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Pants Becoming Classic For American Women

DALLAS, Tex. (UPI) — The warm climate of the Southwest helped to turn the cool shirtwaist cotton dress into an American classic. Now, it's doing the same for pants, which appear in the new summer collections from Texas manufacturers in as many variations as there are tall stories in these parts.

One manufacturer participating in the 13th annual press week sponsored for visiting reporters by the Texas Fashion Creators Association, said she was making feminine trousers in 15 variations from the short short to ankle length, with something called the "Jambuda" in between. The last was manufacturer Rose Sinkin's name for shorts at mid-thigh length, somewhere between the Jamaica and Bermuda lengths.

Mrs. Sinkin, president of Fem Form of San Antonio, specializes in pants and culottes and said she sells between 100,000 and 125,000 pairs of trousers yearly.

She advocated a wardrobe of trousers for the woman "pants

weaver," the same way a white collar girl or traveler assembles office or travel wardrobe. "The pants wearer will own from eight to 10 pairs for every occasion from golfing to sort of cocktailing," she said.

Newest in the divided skirt line is the "knee tickler," as some manufacturers call this culotte which ends two to three inches above the knee. It's popular with the high school and college set and, combined with black saddle shoes or loafers, has become practically a uniform on some campuses.

To top these numerous trouser or culotte variations in collections shown Monday were shirt blouses in bold prints or polka dots, designed to be worn tucked in at the waist or left on the outside.

Many of the tops were nautical in natural, with middie collars and sailor ties at the front.

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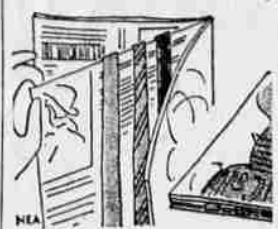

To avoid such a mistake with our twins, we had them vaccinated on opposite arms instead of both on the left arm as is usually

DEAR POLLY—As thanks for all the wonderful hints that you have printed for us, I have some that might help others. The next time you pack a suitcase for your husband, place his neckties over the center page of a magazine. Close the magazine and pack it flat at the bottom of the case to prevent marred or creased ties.

To prevent coat hangers from interlocking, separate them with big discs cut from stiff cardboard. But a center hole to fit over the clothes rod and slit the disc so that it will slip over the rod.

When crocheting or tatting, stick a hatpin firmly into the arm of an upholstered chair and slip the spool of thread over the pin. This will prevent the spool from falling to the floor, yet permit it to rotate freely as you work.

If several carbon copies are being made on the typewriter, slip the end of the sheets and the carbons under the flap of a large envelope to guide them evenly into the machine.—MRS. J.W.A.

DEAR POLLY—A beach jacket for a small tot can be easily made from a Turkish towel. Fold it in half crossways and mark the center of the fold. Then open and fold the long way. Cut along this fold up to the middle mark which will be the neckline. Cut out a small circle for the neck. Bind the edges with bias binding.
