Oregon Tech Splits Pair With Eastern Oregon College

The Oregon Tech Owls, reversing their form almost completely from Friday's trouncing by Eastern Oregon College, gained a split in a doubleheader at Gem Stadium.

The Owls won the opening game, 6-2, behind the masterful pitching job of Jim Keller, and dropped the second game, 3-2, in an extra inning despite another very fine pitching performance by Dave Ferres. The split Saturday left the Owls with a 1-2 Oregon Collegiate Conference record and a 1-2-1 season record.

Coach Jim Partlow's troops had looked terribly green in the 13-2 trouncing they took Friday afternoon in which they committed eight errors. But the tide changed in the opening game Saturday as Keller handcuffed the heavy-hitting Mountaineers on six hits.

The Owls had their chances in the second game to get the win but failed at the plate on sacrifice situations and some mental errors.

The Mountaineers jumped off to a first inning lead in the first game of the twin-bill. Ray Strong looked at Keller's third strike pitch but Keller walked Don Nelson. He took third on Merle Hart's single and came home on a single to center by second sacker Duke Feigner. The Owls then pulled off a double play to halt that rally.

They rallied in their half of the frame to tie the game. Shortstop Bob Yuncle led off with a double to the fence in left field. He scored when Curt Graf, second sacker, laced a double at the same spot Yuncle put his. Mary Edwards lined out to left, John Crumrine lined out to second and Don Gredsel popped up to end the threat.

But the Owls came back in the third to tally twice. Catcher Rich Fandrey led off the inning with a walk and Yuncle got his second hit on a single. Graf singled to score Fandrey and Yuncle was on third. He tallied when Feigner errored at second. Crumrine singled but Graf was cut down on a great throw by the Mountaineer centerfielder.

The Owls got another score in the fourth. After one was out, Ferres drew a walk and was balked to second. Keller popped out for the second out and Fandrey singled to left to chase Ferres home.

Eastern Oregon rallied slightly in the fifth when Dale Fick reached first on an error. He was singled to third by pitcher John Shippertower and scored on Nelson's sacrifice fly.

The Owls put the game out of reach in the sixth with their

final two runs. Gredsel led off with a blooming double and Ed Appleman popped out. Ferres laced a single to right to score Gredsel and Keller drove a triple to deep centerfield to plate Ferres.

Ray Strong, who had been playing shortstop for the Mountaineers in the two previous games and giving the Owls fits

with his glove and bat, came on to pitch the second game. He also tallied two of the three runs. He opened the game on a walk, stole second, got third on a walk, pitched and scored on Hart's sacrifice fly ball to deep center.

Oregon Tech, who couldn't seem to solve the dinky curve of Strong's, didn't get going until the fourth when they took a 2-1

lead. Graf led off with an infield single and Edwards struck out. Crumrine drew a walk and Gredsel lacked only inches of putting one out of the park when he blasted a double off the left field fence to score Graf. But the fielder's throw caught Crumrine at the plate and that out cost the Owls' dearly as it turned out. Gredsel scored on a single

to right by Appleman for the 2-1 lead.

Strong came on strong in the fifth for the Mountaineers. He singled to left with one out after fouling off several pitches. He got second on an infield out and raced home on a blooming single by Feigner for the tying run.

The Owls had their chance in the sixth. Graf drew a walk to

lead off but Edwards failed on two attempts to lay the bunt down for the sacrifice and finally struck out. Crumrine struck out behind him and Gredsel slashed and over the leftfield barrier with one out. The Owls went down in order in their half of the eighth.

They will take on Oregon College of Education in three games next Friday and Saturday at Gem Stadium.

Neither club could pick up a score in the seventh so the game went into an extra inning. This proved the undoing as Feigner belted one of Ferres' offerings over the leftfield barrier with one out. The Owls went down in order in their half of the eighth.

Pelican Thinclads Ninth In Relays

EUGENE — The Klamath Union track team finished ninth in the Metropolitan class of the Hayward Relays at Hayward Field here Saturday in taking one first place on Walt Smith's javelin win.

Grants Pass surprised by winning the meet with 48 points. Medford, the other Southern Oregon Conference competitor, finished in a tie for third and fourth with North Salem. Klamath had 13 points.

