

Aguirre, Killebrew Aid In Teams' Wins

Hank Aguirre and Harmon Killebrew have absolutely nothing in common when it comes to playing baseball.

Aguirre, who topped all major league pitchers with a 2.21 earned-run average last season, admits he's a lousy hitter. Killebrew never has tried his hand at pitching but he led the American League with 48 homers in 1962.

Both men turned in typical performances Wednesday to gain fast starts in defense of their individual titles.

Killebrew Blasts First

Aguirre, held hitless in three at-bats, pitched the Detroit Tigers to a 2-1 victory over the Chicago White Sox and Killebrew hit his first homer of the new campaign to earn the Minnesota Twins a 5-3 victory over the Cleveland Indians.

The Boston Red Sox downed the Los Angeles Angels, 4-1; the New York Yankees ripped the Kansas City Athletics, 5-3, and the Baltimore Orioles edged the Washington Senators, 3-2, in other AL games.

Aguirre scattered seven hits, struck out six and issued only one walk in his season debut. Floyd Robinson singled home Chicago's only run in the first inning, then Aguirre barred the door. The Tigers, meanwhile, bunched three of their four hits with a walk and a passed ball for their two runs in the bottom of the first.

Killebrew blasted a Barry Latham fast ball 400 feet into the teeth of a stiff wind with one aboard in the eighth inning to provide the Twins with their margin of victory.

Banks Adds Homer

George Banks also hit a two-run homer for the Twins. Jim Kaat was nipped for nine Cleveland hits, including a pinch homer and a single by Ed Brinkman.

Graybeard Celtics Defeat Royals To Gain Playoffs

The graybeards of basketball, Boston's veteran Celtics, pulled the bell ropes to sound midnight for Cincinnati's cinderella team and immediately turned to their newest title task.

The Celtics, faltering with age in recent weeks after seven seasons of total domination in the National Basketball Association, got hunting their fifth straight world playoff crown on Sunday.

And the Celtics, who Wednesday night eliminated the Royals from the Eastern NBA playoffs, don't care whether St. Louis or Los Angeles wins the role of Western finalist.

The Lakers and Hawks, deadlocked at three wins apiece, clash in Los Angeles tonight for the Celtics in the best-of-seven finals starting here on Sunday. The second game of the finals will be here Tuesday before the teams go west for two games on yet undisclosed dates.

The Celtics, flashing the bursts of speed and scoring that had carried them to seven straight eastern playoff crowns, made it eight straight Wednesday night in a 142-131 conquest of the dierhard Royals.

Boston broke the game open before another capacity Garden crowd with third and fourth quarter spurts. Coach Red Auerbach pulled his top stars, Bob Cousy and Sam Jones. But Cincinnati fought back from a 25 point deficit and forced both exhausted veterans back into the game

Ray Robertson Hired As New Lakeview Football Mentor

Robertson will assist Ted McKee in the Lakeview basketball program.

