Camp Sites Dispensed By Automatic Machines

The schedule for operation of ticket-vending machines for collection of a service fee at 28 of 350 campgrounds in the national forests of Oregon and Washington was announced today by the U.S. Forest Service.

Ticket-vending machines were tested at two campgrounds last year, and this year the charge program will be extended to 28 other campgrounds where facilities are well developed and use is heavy. Picnicking, boat-launching, and other day-use activities at the 28 sites remain free of charge, according to J. Herbert Stone, regional forester.

The ticket-vending system works this way: The fee for overnight camping is \$1 per day. The vending machine, with instructions, will be located near the campground entrance. The prospective camper drives in, selects a camp unit, and returns to the vending machine. He inserts two 50-cent pieces into the machine, which dispenses a dated ticket. The camper then fills out the back of the ticket and inserts it into his ticket box, which is located near the road at his campsite. If he lacks proper change, he leaves a note for the attendant, who will contact him and make change.

Senate Seeks Full Report On Thresher

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate preparedness subcommittee has asked the Defense Department for a full report on the loss of the nuclear submarine Thresher, it was learned Saturday.

The subcommittee's staff has been ordered to gather all information on the disaster. In turn, it asked the department to keep it advised on progress of the Navy's inquiry into the tragedy.

The subcommittee, an arm of the Senate Armed Services Committee, will decide later whether to make an investigation of its own.

The subcommittee is currently working on an interim report on its inquiry into the intelligence phases of the Russian military build-up in Cuba. That report probably will be issued in a couple of weeks.

The subcommittee also plans to hold hearings on the Geneva test-ban talks as part of a disarmament study started in the last Congress. These hearings were to have been the subcommittee's next order of business.

In the past the subcommittee has given attention to disasters similar to the Thresher tragedy. For example it conducted an inquiry into the design and structure of the so-called Texas Towers after one of the offshore radar platforms was lost at sea.

Tourism Study Asked By Cook

SALEM (UPI)—A study of tourist facilities in Oregon was called for today by Sen. Vernon Cook, D-Gresham.

Cook said he had prepared a resolution calling for an interim study by the legislature of "the adequacies of existing tourist facilities."

"Tourism is one of Oregon's largest industries, bringing millions of dollars into the state each year," he said.

"Unfortunately, our facilities are no longer adequate. An interim study would point out the importance of this industry and better inform the legislative and executive branches of the need for additional activities in the field."

Cook proposes a review of advertising programs, state parks, coordination between government units involved, federal aid programs, and related subjects.
