

Man Judged Not Guilty Of Car Use

Russell Loren Obrenski, 18, was judged not guilty by a Klamath County jury on the charge of taking and using an automobile without authority, it developed late Friday in the circuit court of Judge David R. Vandenberg.

The jury of seven men and five women deliberated three hours and 27 minutes before returning the not guilty verdict to Judge Vandenberg at 6 p.m. The vote was 10-2 with one man and one woman juror opposing the majority.

Obrenski had been accused of the charge by William O. Stephenson, after he allegedly took the car last Jan. 23 and drove to Worden in the company of another youth and two girls.

The car was later damaged when the driver drove it into a ditch about three miles north of Worden.

During the trial, Obrenski testified that he had used the car on other occasions without Stephenson's consent and the latter had not objected.

Trio Jailed In Robbery

OREGON CITY (UPI) — Three men were jailed here today charged with assault and robbery by force and violence following the hold-up of the Maple Grove Grocery Store.

The three men were captured about 45 minutes after the robbery.

They were identified as James Brown Williams, 54, Cleo Turner, 39, and Olden Summerfield, 39, all Portland.

A trio entered the store Saturday and demanded cash from Henry Fiesel, operator of the store. Fiesel was being beaten by the robbers when a bakery route salesman, Robert Otherson, Portland, entered the store.

The holdup men made a break for a car and a chase ensued.

Balloonists Set Record

CALAIS, France (UPI) — Two intrepid Americans crossed the channel from England in an onion-shaped hot air balloon Saturday, landing at this French coastal city after a tricky flight which caused concern for their safety.

Ed Yost, 43, and Don Piccard, 38, both of Sioux Falls, S. D., piloted their strange craft from near Rye, in the southeast corner of England, to claim the first such crossing by a hot air balloon.

The airline distance of 50 miles was traversed by the balloon, which is 50 feet in diameter, in less than three hours.

Residents of the coastal village of Dungeness, in southeastern England, had reported seeing a "parachute" leave the balloon. The "parachute" was believed a cluster of sandbags dropped to lighten the craft.

But the reports touched off an air-sea search from both sides of the English channel.

The balloon took off in a westerly wind with the Union Jack, the Stars and Stripes and the French Tri-Color flapping in the wind.

The balloon is equipped with a burner which is kept lighted constantly. The balloonists turned up the burner when they wanted to climb and turned it down to descend.

Pope Tells World Good Start Made For Peace

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — Pope John XXIII told the world in an Easter message Saturday that "nothing is easy" but that "a good start already has been made" on the road to peace.

Speaking slowly and firmly in Italian, the 81-year-old pontiff was optimistic as his words were beamed around the world by the powerful Vatican Radio. The speech, previously recorded on film Tuesday, was televised simultaneously in 14 nations over a Eurovision Network hookup. He showed no signs of the tiredness that marked some of his other Holy Week appearances.

"True progress in brotherhood and peace is possible," the Pope said. "A good start already has been made and this should encourage all to continue and to have confidence."

The overall theme of the Pope's Easter message was the need for peace among men and nations, the same idea that marked his historic encyclical "Pacem in Terris," peace on earth, dated Thursday and released last Wednesday.

Vatican sources explained earlier that, while the Pope had appeared pale and noticeably tired several times during the week, he simply had fatigued himself with the hectic round of public ceremonies associated with Holy Week.

There was no indication that he is suffering from a recurrence of gastric trouble or the anemia that put him to bed last November.

Before his annual Easter message was released, the Pope held a special audience in the Sistine Chapel Saturday morning for a group of about 1,000 French students, from the "Centre Richelieu" in Paris and appeared fit.

The Pope's appearance dissipated some of the concern over his health which had mingled with the last day of the solemn and sad events of Holy Week which will be capped with the joyful feast of Easter Sunday morning.

The dirges will become hosannas Sunday when the church bells of Rome proclaim the resurrection of Christ, but worry over the 81-year-old pontiff's health was likely to linger long after the traditional white doves of Easter vanish into the Roman sky.

Pope John, looking weary and weak, was supported on either side by attendants Friday night when he knelt to kiss a crucifix in a Good Friday rite in St. Peter's Basilica.

He did not go barefoot as in past years, and he inexplicably stood when others knelt and sat when others stood.

