Card Count Important

The Association of American Playing Card Manufacturers conducts an annual intercollegiate bridge tournament, in which the contestants play a series of prepared hands. The players obtain points for both bidding and play and Bill Root and Barry Rossler who prepared this year's hands insure that everyone gets his chance to gain points for play by having the players bid first as they choose, but then play the hand at a directed official contract.

Playing at six no-trump South needs four diamond tricks to make his contract and, since it is a prepared hand, it is a cinch that diamonds won't break. His correct play is to cash all spades and hearts and the ace and queen of clubs and watch the fall of the cards from East and West.

East will discard clubs on the third heart and third spade so West will have started with 10 cards in the major suits. West will also have followed to two clubs so that he won't have more than one diamond.

Dummy's ace of diamonds will be cashed and when West follows South will have accounted for all of his cards and will play East for the rest of the diamonds.

Baby Wins Art Award

Nature Unfair To Elderly Women, Doctor Claims

NEW YORK (UPI) — It is the contention of Dr. Robert A. Wilson, a veteran woman's doctor, that nature is unfair to elderly women but that medical science can do something about it.

Nature "desexes" women when they approach her 50's and thereafter she declines rapidly mentally and physically even though she may live to be a hundred, in his view. Nature does no such deteriorating thing to man, although it usually kills him sooner.

"Our streets abound with them, elderly women, walking stiffly in twos and threes, seeing little and observing less," he said. "It is not unusual to see an erect man of 75 vigorously striding along on the golf course, but never a woman of this age."

The young girl is "essentially of neuter gender." With puberty her body chemistry is flooded with

the hormones of femininity and she cells lose their strength, there is a loss in weight, energy and menopause, the "change of life," estrogens production is abruptly curtailed. She returns to essential "neuter gender."

"There is variation in degree but not in fact," continued Wilson. "Men do not live as long as the so-called weaker sex. However, they age, if free from serious disease, in a proportional manner. The gonads fade gradually, but there is no sudden shutdown."

Because these gonad hormones are responsible for conspicuous sex characteristics, the layman thinks of them as "sex hormones." Biochemistry knows, however, that they play important parts in the chemical processes which maintain whole body functional efficiency.

Wilson said that in the "estrogen-starved" elderly women, mus-

tic synthetic estrogens to replace those which their gonads are no longer producing. He is devoting himself to persuading other gynecologists to accept this view. At present and suspicion that they might some- generally seeking, synthetic estrogens cause cancer.

And there are mental effects. "A large percentage of women who escape severe depression acquire a rapid cow-like feeling called a 'negative state,'" he said. "It is a strange misery. Such people react poorly to pleasant stimuli, yet do not sink to great depths of depression. The world appears as through a gray veil, and they live as doleful, inert creatures missing most of life's values."

Wilson wishes medical science to apply "replacement therapy" to those elderly women who are markedly declining, that is, give

them synthetic estrogens to replace those which their gonads are no longer producing.

NEWARK, N.J. (UPI) — A 500-pound granite cross toppled from a monument and killed an 8-year-old girl making a Good Friday visit to her grandparents' graves.