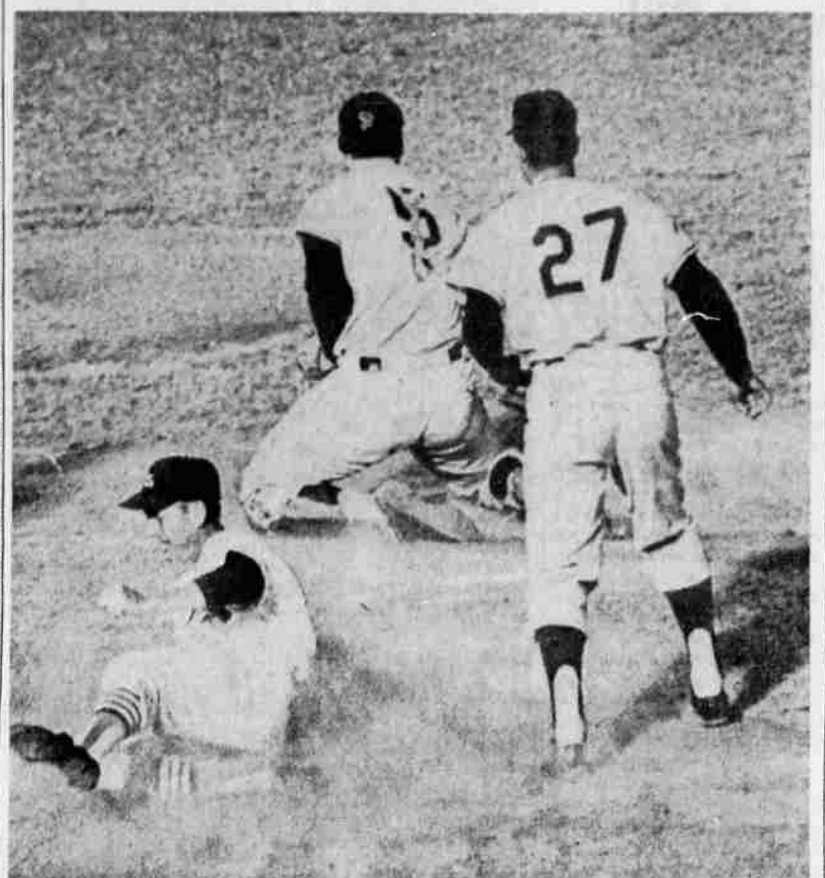
S. Suburban LL Tryouts

Victorin Going To Masters Tournament In Buffalo, N. Y.

Bob Victorin, a well-known figure in bowling around this area, leaves for Buffalo, N.Y., this week and the Masters Tournament.

Victorin gained the Masters Tournament by virtue of his All-Events title in the State Tournament to earn the trip. The Masters is an individual match game event open to all ABC members. A qualifying round is held to determine a minimum of 48 positions for the final field of 64 stars. The qualifying competition is limited to 480 entrants including state All-Events winners from every state. The state representatives compete among themselves to determine eight men to qualify for the finals. All others are chosen (including state representatives) via total scores in the qualifying.

Each finalist bowls four game matches with total pins deciding the winner. It is a double elimination affair with each player going into the losers bracket after one defeat—and being eliminated with the second loss. In this manner the champion is chosen from the winner of the losers bracket (who has only one defeat) and the one undefeated bowler. Should the losers bracket winner defeat the undefeated bowler in the first match, a second match is bowled since each would have one loss.

If the winners bracket contestant captures the first match, however, he is the champion since the opponent would have two losses and would therefore be eliminated.

First place in the competition pays \$4,000; second, \$3,000, down to \$650 for eighth place. There are other special monetary awards for each match won, for highest series, highest qualifying score, etc. The total prize fund is estimated at \$24,400.

Victorin will be Klamath Falls' second representative to a National Tournament this year. The All-Star and the Masters are the only two events that afford local bowlers a chance to win their entry, or right to be in the national field, and Victorin is one of the best competitors in this area, especially on out-of-town lanes.

He carried the highest average in the City Association for three years in a row, climaxing it with the first 200 plus average in the history of the association in 1959. The only other person to hold the distinction of being over the 200 average for the season was Frank Beard, who also carried a 201 last year.

Victorin was a member of the now defunct Klamath Craters and added color as well as scores with his three-step delivery, and enthusiastic team spirit.

In 1958 he teamed with Cliff Stenler to win the state doubles title. He was also the local city match game titlist in 1959.

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Giants, Dodgers Win To Stay Among Leaders

Ed Bailey and Clay Dalrymple — a couple of major league catchers traveling in opposite directions on baseball's merry-go-round — have found the same route in leading their teams to come-from-behind victories.

The veteran Bailey, one-time standout catcher of the National League while with the Cincinnati Reds but now relegated to the second-string job, pinch-hit a grand slam home run Wednesday night in pacing the Giants to a 8-7 triumph over the Houston Colts.

The 26-year-old Dalrymple, starting his third year as a regular backstop, capped an eight-run outburst in the seventh inning with a two-run homer to give the Philadelphia Phillies a 10-7 victory over the Reds.

Sandy Koufax, pitching his first complete game since last July, held the Chicago Cubs to five hits in a 2-1 triumph for the Los Angeles Dodgers; Ray Washburn of the St. Louis Cardinals blanked the New York Mets, 4-0, and Donn Clendenon's homer led the Pittsburgh Pirates over the Milwaukee Braves, 3-2, in other games.

Houston led 7-4 going into the eighth inning, but reliever Don McMahon filled the bases and Bailey blasted his pitch 390-feet over the right field wall. Felipe Alou hit a homer and Orlando Cepeda added three hits for the Giants.

Don Demeter singled home the tie-breaking run and then Dalrymple connected — both coming on the first pitch served by the Reds' fourth hurler, Jim Brosnan. Johnny Callison also homered for the Phils.

Koufax, sidelined for the last half of the 1962 season with a circulatory ailment on his pitching finger, showed no effects from the injury, striking out 10 Cubs. With stars Maury Wills, Tommy Davis and Bill Skowron benched with injuries the Dodgers made the most of five hits to beat old nemesis Bob Buhl.

Washburn set the Mets down on four hits, handing Casey Stengel's team its second straight shutout. Dick Groat's homer and Bill White's three hits paced the Cardinals' attack.

Clendenon's second home run of the season came in the eighth inning to make Don Cardwell's debut as a Pirate a winning one.
