Trio Attend FFA Meeting

MALIN—Three delegates of the Malin FFA Chapter, Bill Whitman, Dale Parrish, and Danny Duncan, recently accompanied their adviser, James Lacy, to the Oregon State FFA convention held at The Dalles.

Several contests were held for group competition, and Malin's secretary book, kept by Larry Turner, placed second in the state.

A highlight of the convention was the election of district presidents. A South Central District meeting, composed of chapters from Bend, Redmond, Prineville, Culver, Lakeview, and Malin, resulted in the election of Dale Parrish of Malin as district president. Other district officers were elected at the skills contest held in Malin on March 30.

The convention site committee, appointed to select a host city for the 1964 convention, chose Klamath Falls. Approximately 700 FFA members and advisers are expected to attend next year's state meeting. The Malin chapter was assisted by the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce and the Klamath County School District in submitting the bid for the convention.

Devil Pup Program Still Open

There is still time for Klamath Basin youngsters to apply for the Devil Pup program at Camp Pendleton, Calif., sponsored by the local Marine Corps League and the Marine Corps.

The local league will process all applications before the April 15 deadline and pick 10 boys between 15 and 17 years old to attend the camp.

Monthly Withholding Report Bill Opposed By Chamber Of Commerce

In a meeting directed largely to the discussion of proposed state and federal legislation, the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce endorsed the passage of Senate Bill 63, which would require that contractors be licensed by the state, and opposed House Bill 1076, a proposed law which would require firms withholding \$100 a month in state taxes to file state income tax withholding reports monthly rather than quarterly. It developed at the weekly meeting of the chamber on Wednesday.

In addition, the chamber took a look at some federal legislation and endorsed a blanket recommendation by Ross Ragland, chairman of the National Affairs Committee, that it oppose passage of three bills which would affect mass transportation systems in cities of 25,000 population or more, and approve Laushe Bill S-807, also connected with transportation systems in large cities.

The Laushe Bill would permit state, local government, and business leaders throughout the nation to develop urban transit systems in their respective areas through use of their own resources, talents and capabilities, according to Ragland.

On other federal legislation, the chamber concurred with another recommendation by Ragland that it oppose three other bills, including bills HR5131 and S1, which would establish a youth conservation corps, and bill HR4996, dealing with area redevelopment administration. The latter bill would establish a permanent Area Redevelopment Administration and, in addition, authorize the spending of an extra \$436 million for all phases of ARA, Ragland said.

The National Affairs Committee opposed the youth conservation bills because it believes that such a program would compete with privately financed work-study programs now being expanded in secondary schools.

The youth corps bill would remove young men from the economic activities of their communities without guaranteeing that they would be better prepared to fill manpower needs after completing their tour in the woods, Ragland noted. If passed, the law might also result in causing more students to "drop out of high school," he said.

Under the proposed bill, the cost to subsidize each young man would be approximately \$7,000, with the federal government to incur 50 per cent of those costs, Ragland concluded.

Letters indicating the chamber's position on the bills which may become law will be sent to lawmakers at the state legislature and to Oregon senators and representatives in Congress.

The two state bills acted upon by the chamber were introduced

by Floyd Wynne, director of the State and Local Affairs Committee, who commented briefly on each of the pieces of legislation. On Senate Bill 63, Wynne said the bill was designed to eliminate "one-shot contractors who passed through a community and left a mass of liability in their wakes."

The bill would make contractors responsible to a Contractor's Advisory Council, which would be established upon approval of the bill by voters. The Local and State Affairs Committee objected to the establishment of the council, and recommended that the chamber endorse the bill with the provision that the contractors be regulated by state trade councils already in existence. The chamber approved of the recommendation as expressed by the committee.

On the bill involving the monthly reporting of state income taxes of employees, Wynne said the bill would affect firms that would report more than \$100 in such taxes monthly.

The bill had originally been written to affect only employers reporting at least \$1,000 monthly in employee state income taxes, but it was later extended to include firms whose workers paid a total of \$100 or more in those taxes.

Dunsmuir PTA Names Officers

Quick Time Bill Okayed

SALEM (UPI)—A bill to extend daylight saving time to the last Sunday in October, instead of the last Saturday in September, was approved today by the Senate State and Federal Affairs Committee.

Wynne stated that the additional administrative costs, both to the state and firms to be involved by the law, would not justify the purpose of the bill. The object of the legislation is to allow the state to obtain its taxes sooner so it may invest the money at an earlier date and thereby obtain more interest annually.

After reports on pending state and federal legislation, Jim Schill, district manager of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce at Portland, spoke of another matter on legislation.

Schill said that individuals, generally, were shirking their responsibilities as citizens in not expressing their views on proposed legislation to their representatives in state and federal government.

He cited that U.S. Senator Maurice Neuberger of Oregon had voiced displeasure that Oregonians, particularly businessmen, were doing a "poor job" advising their lawmakers how they should vote on proposed bills, especially tax laws.

Schill also commented briefly on the national debt, stating that it amounted to \$1.4 trillion and not \$308 billion as is generally believed. He cited further that the net worth of the nation is estimated at approximately \$322 billion.

On the subject of Senate Bills 704 and 703 which would affect control of the Upper and Lower Klamath refuges and the Tule Lake Refuge, the chamber approved a recommendation by Dick Henzel, member of the agriculture committee, that it reaffirm its opposition to the bills. The chamber also named Chet Langslet, another member of the committee, to speak in its behalf in voicing disapproval of the legislation at a Senate hearing April 23 in the nation's capital.

Langslet will appear at the hearing to recommend that a number of amendments be added to the bill. The amendments would provide for the preservation of marsh lands which are needed for the breeding and nesting of birds and for providing the aquatic life upon which they subsist.

Further, the proposed additions to the bills would preserve the hunting rights of the public and set aside 3,400 more acres to be used for the preservation of wildlife.

Jim Caudwell, a visitor from Rotorua, Klamath Falls' sister city, was a guest of the chamber and presented three books about his native city to Jim Monteith, chamber president.
