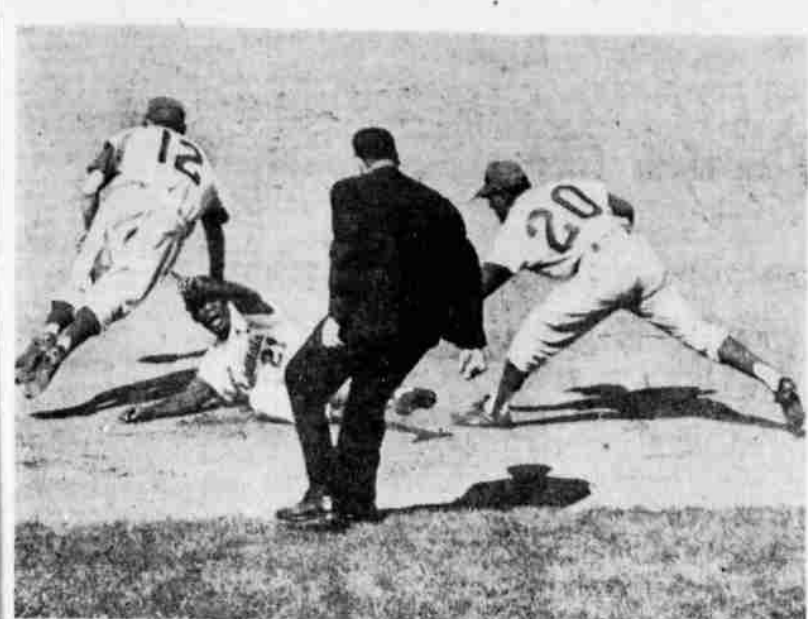

Pel Netters Grants Pass, Bend Win Beat Crater

The Pelican tennis team scored its first conference victory of the season over the weekend as they trimmed Crater's Comets 5-0 with five straight singles victories. Ducks Rally For Victory

STANFORD, Calif. (UPI)—Oregon came within inches Saturday of losing two straight dual meets for the first time in the 15 years of Bill Bowerman. But the defending NCAA champion Ducks captured the final two events—the two-mile run by Keith Forman and the mile relay—to edge Stanford 74-71 for the Indians' first defeat of the season. Ray Van Asten of Oregon overtook Stanford's Keith Emanuel on the final leg of the mile relay to provide the Ducks with their winning three-point edge. The team's clocking was 3:12.1. Forman came back to capture the two-mile event in 8:56.8 after winning the mile run in 4:00.5. The Ducks' other winners were Mel Renfro in the broad jump in 24-6 1/2, Dave Steen in the shot put in 59-7 1/2, Lewis Powell in the 600-yard run in 1:52.0, John Burns in the javelin in 232-5, Paul Stuber in the high jump in 6-9 1/2 and Marty Frank in the pole vault in 15-0. The Ducks will meet Brigham Young at Eugene Saturday.

