

Russians Exploit U.S. Sub Sinking

MOSCOW (UPI)—Fleet Adm. Ivas S. Isakov expressed condolences to the American people Saturday for the loss of the nuclear submarine Thresher but used the tragedy for a propaganda blast at U. S. nuclear policies.

Isakov contradicted U. S. authorities and said the disaster will poison the Atlantic with radioactivity and endanger waters as far away as Newfoundland and New York and Boston. U. S. authorities said the loss posed no radioactive danger.

Isakov, writing in the government newspaper Izvestia, said the lost submarine was proof of the "aggressive" nature of U. S. naval forces. He said the reason "complicated" submarines were used in rocketry and space exploration, had lost its monopoly of the atomic bomb and was late with the hydrogen bomb.

Soviet First
The Soviet Union has maintained it was first to develop the hydrogen bomb.

"For this reason the U. S. tried to make up the balance by building unusual submarines which could be advertised to the whole world to frighten those with weak nerves and to draw into their aggressive orbit all those who cannot afford Thresher rockets...and the notorious Polaris."

The admiral said the Thresher tragedy grew out of "the race for sensational advertising and for doubtful priority," and that 220 men died because the "Pentagon wanted to continue risky experiments with the Thresher."

Isakov added that America had "frightened" the world with its enormous army, navy and air force strength.

"We say the Thresher disaster has again demonstrated complete lack of soundness in the long compromised policy emanating from a position of strength. The doomed sub, pointed up the aggressive spirit of America," he said.

Structural Defects
The loss of the Thresher, Isakov added, resulted from structural defects, not "chance" as the Pentagon claimed.

The admiral did not make any reference to the Soviet Union's fleet of atomic submarines.

Other Soviet naval authorities said the loss of the Thresher may have been due to haste in getting the vessel into action and to technical shortcomings.

The authorities, who were not identified, were quoted in the newspaper Soviet Russia as saying that U. S. "war psychosis" also contributed to the tragedy.

Ocean Research Vessel Allocated To College

OREGON STATE UNIVERSITY—An ocean research vessel five times the size of the present Aconia is on the way for the Oregon State University Department of Oceanography.

It was announced that an aircraft maintenance and supply ship that has been in mothballs in the West Coast Army Ship Depot at Rio Vista, Calif., has been allocated to OSU for conversion into an ocean research vessel.

The ship will be towed to Portland in the near future to await final approval of a request made to National Science Foundation for funds to equip the vessel for ocean studies, according to Dr. Wayne V. Burt, head of the Oceanography Department.

Conversion will cost about \$600,000 with a good share of the money going into such things as winches, cranes, and electronic navigating gear needed in ocean studies, Burt said. It is hoped the conversion will be accomplished within a year.

The 20-year-old ship cost \$1,200,000 to build and is still in excellent condition, Burt noted. Its

release from surplus was speeded by the efforts of Mrs. Edith Green, Oregon Congressional representative.

The vessel will be named Yaquina when it is ready for commissioning, Burt announced. It will be docked at Newport—on Yaquina Bay—and with it, OSU will be able to further expand its already broad ocean research program, he added.

OSU's present research vessel, the Aconia, then will go to University of Alaska. The Aconia was built in 1961 with a grant from the Office of Naval Research, and equipment funds from the National Science Foundation. Total cost was \$300,000.

Plane Missing
NELLIS AFB, Nev. (UPI)—An F100D Super Sabre Jet was reported missing Friday night near Peach Springs, Ariz., when it failed to return from a four-plane night training mission.

A spokesman at Nellis AFB, ten miles north of Las Vegas, said a search for the craft would begin Saturday dawn.

Horrors Of War, Jap Prison Life Turn Newsman To Priest

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah (UPI)—Twenty-one years, one month, and one week ago during an afternoon of horror in the Indian Ocean off Java, William H. McDougall, a newspaper man experienced what he calls "my own private miracle" and dedicated his life to God.

On Easter Sunday, 1942, the Japanese threw him in prison on Sumatra for three and a half years of more horror and near death which solidified the dedication.

On this Easter week, Wednesday night, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William H. McDougall, rector of the Cathedral of the Madeleine, receives formal investiture as a domestic prelate of Pope John XXIII. After 11 years as a priest,

he has been named a monsignor. The two Eastern—21 years apart—held special meaning for him.

"I began a new kind of life, in prison, on Easter Sunday, 1942, and now a new phase of my priestly life begins Easter week, 1963," he said. "I was in newspaper work from 1932 to 1949. I loved it. But I found a greater love."

