Wm. Wales Dies Here On April 11

William Lovell Wales Sr., a resident of Klamath Falls since 1924, died April 11 at Hillside Hospital. He was 76.

Mr. Wales was a native of Riverside, Calif., born June 19, 1886.

He was schooled in Riverside for his life career in engineering.

Mr. Wales was a registered professional engineer in Oregon and California. Prior to coming to Klamath Falls he was field engineer for the Pacific Gas and Electric Co., chief engineer for the Yolo Water and Power Co., and had a consulting practice in Woodland, Calif. He continued his consulting practice here until his death.

He was primarily engaged in irrigation and drainage work on the agricultural lands of Jackson, Klamath and Lake counties in Oregon and Siskiyou and Modoc counties in California. He pioneered the use of many techniques now considered standard for irrigation and is well-known throughout the states of Oregon, California and Nevada for his engineering achievements in this field.

He was a member of the San Francisco Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution. Mr. Wales was married on Oct. 1, 1913, to Sarah Mabel Pierce of Oakland, Calif., who died March 5, 1958.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. R. E. (Barbara) Lieutallen, wife of chancellor of the Oregon State Board of Higher Education, and Mrs. R. L. (Charlotte) Worstell, both of Eugene; one son, William Wales Jr., of Klamath Falls; also nine grandchildren.

Services will be Monday, April 15, 10:30 a.m. from Ward's Klamath Falls Funeral Home with Rev. Robert L. Greene, of St. Paul's Episcopal Church officiating.

Police Hunt Jewel Thief

NEW BRUNSWICK, N.J. (UPI)—Police today sought a thief who stole about \$25,000 worth of uncut gems from Rutgers University, which if cut correctly could be worth \$100,000.

One of the stones was a six-sided emerald of several hundred karats, for which Rutgers once had been offered \$14,000. The stone, about 1.5 inches wide, is the largest emerald ever taken from the Muzo mines in Colombia, South America.

Professor Helgi Johnson of the university Geology Department said, "A representative of the mine once jokingly said the stone could be cut into \$60,000 worth of emeralds. It wouldn't be fair to quote him as saying that, because he was joking, but the stone was worth a considerable amount of money."

The emerald was a part of the Albert Chester collection, willed to the university 60 years ago by the famed geologist's widow.

Another of the missing stones is an aquamarine worth about \$4,000 in its uncut state.

Johnson said he discovered an unknown number of stones missing from mineral cases in the unguarded Rutgers University museum Friday.

Health Officials Seek Highly Dangerous Tuna

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Health officials in six cities Saturday searched grocery market shelves for contaminated, "highly dangerous" tuna fish labeled "kosher for Passover" under the Dagim Taborin brand.

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) Friday warned consumers not to eat any tuna fish from cans bearing a red and white label reading in part "Dagim-white tuna-kosher for Passover—net wt. 7 oz." or those with blue and white labels of the Dagim company.

Each suspect can is embossed with the codes "WY2" or "WY3", the FDA said. Shipments from the Brooklyn distributor have been delivered in New York, Pittsburgh, Chicago, Cleveland, Detroit and Augusta, Ga.

FDA Commissioner George P. Larrick said the tuna was packed by the Washington Packing Corp., San Francisco, Calif. This was the same firm which packed the tuna that was found contaminated and responsible for the deaths of two Detroit women in March.

An FDA spokesman urged the public to examine all cans of tuna for the codes, especially cans sold in stores dealing in kosher foods. FDA officials said it was possible, but unlikely, that shipments of the contaminated tuna went to other cities.

The FDA said that since the Michigan incident, it has been examining tuna fish canned by the Washington Packing Co. "So far, contamination has been found only in defective cans—those bulging or leaking," it said.

The Detroit women—Mrs. Margaret McCarthy, 39, and Mrs. Collette Brown, 37—died, Larrick said, from eating tuna contaminated with type E botulinus toxin.

That particular tuna had been distributed by the A&P Co.

The FDA warning Friday brought immediate action from

health officials in the six cities. New York: Dagim Taborin notified its customers not to sell any of the tuna fish bearing the "WY3" code. Tuna cans marked with the number had been delivered to 111 grocers in the city. Health officials said more than 2,500 cases of the fish already had been seized.

Pittsburgh: Local FDA officials said the only local distributor, Joseph Frishman, had sold 30 persons cans that might have been contaminated and that at least half the customers had been alerted.

Chicago: Local Board of Health officials seized 15 cases containing 720 cans of the suspect tuna, but records showed that three cases containing 144 cans had been sold. Officials notified Jewish congregations in the area to be on the lookout for the cans and to hand them over to health authorities.

Cleveland: The FDA located one store in the area which had sold 148 cans of the possibly contaminated tuna, but no food poisoning had been reported.

