The Oregon Tech Owls will be in their first meet of the season Saturday, weather permitting, at an invitational meet at Central Oregon College in Bend and Coach Larry

Burleson will have six members participating. "Sturdy Six" will have to be just that because all are entered in at least three

events and most of them will be in five events which is the limit a performer may compete in. Despite the limited size of the team, Burleson has high hopes for

Three-Point Buck Kill Only Near Passing Stage For California

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — The three-point only buck hunting proposal for northeastern California was over possibly its toughest hurdle today.

The Senate Fish and Game Committee approved the bill on a split vote Wednesday and sent it to the full Senate for final passage.

The bill's author, Assemblywoman Pauline Davis, D-Portola, told the committee it had "no other alternative" but to approve her proposed two-year moratorium on forked horn deer shooting in the counties of Modoc, Lassen and the eastern portions of Siskiyou and Shasta, if it wished to preserve what was left of the interstate herd.

The committee, however, killed another bill by Mrs. Davis that

would have prohibited the State Fish and Game Commission from allowing the deer season to go past the third Sunday of October in the counties of Modoc, Lassen, Plumas, Siskiyou, Shasta, Trinity and Sierra. Opponents said the bill would infringe on the regulatory powers of the commission, which already was considering a shortened 1963 season for the district anyway.

Both bills previously had passed the Assembly but were expected to counter stiff opposition from the Senate committee.

Dozens of witnesses from Oregon to San Diego paraded before the committee during four hours of conflicting testimony on two controversial bills.

Proponents of the three-point

bill generally blamed overshooting for increasingly smaller deer herd numbers, while opponents said weather conditions were at fault.

Gene Mercer, Chico, a retired fish and game warden, said that "if we give the three-pointers a chance, they may still come back."

Erin Forrest, representing the organized sportsmen of Modoc County, said he was "very concerned" about the "poor doe-buck ratio."

"Our biggest problem is hunting pressure," he said, "as people come from all over the state to hunt up in our corner."

But Walter T. Shannon, director of the State Department of Fish and Game, painted a different picture. He said weather played a bigger part in determining herd conditions.

He also said that if the three-point bill was enacted, "Many forked horns would be shot by mistake and the hunters would leave them lying on the ground to rot."

"When a deer gets up fast with a big rack," he said, "the hunter shoots first and looks later."

The director noted that other Western states which have a mule deer do not feel they need three-point laws.

Ben Glading, head of the department's game management branch, stated that recent rains had improved range conditions. He offered to "stake my reputation"

on a prediction that the "deer kill will be better in 1964 and 1965 than in 1962 and 1963."

Three-point advocates who were asked if they would like to leave the district closed to hunting altogether mostly replied that this step should be taken only as "a last resort."

If the Senate passes the bill and it is signed by the governor, the three-point only rule would be in effect for two years. Then the Legislature would have to decide whether to continue the program.

Schloredt Gets Husky Post

SEATTLE (UPI) — Bob Schloredt, quarterback on the University of Washington's two winning Rose Bowl football teams, has been named to the Husky staff as a fulltime assistant coach.

Jim Owens, head football coach and athletic director, said Schloredt would replace Tugboat Jones who resigned at the end of the 1962 season to return to Texas.

Schloredt, who recently completed two seasons with the professional British Columbia Lions of the Canadian pro league, will take over his post with spring workouts starting April 25.

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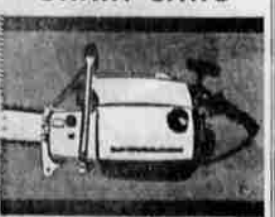


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Seals Defeat Portland, 2-1

San Francisco's aroused Seals skated into a 2-1 lead over Portland in the western hockey league playoffs Thursday night by thrashing the Buckaroos 6-3 at San Francisco's Cow Palace.

The Washington Senators aren't being consulted about that "hot line" between Washington, D.C., and Moscow but they sure are in favor of the one between the nation's capital and Pittsburgh, Pa. The Washington to Pittsburgh "hot line" has been used by two different Senator general managers in a little more than 18 months — with results that must make Pirate G.M. Joe Brown flinch every time the phone rings.