Although there has been no indication the Pope is actually ill, he has shown signs of fatigue and weakness on three public appearances during Holy Week—on Palm Sunday, at a reception for foreign diplomats Thursday night and again Friday.

The annual mourning of Christ's death on the cross, which started with Good Friday services, continued all day Saturday. Altars are bare, bells are silent and sacred images are draped in purple.

The morning ends at midnight, when bells ring out at the end of the Easter vigil, the organ is played and sacred images are unveiled to celebrate Christ's rising from the dead.

Reno Murder Suspect Held

RENO, Nev. (UPI) — Police Saturday night climaxed an intense, week-long manhunt with the arrest of a teen-aged boy as the prime suspect in the slaying of former British ski star Sonja Meekie, whose dismembered body was found strewn around her apartment.

The suspect was identified as Thomas Bean, 18, Reno. He was arrested after a bullet-punctured chase outside the police station.

The six-foot, 145-pound youth, wearing a sports jacket and slacks and manacled with handcuffs at the wrists, refused to talk to newsmen after authorities disclosed the arrest.

"I am definitely satisfied this is the man," said District Attorney William Raggio. "He is going to assist us in further investigation of the case."

Miss Meekie, 24, a lithe, blue-eyed young woman who worked as a secretary for a local meat packing plant and spent her weekends as a ski instructor, was killed sometime on Thursday or Friday of last week. The willowy blonde was a member of Great Britain's skiing team at the Squaw Valley Olympics in 1960.

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Main Street Card Game Raided By City Police

Complaints received by the district attorney's office of gambling at The Billiards, 630 Main Street, resulted in a raid of the establishment by city police about 10:30 p.m., Friday, and netted five officers two dealers and five players engaged in a game of "four-card hokey." District Attorney Dale Crabtree disclosed Saturday.

Police confiscated the cards, money, and poker chips used in the game and removed the "hokey" players to the city jail, where they were booked and released on \$150 bail each.

Arraignments of those arrested are expected to proceed Monday, Crabtree said.

Two of the seven men were charged with conducting a gambling game, while the other five were accused of playing in such a game. The latter number includes Leonard Padilla, 2869 Homedale Road; Woodrow Phillips, 6950 Calvin Drive, Citrus Heights, Calif.; Alfred Panter, 952 Oak Avenue; George Louisgiant, 1183 California Avenue and Marvin Talley, 4000 Austin Street.

Charged with directing the card game were the dealers, Douglas Brumley, 536 Pine Street, and Oliver Lesh, 718 North Tenth Street.

As a result of the raid, a warrant was issued by the district attorney on noon, Saturday, charging Bruce Houck and Paula Houck, owners of the establishment, with permitting gambling in a building.

The Billiards is one of eight businesses in Klamath Falls which obtained licenses to operate card tables in the city this year, Crabtree said, following the raid, that earlier this year representatives of his office had advised the owners of the establishments that procurement of a city license did not entitle them to conduct gambling games.

They were warned that the district attorney's office would "prosecute if evidence was discovered that gambling was being permitted in any of the businesses," Crabtree said.

Reds Launch Space Ship

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet Union launched another unmanned artificial satellite Saturday the official Tass news agency reported.

Tass said the new satellite is named Cosmos 14. It said it is carrying scientific equipment "designed to continue the study of outer space."

The new satellite was put into orbit with an initial rotation period of 92.1 minutes and a top elevation or apogee of 323.54 miles, Tass said.

It was the third known unmanned space shot by the Soviets this year.

On March 21, the Russians launched Cosmos 13 as an earth satellite.

Lunik 4 was shot into space on April 2 as a moon probe. It passed within 5,270 miles of the moon on April 6 and then went into orbit around the earth. The Russians said it later will be pulled into an orbit around the sun.

Tass said the lowest point—or perigee—in the orbit of Cosmos 14 is 164 miles from the earth, with the satellite angled at 48 degrees 57 minutes to the equator.

Man Indicted

EUGENE (UPI) — Richard Shepherd, 22, Klamath Falls, was indicted by the Lane County grand jury Friday on a charge of armed robbery.

Shepherd is accused of holding up Sherm's 24-hour Market at Eugene Tuesday and taking \$106. He was arrested at Salem Wednesday.

He is being held on \$10,000 bail here.

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