Detroit: Health officials announced that all suspected cans of the tuna will be pulled off the shelves during a weekend hunt.

Augusta, Ga.: Grocers reported they had warned their customers of the potential danger in consuming the particular brand of tuna, and removed supplies from view.

Probe Traps Collegian

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (UPI)—A pretty good whose arrest touched off an intense narcotics investigation at Indiana University has been suspended from classes. The action was announced Friday night as authorities probed reports of a flourishing business in which narcotics were sold directly on campus and used at parties on university grounds.

At least a dozen students were reportedly involved.

The investigation followed the arrest Thursday night of Miss Nancy C. Dillingham, 21, of Bloomington, on preliminary charges of violating the Indiana law prohibiting possession of marijuana.

Monroe County Prosecutor Thomas Hoadley said the marijuana was supplied by a "Chicago syndicate."

He said Miss Dillingham was arrested on a tip from an informant who said marijuana could be found in her apartment. He said \$50 in raw marijuana was found in cans and coffee jars there.

Police said they found a note reading: "Nancy, here is your week's supply." The note was signed "Fritz."

The signer was identified by Hoadley as Fritz Fisher Jr., a graduate student at Indiana University and member of last year's Ohio State diving team.

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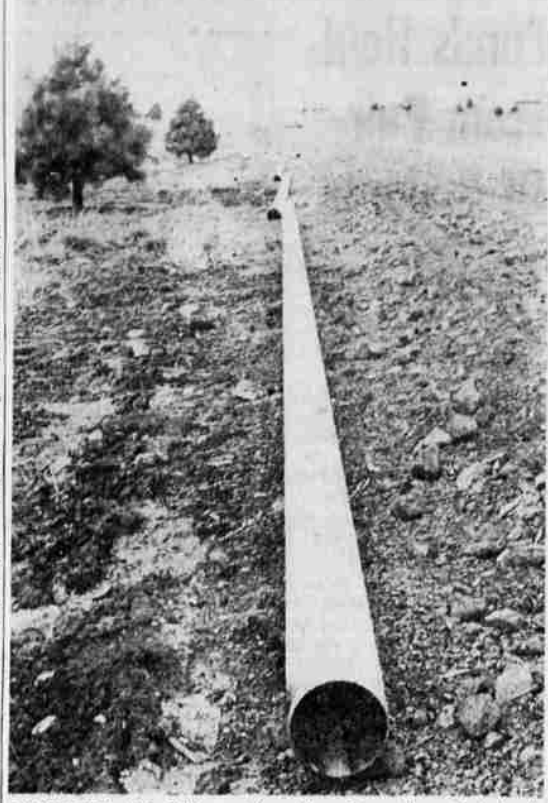
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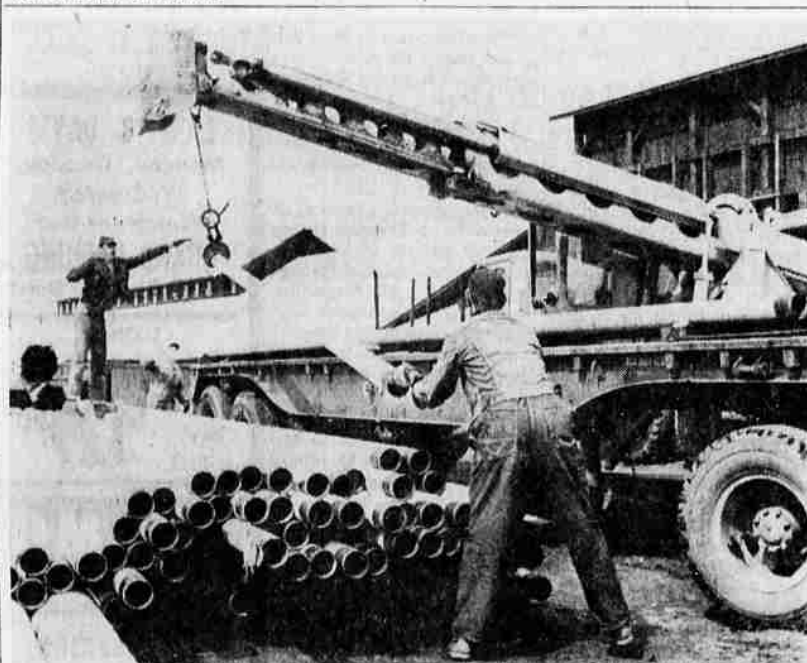

10 Nations Expected To Join Inter-Allied Nuclear Force

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The United States expects a 10-nation NATO nuclear force to be operational under the supreme Allied commander in Europe, U.S. Gen. Lyman L. Lemnitzer, within a year, it was disclosed Saturday.

