Rental Rates For Tule Fairground Facilities Explained By Board

TULELAKE—In spite of some rumors which have been circulating around the community during the past two weeks, the rental rates for the use of the Home Economics building on the Tulelake-Butte Valley fairgrounds have not increased according to Bill Whitaker, manager. Instead, an increased service has been added for large parties for which a charge will be made. The rates which are in existence now and have been since it was first used in 1956 are as follows: Non-profit organizations per day, \$10; Private parties or commercial use, \$25.

The only change made is that for large functions such as banquets, where the tables and chairs are to be set up, or formal dances where the hall is to be completely decorated and an orchestra hired, an additional \$10 will be charged for which the fair will employ a man who is acquainted with the building to perform the following services: Set up tables and chairs, turn on heat and lights, open the hall one-half hour before guests arrive, be on hand all during the event for emergencies, telephone service, etc.; and remove the decorations and clean up the hall and restack the tables and chairs so the guests can go home after the event without having to stay to clean up. This charge will not be made nor the services provided for "after game dances" or parties where the hall is not decorated or an orchestra employed providing that the hall is cleaned up by the groups using it.

In the past, it has been difficult or nearly impossible to explain to each person in charge of a party where each water shutoff is, each fuse, each switch for flood lights, thermostats, each gas valve, fire extinguisher, etc. Because of this some near disasters have occurred. These problems will be avoided if we have one person available who understands all the mechanics of the building. For the above purposes a non-profit organization, school group, as its purpose that of making the stands all the mechanics of the farm cooperative, junior youth community a better place to live

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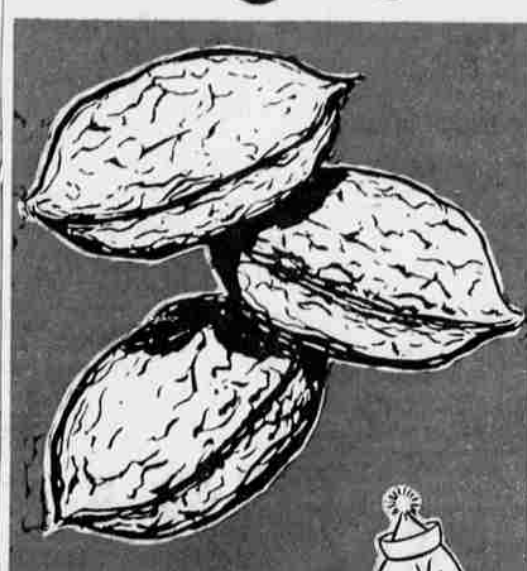
