Board Orders 'Proof'

ATLANTA (UPI) — The executive committee of the Southeastern Conference Saturday directed Commissioner Bernie Moore to continue an investigation into the Wally Butts-Paul Bryant case until a "positive conclusion can be reached."

The action by the committee came during an unannounced, closed door meeting in Atlanta. The committee met here to examine the findings of Georgia Atty. Gen. Eugene Cook's investigation into a magazine report that Butts, then director of athletics, and Bryant, coach at Alabama, conspired to rig last fall's Alabama-Georgia game which Alabama won 35 to 0.

Both Butts and Bryant have denied the report. Butts has sued the Saturday Evening Post for \$10 million in a libel action and Bryant has sued the magazine for \$5 million.

The committee said Saturday that it has determined that there was a telephone conversation between Butts and Bryant on Sept. 11, 1962.

Neither Butts nor Bryant have denied that they talked in a telephone conversation but deny that the conversation was anything more than normal chit-chat between two coaches.

Moore issued this statement at the conclusion of the meeting: "The executive committee of the Southeastern Conference has examined the results of the investigation of the published charges of a 'football fix' by the Saturday Evening Post involving Wallace Butts, former athletic director of the University of Georgia and Coach Paul Bryant of Alabama."

LA Lakers, Celtics Begin Set

BOSTON (UPI) — The champion Boston Celtics and the challenging Los Angeles Lakers go at it again Sunday night for the right to rule over the National Basketball Association.

The Celtics, winners in four straight playoff rounds, automatically assumed the favorite's role and hosted the home court advantage with the first two, fifth and seventh games, if necessary, all scheduled here.

The Lakers, with Jerry West back in good condition, had to go the seven game distance to eliminate the St. Louis Hawks while the Celtics were fighting off Cincinnati's determined Royals in preliminary play.

One of the biggest questions for the final playoffs was the identity of the officials, a closely-guarded secret right up to game time. An age-old verbal war between Boston Coach Red Auerbach and NBA officiating chief Sid Borgia flared up again last week. Auerbach charged that boxing rings should be installed for games worked by Borgia and said it was the veteran official's "ambition" to work a game in which the Celtics lose their long-standing championship role.

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Gordie Howe Set For Leaf Series

DETROIT (UPI) — Gordie Howe, the man who makes the Detroit Red Wings go, will be "100 per cent" Sunday night when the National Hockey League's come-from-behind team shoots for the start of another of its miracle finishes.

Red Wings manager-coach Sid Abel says that Howe will be in peak shape in the third game of the Stanley Cup final playoffs at Olympia with the Toronto Maple Leafs.

Toronto, which won the regular season title by a point over Chicago and five points ahead of fourth place Detroit, took a 2-0 lead in the best of seven series by recording triumphs on Maple Leaf ice Tuesday and Thursday.

Although Howe scored both of Detroit's goals in the 4-2 losing effort Thursday, the 17-year NHL veteran was sluggish because an attack of the flu and lacked his usual zip.

"Man, I was tired at the end," Howe said after the game.

But Abel said that Howe has recovered and he'll be ready to go at his usual pace in the crucial third game.

Abel also said the rest of the team is in top shape for the game. "We didn't hit anybody hard enough to get any injuries," he remarked wryly.

Detroit was at this same juncture in the semifinal series with Chicago. The Wings lost the first two games on Chicago ice and then swept the final four games to win the series going away.

"Everybody is counting us out, but remember they all did that after the first two games of the Chicago series, too," Abel said.

"Sure, our backs are up against the wall but the home ice will make a big difference for us."

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Drysdale Hurls Bums Past Colts

HOUSTON (UPI) — Working his second straight complete game of the infant National League season, Los Angeles Dodger right-hander Don Drysdale kayaked the Houston Colts 3-1 Saturday night on a five-hitter.

Drysdale, running his record to 2-0, faced only 15 men through the first five innings although giving up a second-inning single to Bob Aspromonte. Aspromonte was wiped out in a double play.

Houston rallied briefly in the ninth with Al Spangler leading off with a double. After Drysdale got Pete Runnels on strikes he gave up an infield single to rookie Rusty Staub before wild pitching Spangler home with Houston's only run.

The Colt threat died when Aspromonte flied deep to left and Howie Goss went down swinging. Drysdale walked one and fanned eight.

The Dodgers got all their runs in the third inning.

The uprising chased Colt starter George Brunet and brought on Russ Kemmerer. Kemmerer, Dick Drott and Don McMahon blanked the Dodgers the rest of the way.

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Owls Make Eight Errors In Game

The Oregon Tech Owls opened the Oregon Collegiate Conference action on a sour note at Gem Stadium Friday afternoon when the heavy-hitting Eastern Oregon College Mountaineers slammed out 16 hits and took advantage of eight Owl errors for a 13-2 victory.

It apparently just wasn't a good day for the Owls who seemed unable to do anything right, both on defense or offense. They committed eight errors which led as much as anything else to their downfall. Winning pitcher Dennis Bagnall had the Owls virtually eating out of his hands throughout the game although he was tagged for eight hits.

The game wasn't a runaway, however, until the fourth inning. It was tied up going into that inning when the Mountaineers exploded. It was, however, apparent from the beginning that the Mountaineers' booming bats would overpower the Owls.

The Mountaineers opened up with four straight hits off starter and loser Marv Edwards. Ray Strong, who pierced the Owl defenses with three singles during the game, led off with a single but was chopped down at first on a pickoff by Edwards which proved a blessing. First baseman Don Nelson then tripled and Merle Hart slammed one over the fence for a 2-0 lead.

The Owls came back to knot the game in their half of the third with a pair of runs. With two out, Edwards singled and Don Gresdel walked. Catcher John Crumrine singled to plate Edwards and Gresdel scored on an error.

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fly ball was dropped in left by Ed Appleman and Feigner scored. Louis Hunter then came on in relief of Edwards who moved to right field. He gave up an RBI single to John DeBoie and got Jerry Christiansen to ground out for the third out.

The Owls never really threatened again although there was a hit scattered here and there. The Mountaineers came up with two more runs in the fifth, one of which was unearned and the other was walked in. They tallied another unearned run in the sixth, one in the seventh and one in the ninth to cap the game.

Curt Graf and Crumrine led the OTI hitters with a pair of singles each. They were the only two with two hits. Bagnall fanned 10 of the OTI batsmen.

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
