

Easter Vacations Slow Congress

WASHINGTON (UPI) — An Easter vacation drew congressmen and senators from the capital today. The House adjourned for a 10-day recess and the Senate scheduled only two sessions during the coming week.

The House will not meet until April 22 while the Senate has scheduled only two skeleton sessions for the week following Easter Sunday.

Senator Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., said the Senate hoped "to get into full scale operation" and maintain a steady flow of legislation when it resumes regular meetings.

During the first week that the House begins its sessions again, it will take up a \$237 million medical school aid bill and a controversial extension of the feed grain program in the first week. The Senate will debate the confirmation of incorporators for the communications satellite system. Meanwhile, committees in both Houses, which have been working steadily in the past month after initial delays in organization and financing, are building backlogs of legislation that should keep both chambers busy on their return.

Other congressional news: Information: Sen. Clifford P.

Case, R-N.J., has support from two key civilian Pentagon leaders for his measure to disclose more information about major defense and space contract awards. Case made public letters from Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara and Deputy Secretary Roswell Gilpatric endorsing his bill to remove improper influence in selection of contractors.

United Nations: Rep. Durward G. Hall, R-Mo., proposed limiting the amount of contributions the United States makes to the U.N. budget. Hall's bill would allow the United States to pay only 33.33 per cent of the annual world organization budget which he said would save the country \$50 million a year.

Education: A Republican congressman appealed to Democrats to get the White House to support a \$2.7 billion college aid bill this congressional session. Rep. Albert H. Quie, R-Minn., asked the House Education Committee to urge President Kennedy to support the measure which already has been delayed because of a possible clash with pending aid to medical schools and their students.

Budget: President Kennedy sent Congress amendments to his fiscal 1964 budget proposing reductions of over \$500 million. The largest item was his previously announced decision to ask for \$419,700,000 less for foreign aid. The amendment today reduced his original foreign aid budget of \$4,945,025,000 to \$4,525,325,000. He also asked a decrease of \$445,000 for the State Department educational exchange program, explaining that responsibility for financing the program has been shifted to the Agency for International Development (AID).

Business Awaits Action On Steel Price Raise

NEW YORK (UPI)—Businessmen, politicians and labor leaders, studying reaction to President Kennedy's warning against a general increase in steel prices, settled down today to a weekend of waiting for news from Pittsburgh, Pa.

The President's statement, issued in Washington Thursday, predicted grave economic consequences should there be a general price hike in steel in the wake of Wheeling Steel Corporation's boost in prices on some grades. But he said that "selected price adjustments" are to be expected in a healthy economy.

U.S. Steel, target of administration wrath because of a proposed price hike little over a year ago, remained silent both on the Wheeling action, announced Wednesday, and on the presidential statement. It said that a statement, if any were to be issued, would not come until after Easter.

It is to U.S. Steel that the industry looks for some indication of what will be the general reaction of steel producers to the Wheeling action and the administration attitude. Some industry sources viewing the tightly competitive conditions in the industry have gone so far as to predict that if big steel and other major companies fail to follow Wheeling's lead, the price increase may not stand for long.

Others feel that if there is a spate of price increases, even selective raises on items most in demand, it would have an immediate effect upon the United Steel Workers wage demands, which could be disclosed shortly. The USW can reopen its wage agreements with steel companies any time after April 30.

Man Pinned Under Auto In Hill Road Car Flip

A Klamath Falls man was pinned under an automobile for an hour early this morning after the automobile in which he was a passenger went out of control on Hill Road, near Stukel Mountain, and turned over several times in a field on the west side of the road, state police have reported.

Pinned beneath the wreckage was Monte Dehlinger, 22, of Route 1, Box 674, Klamath Falls, who was taken with the driver of the car, Vincent Cheyne, 21, of Route 1, Box 609, also of Klamath Falls, in Peace Ambulance to the Klamath Valley Hospital.

Dehlinger received a head laceration and was treated for shock, as was Cheyne. Both victims are in good condition, the hospital reported before noon Friday. The accident occurred as a deer darted in front of Cheyne's car, proceeding northbound on Hill Road, 13 miles south of Klamath Falls, about 4 a.m. to day. In an attempt to avoid the deer, Cheyne lost control of the car and it veered off the road and into a field, turning over several times and coming to rest upside down on top of Dehlinger, according to Felix Peace, ambulance operator.

"There's no new progress," said Reno Police Chief Elmer Briscoe Thursday. "Every ten we question and clear seem to implicate ten more." A scheduled press conference was canceled because there was no new information.

Briscoe said he was hoping that FBI questioning of two Reno men arrested in West Virginia on car theft charges could produce some new lead, though he said he doubted the men are connected with the slaying.

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Provisions Listed

Under the bill, a public body—such as a city or port—owning upland adjoining a fill area would get title to the fill land.

A private owner would get first option to purchase adjoining fill land from the state land board.

Mineral rights would be reserved to the state.

Witnesses said problems over title to fill land have arisen at Arlington, Hood River, Portland, Astoria, Coos Bay, Gold Beach and other places.

In unusual appearances before a legislative committee, both House Speaker Clarence Burton and Senate President Ben Mussa spoke in favor of the bill.

Barton said confusion over title has hindered port development. He said the submerged lands are relatively worthless until they are built up, and the bill would encourage development.

Mussa said the matter of clear title was of "great urgency" for developments along the Columbia River, such as at Arlington.

Rep. William Holmstrom, D-Gearhart, said the title problem was delaying efforts to find a use for the abandoned Tongue Point Naval Station.

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
