

Robertson, Briggs Win Open Pairs Bridge Title

Mrs. Leona Robertson and Dick Briggs, playing north-south, placed first in both the afternoon and evening sessions while en route to winning the annual Open Pairs Championship Duplicate Bridge Tournament held Sunday at the Winema Motor Hotel.

The winners scored 392 points to finish ahead of the runnersup and first-round leaders, Mrs. Mary Drew and Mrs. Helen Cheyne, who tallied 374.5 while competing in the east-west section. Third place went to Mrs. Pauline Richardson and Mrs. William Grove, also east-west, with 374.

In the first round, the Drew-Cheyne team compiled a 213 score to lead the field of 30 teams but faltered slightly in the second session with 161.5 for their 374.5 total.

The Robertson-Briggs team, third overall at the ends of the

first round, with 186.5, posted 203.5 in the final session for their winning 392 score.

Mrs. Grove and Mrs. Richardson, far down in the first round, rallied with 205 points in the second session to finish third overall.

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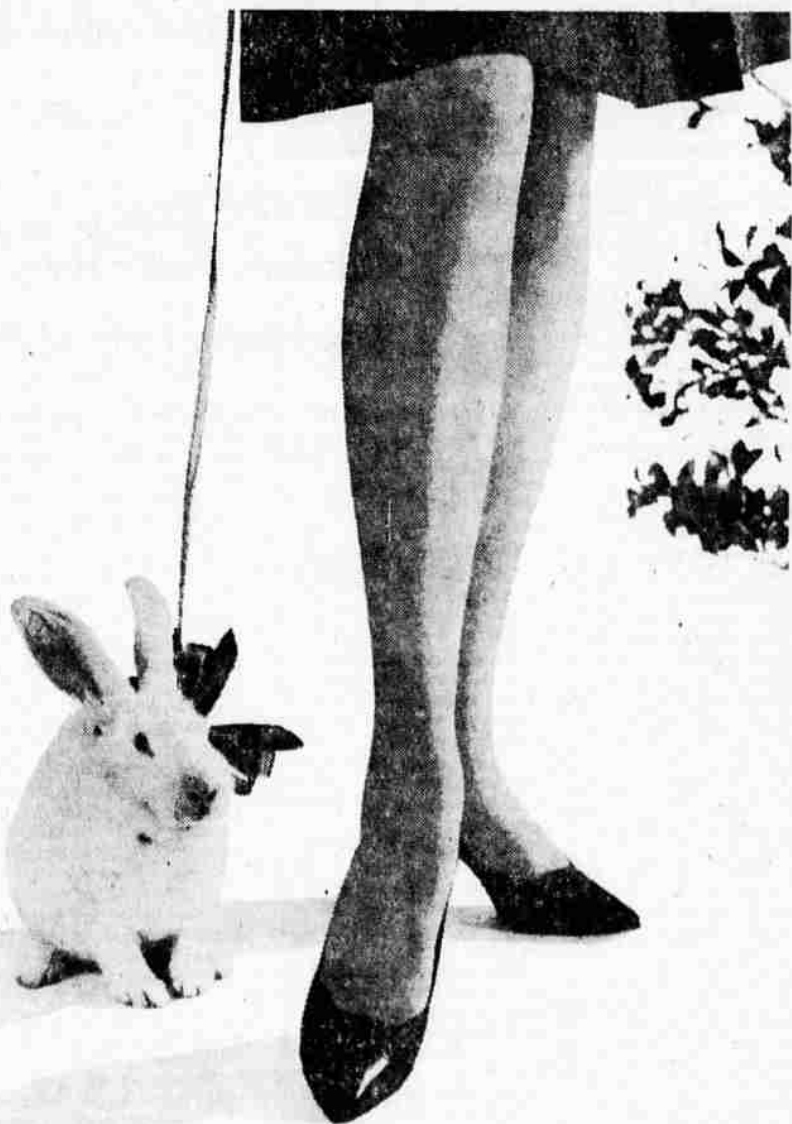