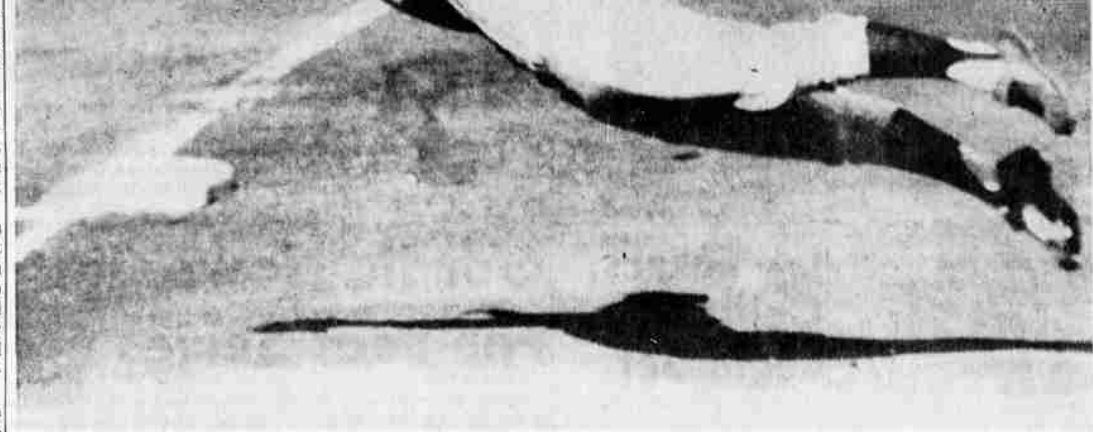
"It was nice weather when we started. But it started pouring when the running events started and continued off and on throughout the meet," Coach Jack Peterson said.

"We improved in most categories and the competition was very tough here. We weren't bad, but we weren't good enough, either," he said.

Smith got the only first place for the Pelicans with a 181 foot, six inch javelin throw. It was good enough to win but still not his best toss of the season. The field was muddy, however, and it was difficult for good footing on the approach.

Bill Mills pulled down a fifth spot in the discus with a heave of 132-9 which is below his best effort, also. The 440-yard relay team also capped a fifth place with a clocking of 4:57 on the slow track. The team was composed of Grover Dahm, Terry Eccles, Chuck Mills and Arie DeGroot.

The broad jump relay team of Dahm, Eccles and Gerritt DeGroot capped another fifth place and was a bit disappointing to Peterson. The high jump relay team finished sixth with Eccles, Fred Kelley and Dick Scott competing. Scott, however, wasn't

Owl's Six-Man Track Team Wins Bend Invitational Meet Easily

BEND — The Oregon Tech track team, consisting of only six members, mopped up on four other schools here Saturday afternoon in winning the Central Oregon College Invitational with 36 1/2 points.

The Owls won by a big margin over the other four teams. COC was second, SOC third, CCC fourth and Cascade College fifth.

The Klamath Basin Track and Field Club scored 39 points

and were beginning to get pretty tired. Some of them came from running one event and got right into the blocks to run another.

Coach Larry Burleson stated, "If we placed these kids in their specialties and let them compete in only that event or events, they would have had some very good marks." Burleson continued.

Bob Bryant won the high jump and Wayne Dennis was second. Willie Anderson tied Dennis for the high jump mark while competing for the Klamath Basin Track and Field Club but his points didn't count. The Oregon Tech boys quit at 5:45 after winning it and attempted to save their energy for the other events.

Maricich tied for first in the broad jump with a leap of 20-10. Bryant was second. Anderson jumped 21-3/4 to win unofficially.

Cecil started his string with a victory in the shot which he hurled 40 feet which was good enough to win. Chard was right behind Cecil in second place.

Chard took the discus throw with a heave of 124 feet with Cecil coming in third. Roger Paddock, another Klamath Basin member, was second with no points. Chard also grabbed the javelin victory with a throw of 178 feet which set a new school record. Cecil was second in this event.

Dennis finished third in the 100-yard low hurdles. Anderson again was tops in this event with a very fine 25 flat clocking. John Hill, a Klamath Basin teammate of Anderson's, had a 26-1 timing.

Cecil also beat out Maricich in the 100-yard dash in 10:2. Both were clocked in 10:2 but neither was pushing. Cecil won by a hair. He also took the 220-yard dash in a fine time of 22:2. Maricich was third and Anderson was clocked a step behind Cecil in 22:3.

Bryant came right off one running event to take a second in the half mile run in a clocking of 2:10. The relay team finished second in 3:40 despite running the hurdles event and with big Chard running a leg. They were still only about five seconds off the school record despite all this.

"The track was a little wet and we were pretty tired, but all in all I'd say the kids did a good job," Burleson said.

SEATTLE (UPI)—The Seattle Totem Saturday night downed the Vancouver Canucks 6-3 behind a near-capacity crowd of 3,945.

The game left the Canucks with a 2-1 edge in the best four of seven game series for the Western Hockey League's Northern Division championship.

Seattle took a 1-0 lead in the first period, and each team scored twice in the second, bringing the score to 3-2.

Seattle continued its barrage of shots in the third period and picked up three more goals to Vancouver's one.

Referee Scotty Morrison whistled off two goals in the third period. He said one Vancouver goal was kicked in and that one by Seattle hit the post and failed to cross the red line.