It will be known as the "Inter-Allied Nuclear Force" (IANF). U.S. sources said it will consist of British nuclear bombers, three U.S. Polaris missile submarines, and striking elements of eight other NATO countries which have or are to receive American atomic weapons to arm their forces in event of war.

The French contribution will be limited to two fighter-bomber squadrons based in Germany. President Charles de Gaulle refuses to permit any U.S. nuclear weapons on French soil.

Council Meeting Upcoming
Composition of the IANF was among the subjects discussed by Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Allied representatives in Paris earlier this week. Gen. Lemnitzer's staff has been given the job of working out coordination and targeting arrangements. The NATO council meeting in Ottawa, Canada, in late May is expected to ratify the arrangements.

U.S. sources, attempting to

clear up public confusion over NATO nuclear planning, said the IANF was entirely separate from the "multilateral NATO nuclear force" now under discussion. If this latter force ever comes into being, it will be a sort of NATO navy paid for and manned by personnel from as many countries as wish to contribute men and money. It, too, would be under the supreme Allied commander.

Russia has protested all NATO nuclear force planning as likely to increase the peril of nuclear war. The United States, after discussing the Soviet protest with other allies, is expected within the next week to reject the complaint. U.S. officials view creation of the IANF as being principally a military rather than political affair, since it is being put together under existing treaty arrangements.

Contributions Agreed
The British and American contributions were agreed upon by President Kennedy and Prime Minister Harold Macmillan at their Nassau meeting in December. At that time the United States planned to assign some of its strategic bombers to the force but recently decided to substitute the three Polaris submarines.

5-Mile Gas Pipe Laying Job Starts

Five miles of main for natural gas service to industrial users in the Pelican City and northern areas of the city are being laid by the California-Pacific Utilities Company.

The line will extend from Alameda to Biehn Street up Kit Carson Way, then into the Pelican City area. The line will be a six-inch line to Montelius, four-inch line to Lakeport with plans for a two-inch line for residential users.

Bud Stump, Klamath Falls pipe line and excavating contractor, will be doing the job. Completion of the line will take about four months.

E. Mullis, district manager for California-Pacific Utilities, said that a line survey is now in progress in the south suburban district and it is expected that as soon as the survey is completed, construction of the natural gas line in that area will begin.

This line will serve residential, commercial and industrial customers in the southern part of Klamath Falls.

Estimated cost of the present pipe-laying project has been set at \$130,000.

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J. Stevenson, Rancher, Dies After Long Illness

James Clifford Stevenson, 71, well-known Southern Oregon rancher and stockman, died April 12, in Hillside Hospital. He had been in failing health for some time.

He was a native of Calhoun, Neb., born Nov. 1, 1891. He came to San Francisco in 1906 and to Merrill in 1911. The following year on June 19 he was married to Juanita Rathliff of Merrill.

Mr. Stevenson worked for the late Eugene M. Hammond and J. Frank Adams soon after arriving. Later he worked for the United States Bureau of Reclamation helping to build the irrigation laterals at Adams Point, prior to the first Tulelake homestead drawing on the Oregon side of the line in 1917. He owned the second truck in Klamath County and hauled wool.

Mr. and Mrs. Stevenson homesteaded near Tulelake in 1927 and after accumulating large ranch interests, raised livestock. He showed registered quarter horses in cutting, winning first places and championship in the Northwest.

At one time he owned the well-known Meiss ranch near Macdonald. He was reared in the Presbyterian faith, was a member of the Merrill Odd Fellows lodge, Modern Woodmen, and the Klamath County Sheriff's posse.

Funeral services are in charge of O'Hair's Memorial Chapel and will be held at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday, April 16, from the Merrill Presbyterian Church. Final rites in the Odd Fellows Cemetery in Merrill. Friends who wish to do so may contribute to the Intercommunity Hospital fund.

Sgt. Alvin York Said 'Critical'
NASHVILLE, Tenn. (UPI)—World War One hero Sgt. Alvin York was in critical condition at St. Thomas Hospital Saturday, suffering from possible pneumonia or a heart attack.

Members of his family were summoned. York arrived here from his home in Pall Mall by ambulance Saturday morning. He was released from the hospital just two weeks ago after treatment for a "slight" heart condition.

Doctors said the Medal of Honor winner was in good condition until Friday when he developed severe shoulder, chest and back pains. Medicine failed to relieve the pain and he was rushed to the hospital.

Man Wounded
THE DALLES (UPI)—Edward Biasig, 31, was listed in critical condition today from a bullet wound in the neck suffered during an argument at Rufus, 30 miles east of here, Tuesday.

Sherman County Sheriff Leo Roberts said Biasig was shot during an argument with Dolphus Baker, 48, Rufus, in front of Baker's garage. Baker told the sheriff the shooting was in self defense. No charge was filed.

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