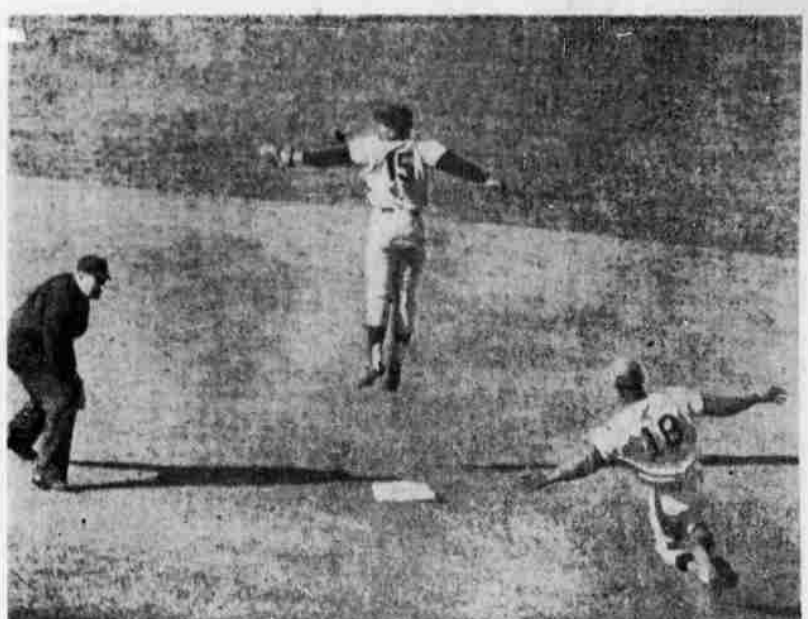
Plays Three Positions

Ron Santo scored one run on a double by Ernie Banks and drove in another with a solo homer to help the Cubs' Larry Jackson gain his first win of the season. Willie McCovey doubled home the only run for the Giants, who had won their first four games.

Al McBean yielded 10 hits but struck out five and walked only one in out-pitching the Reds' Joey Jay, who dropped his second straight decision. A walk to Bob Skinner and singles by Smokey Burgess, Donn Clendenon and Bill Virdon produced the game's only run in the fourth inning.

Colts Kayo Koufax
The Colts kayoed strikeout king Sandy Koufax in 3 1-3 innings and then hung on for the victory with Don McMahon shutting out the Dodgers on one hit for the last 1 1-3 innings. Pete Runnels and Howie Goss had two hits each for the Colts and Frank Howard and Dick Tracewski had three each for the Dodgers.

Bob Hendley pitched a four-hitter against the Mets and finally won out in the 10th when the Braves scored on a walk to Lee Maye, Hendley's sacrifice and a single by Ty Cline. Roger Craig, a 24-game loser in 1962, allowed only seven hits but suffered his second straight loss.

Oregon Holds Grid Practice

EUGENE (UPI)—About 70 candidates turned out for spring football practice at Oregon today as Coach Len Casanova sought to plug huge gaps in the middle of the line.

Oregon has a wealth of backfield talent, although halfbacks Mel Renfro and Larry Hill were not on hand for the spring drills. Counting Renfro and Hill, Casanova has six of his first seven halfbacks and his top two quarterbacks back from the team that won six, lost three and tied one last year. The Ducks also count five of their first six ends among 19 lettermen returning.

After that, the experience runs out rapidly.

Gone are the fine tackles of last year, Ron Snidow and Steve Barnett, although four other lettermen are available at that position. Graduation also took every letterman guard except Ron Jones, the first two centers, and all three fullbacks.

Oregon coaches think the outlook at fullback and center is much better than it appears on paper, however.

Sophomores Tim Casey, a 196-pounder from Portland's Jesuit High, and Mike Flury, a 200-pounder from Roseburg, head a strong cast of first-year men.

Ron Stratten, a 1961 letterman and an outstanding linebacker who was injured all last season, returns at center. He is expected to get stiff competition from Don Causey, 215-pound sophomore from Salem.

Bob Berry heads up a strong collection of quarterbacks, including letterman Doug Post, non-letterman Terry DeSylvia and sophomores Jack Sovereign and Mike Brundage.

Williams made his American League debut for the Yankees Sunday—his first real competitive appearance since that fateful walk last October—and breezed to a 5-1 victory over the Baltimore Orioles. For those who believe in omens is the fact that the win also gave the Yankees sole possession of first place.

The Cleveland Indians whipped the Detroit Tigers, 6-0, the Washington Senators beat the Boston Red Sox, 7-6, and the Kansas City Athletics edged the Minnesota Twins, 5-4, in other games. The Chicago White Sox and Angels were rained out—the first rainout in Los Angeles big league history.

In the National League, the Pittsburgh Pirates shaded the Cincinnati Reds, 1-0, the Chicago Cubs topped the San Francisco Giants, 3-1, the Houston Colts beat the Los Angeles Dodgers, 5-4, the Milwaukee Braves shut out the New York Mets, 1-0, and the Philadelphia Phillies swept a doubleheader from the St. Louis Cardinals, 4-3 and 5-4.