California Trips UCLA

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI)—California's depth overcame an outstanding four-victory performance by C. K. Yang Saturday, to handily defeat UCLA 86-59 in a dual track meet on rain-soaked Edwards Field.

Yang, the finest decathlon competitor in the world today, set a new meet record of 15 feet 3/4 inches in the pole vault. The old record of 14 feet 8 1/2 inches was set in 1958 by UCLA's George Roubanis.

The redoubtable Yang also took the 120 high hurdles in 14.9 seconds; the javelin with a throw of 207 feet; and the broadjump with a leap of 23 feet 6 inches.

Sophomore Dave Archibald was California's only double winner. He scored in the 440 and 220 yard dashes, with respective times of 47.9 and 21.9 seconds.

Maloney Named Most Valuable

SEATTLE (UPI)—Vancouver's Phil Maloney, the veteran Western Hockey League center who seems to improve with age, edged Guyle Fielder of Seattle Friday in voting for the Most Valuable Player in the WHL.

Maloney polled 369 points in the voting to 333 for Fielder and 111 for third-place Gilles Villemure, the Vancouver goalie.

It was the second time Maloney garnered the MVP award. He won it first in 1956.

Terrell Upsets Williams In Heavyweight Contest

PHILADELPHIA (UPI)—Ernie Terrell, a 2-1 underdog from Philadelphia, shot into heavyweight prominence Saturday night when he pounced out a split 10-round decision over Cleveland Williams in a return match between the world's tallest heavyweights.

Terrell, weighing 196 1/2 pounds to 210 for Williams, a Texan from Houston who is ranked No. 4 in the heavyweight division, fought back from a cut over the right

eye to pull his nationally televised upset.

A TKO victim of the 30-year-old Williams in the initial meeting one year ago, Terrell slit his opponent's left eye in the sixth, put a "mouse" over it in the seventh and then cut his right eye in the ninth.

Terrell, who stands a skyscraping 6-foot-6, two inches taller than Williams, won the arena match on the votes of referee Pete Tomasco and judge Jack Styles, each of whom gave him 46 points against 44 for the Texan. The other judge, Pete Pantalone, scored it 46-44 for Williams under Pennsylvania's five-point-must-ten.

L&C's Goddard Up For Post

PORTLAND (UPI)—Lewis and Clark coach Jim Goddard is one of three men still being considered for the basketball coaching job at the University of Idaho, a Portland newspaper said Saturday.

The Oregonian said an unnamed source in Moscow, Idaho, confirmed that Goddard was interviewed Friday. It said Idaho's new coach probably will be announced Monday.

The other two finalists for the job reportedly are Jack Spencer, head coach at Nevada, and Frank Gompert, an assistant at Iowa State. The coaching vacancy was created when Joe Cipriano resigned to become head coach at Nebraska.

Goddard, a Lewis and Clark graduate, coached the Pioneers to Northwest Conference championships for the past two years. His 1962-63 club reached the quarterfinals of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics Tournament at Kansas City, Mo.

Pels Win First In 11 Innings

CENTRAL POINT—The Klamath Union Pelican baseball team apparently used up what they had in winning the first half of a doubleheader with the Crater Comets Saturday in 11 innings, 6-4, because they lost a lead in the second and were beaten the first time in league play, 5-4.

The split with the pesky Comets left the Pelicans with a 4-1 league record and a 5-2 season mark. The Pelicans went into the game with a four-game winning streak and they stretched it to five before losing the second contest.

The first game was an 11-inning marathon which found the Pelicans fight back with a sixth inning rally to tie the game and go into the extra frames to win it. Rich Jackson, who came on in relief of Gary Benson, was the winner. Benson relieved Jackson in the second game and absorbed the loss.

The game was won in the 11th frame with a two run rally which began when Rick Horn, who replaced Larry Binney in rightfield in the fifth inning, led off with a walk. He was sacrificed to second by Lanny Guyer, fielder Larry Smith plated him with a single for the margin.

But the Pels went on to score another run in that inning. Smith stole second base and scored on Rich Bath's single. Bath had relieved Toma Osa in left field in the seventh inning.

The game opened with Crater chalking up a run in the first inning. Mike Glines, third baseman, grounded out but Lou Alvarez singled and moved to second when Darrell Summerfield, Comet catcher, walked. He took third on an infield out and scored on Pat Pepper's single.

The Pelicans bounced back to knot the score in the third when pitcher Benson drew a walk. He was sacrificed to second Smith and moved to third on a fielder's choice play. Shortstop Mike Kitching drove him across the plate with a single to left.

The Comets blazed off ahead in their half of the third. Summerfield led off with a single and Jones walked him to second. Pepper singled again to plate Summerfield. Kilbourn singled after one was out to single both Jones and Pepper for three runs.
