coast Guard will continue to accept as approved equipment, until Jan. 1, 1965, life preservers, buoyant vests and buoyant cushions in which the buoyant material (kapok or fibrous glass) is not encased in heat-sealed plastic bags. As the State Boating Laws require life-saving equipment in boats to be Coast Guard approved, the extension automatically applies to the equipment used in Oregon boats.

Originally, the acceptance of this equipment was to end July 1. All Coast Guard approved fiber-filled life preservers, buoyant vests and cushions manufactured since 1960 are protected by the plastic bags. The extension for equipment manufactured before 1960 applies only if the lifesaving device is not weakened, rotted or torn and if all straps and tie tapes are secured properly.

Lifesaving equipment showing evidence of oil stains, exposure to gasoline or not in good and serviceable condition will be rejected.

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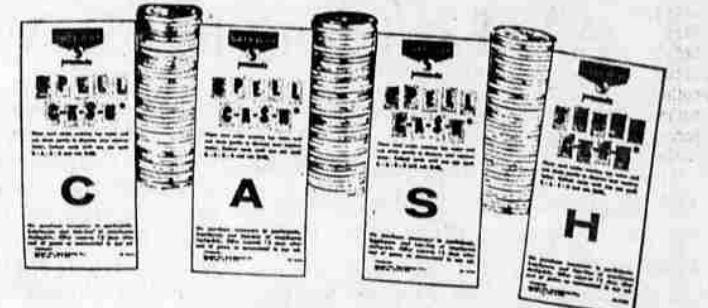

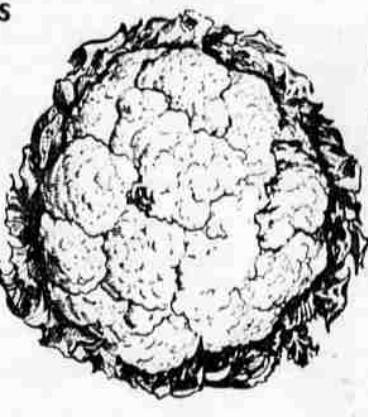
