Sea Styles Are Landed

Seagoing fashions turn amphibious this spring and make the transition to beach and cabana landlubbers.

The nautical look, translated into new designs in the seaman's traditional navy blue denim, is evident in pants, shorts, tops and bathing suits.

Pants and shorts designs are influenced by blue jeans, a favorite boating garment. Witness traditional jeans of knee-skimming length as well as other short blue jeans, some with pinked-edge pants legs for the "real cut-off" look.

Bell bottoms emerge in full swing in the form of authentic blue denim sailor's pants with back-face ties and front panel buttons.

The midriff middy, a shirt that ties in a square knot at the front, and the V-neck pullover middy in the rugged blue fabric are detailed with red or white stitching. Serving a dual purpose of fashion and function are denim sailing parkas and jackets.

The blue jeans look in bathing suits and beach dresses takes on accents in calico and gingham. Navy denim hipslung shorts, piped in bright calico, are coordinated with matching calico tops. Contrasting print trims are seen on denim shifts and tent dresses.

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