Bill McDougall, a Salt Lake City reporter, went to a Tokyo newspaper in 1939, and became a United Press war correspondent at the start of World War II. He was on the Dutch freighter Poelau Bras when Japanese bombers sank her off Java.

From 11:30 a.m. to sundown on March 7, 1942, he swam desperately and prayed. One packed lifeboat rowed away from him after occupants jerked its trailing rope from his hands. Another hoisted sail and disappeared when he neared it. A third did the same. As the sun sank, a fourth appeared.

It was hoisting sail. "God, make that sail go down!" McDougall prayed, swimming desperately. The sail collapsed, and he gained on the boat.

Again the sail started up. "God, make it collapse," he prayed. It did. His miracle had come to pass. Gasping, choking, he was alongside and was pulled in. Weeks later, they reached Sumatra—and Japanese prison.

"When I got out, I decided originally to serve God as a

working newspaper man. I went to Harvard as a Nieman fellow and then returned to work, but somehow that didn't seem enough; the only reason I was alive was that he gave me life, not once or twice but time and

time again. I decided to give him everything I had—namely, myself. "I used to think that newspaper work was the most interesting

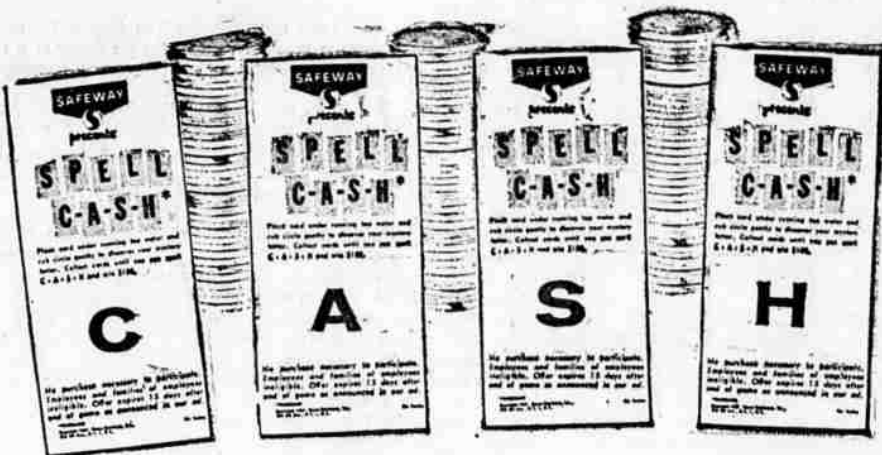
profession a man could follow. But being a priest is incomparably more interesting. Who else sees more deeply into men's souls?"

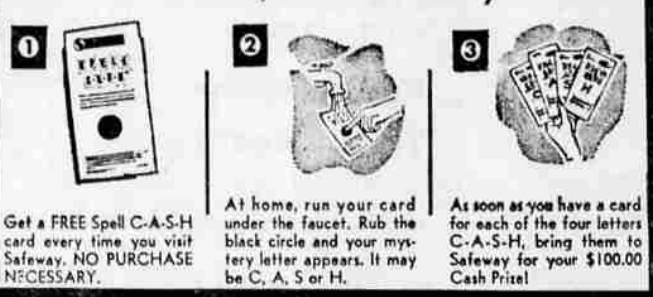

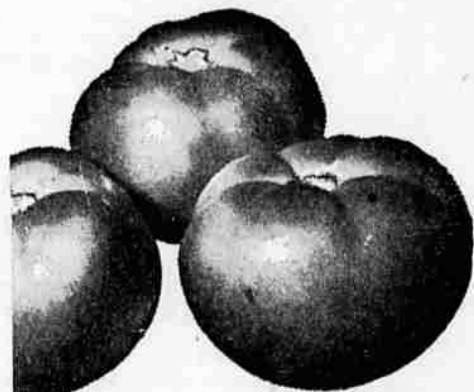

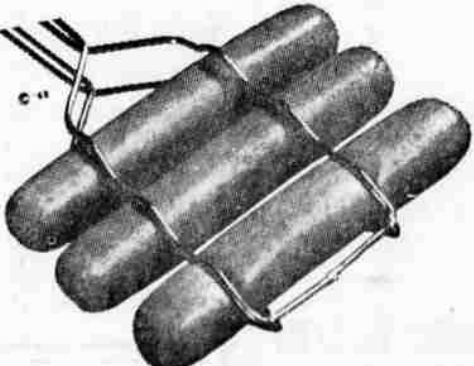