Pitches Five-Hitter
Williams pitched a five-hitter, struck out eight and allowed only three walks. Two walks by Chuck Estrada and singles by Johnny Blanchard and Elston Howard gave the Yankees two runs in the first inning and they added three more in the third with the help of Clete Boyer's two-run single. Boog Powell and Jerry Adair tripled in succession to produce the Orioles' run.

Rookie Vic Davalillo's two-run homer and the seven-hit pitching of Jim Grant and Jerry Walker enabled the Indians to deal Detroit's Jim Bunning his second defeat. Grant allowed only two hits and struck out five before leaving the game when struck on the pitching arm by a batted ball. Walker yielded five hits the rest of the way to pick up his first win.

Chuck Hinton had a triple, double and two singles to lead an 11-hit Washington attack on six Boston pitchers. Carl Bouldin was the winning pitcher although Ron Kline struck out five and pitched two-hit ball over the last four innings for the Senators. Carl Yastrzemski had four hits and Bob Tillman homered for the Red Sox.

Pinch-hitter Manny Jimenez' three-run double was the big blow of a five-run fourth inning as the Athletics handed the Twins their fourth loss in five games.

CORVALLIS (UPI)—Oregon State's track Beavers came out of a three-week, rain-enforced hibernation Saturday to wallop Lewis and Clark and Portland State in a triangular meet.

The Beavers rolled up 123 points. The Pioneers scored 25 and the Vikings collected 20.

Norm Hoffman and Morgan Groh finished in a hand-in-hand tie for first place in the mile in 4:09.2. Gary Stenlund won the javelin in 244-6 1/2 and Terry Cox captured the pole vault in 14-6 for Oregon State's top efforts.

Coach Fired By Huskies

SEATTLE (UPI)—Mim Owens, athletic director at the University of Washington, today promised speedy action to name a new head basketball coach to replace John Grayson.

Owens, also head football coach, announced Saturday the contract of Grayson, 47, coach of the Huskies for the past four years, would not be renewed for next season.

Grayson came to Washington from Idaho State College where he had a mark of 69-17 in three years. His Washington teams during his tenure had a 57-49 mark and were 13-13 during the past season when the Huskies finished in a tie for third in the Big Six Conference.

Riese pitched a three-hitter in the first game and Raschio hurled a seven-hitter in the second. Arba Ager and Dale Jansen were the losing pitchers.

Conference Continues Study Of Football Fix

ATLANTA (UPI)—The executive committee of the Southeastern Conference has ordered a continuation of its investigation into the Alabama-Georgia football controversy until a definite conclusion can be reached.

The order came Saturday in an unannounced and closed meeting of the committee which directed SEC Commissioner Bernie Moore to continue digging into the mass of details and evidence concerning the case.

The Saturday Evening Post alleged in a recent edition that Alabama Coach Paul (Bear) Bryant and former Georgia Athletic Director Wallace Butts conspired to rig last fall's football game between the two universities. Alabama, a 17-point favorite, won the game 35-0.

The committee met Saturday to examine the findings of Georgia Atty. Gen. Eugene Cook's investigation into the magazine report. Both Butts and Bryant have denied the magazine story. Butts has sued the Post for \$10 million in a libel action. Bryant is asking \$5 million in a similar action.

Solon Talks Boxing Law

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Kenneth B. Keating, R-N.Y., says that if "boxing cannot regulate itself, the next step must be governmental regulation to protect boxers' lives."

Keating, appearing on a radio-television program funded for New York stations, said Sunday that "it is time we took boxing away from the hoodlums and instituted the controls necessary to protect lives" of fighters.

"I hope we can avoid this by having the sport clean its own house," Keating said. But he added:

"We no longer can sit idly by while hoodlums and worse take over a favorite national sport and squeeze out their blood money at the expense of an increasingly mounting number of young men's lives."

Oregon State Tops Seattle

CORVALLIS (UPI)—Cecil Ira scattered 11 hits and Denny Straub distributed six safeties to give Oregon State 7-2 and 5-3 baseball wins over Seattle Saturday.

The victories left the Beavers with an 11-5 season's record.

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