On June 29, 1961 Ed Doherty dialed Brown and obtained pitcher Tom Cheney from the Pirates. Then, on Dec. 14, 1962, George Selkirk tried the same number and acquired catcher Don Leppert for the Senators. Both Cheney and Leppert are reacting to the change like a pair of G.I.'s who have just been transferred from Siberia to Paris.

Hurls One-Hitter

Cheney, who last Sept. 12 set a major league record by striking out 21 batters in a 16-inning game, made his 1963 debut for the Senators with a one-hitter Thursday night while Leppert, who hit only three homers all last season for the Pirates, belted three and knocked in five runs.

Cheney, Leppert Lead Washington Past Red Sox; Orioles Nip Yankees

The result was an 8-0 victory over the Boston Red Sox that put the Senators in the win column for the first time this season. The Baltimore Orioles achieved their best start in a decade when they beat the New York Yankees, 4-1, for their third straight victory; the Detroit Tigers downed the Cleveland Indians, 6-1, and the Chicago White Sox defeated the Los Angeles Angels, 3-1, in other AL games.

Two homers by John (Boog) Powell and the five-hit pitching of Milt Pappas enabled the Orioles to spoil the world champion

Yankees' home opener. Powell hit a two-run homer to snap a 1-1 tie in the fifth and also connected in the seventh. Pappas allowed the Yankee run on a fourth-inning homer by Mickey Mantle. New York ace Whitey Ford suffered the defeat.

Moss Leads Tigers
Don Mossi, one of the Tigers' big question marks, pitched a perfect game for 6 1-3 innings and wound up with a two-hitter. Mossi, only 11-13 in 1962, didn't walk a batter and struck out six. He also had two singles — one

in support of his batterymate. The White Sox spoiled Bo Belinsky's evening for both himself and fiancée Mamie Van Doren by taking advantage of his wildness to score two runs in the sixth inning and assume a lead they held behind the four-inning shutout relief pitching of Hoyt Wilhelm. Floyd Robinson homered off Belinsky for the White Sox' first run and rookie Pete Ward had two triples.

Cepeda On Warpath; Giants Win Third Straight Game

Orlando Cepeda, the "baby bull" who turned "goat" in late 1962, is belting his way back into the hearts of the San Francisco Giants and Golden Gate fans.

One of the Giants' World Series disappointments and a hold-out until the club gave him a token \$1,000 raise in salary, the 200-pound first baseman has started the 1963 season like he intends to win the pennant for San Francisco all by himself.

Giants Sweep Series

The defending National League champions—busts on the Cactus League circuit—swept to their third straight victory Thursday night by whipping the Houston Colts, 7-1, behind a 12-hit attack that included a homer, two singles and three runs batted in by Cepeda. The heavy cannoning made it easy for Billy O'Dell to breeze to a three-hit, six-strikeout triumph.

In the Giants' three-game sweep at Houston, Cepeda hammered out nine hits—three in each game—hit two homers and two doubles, drove in seven runs and piled up 17 total bases.

Columbus Raps Beavers, 8-3

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (UPI) — The Portland Beavers closed their exhibition baseball schedule Thursday with an 8-3 loss to Columbus of the International League.

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There were only two other contests played in the NL—the Milwaukee Braves beat the New York Mets, 6-1, and the Chicago Cubs topped the Los Angeles Dodgers, 2-0. The Giants' 3-0 record gives them a half-game lead over St. Louis and Philadelphia, each unbeaten in two games.

Retires 15 In Order

Willie McCovey and Felipe Alou also had three hits in the Giant attack on Ken Johnson and three successors. O'Dell was tapped for two singles by Carl Warwick and one by Rusty Staub before retiring the last 15 Colts in order. Houston's first-inning run was unearned.

Warren Spahn pitched a six-hitter and Hank Aaron homered for the Braves, who celebrated the start of their second decade in

Milwaukee. The win was the 323rd of Spahn's career and the homer the 299th of Aaron's campaigns in the NL. Spahn struck out five to raise his league record for left-handers to 2,318. Duke Snider hit a homer for the Mets.

Dick Ellsworth, a 20-game loser in 1962, pitched a three-hitter for the Cubs, who beat Los Angeles' Johnny Podres for the first time since 1890. Ken Hubbs had three singles and Ron Santo a double and a single to lead the Cubs' eight-hit attack.

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
