Funds Asked To Improve 2 Highways

SALEM (UPI)—Requests for bond issues to finance improvements to two Oregon highways were made Monday before the Senate Highway Committee.

One group proposed a \$3 million highway bond issue to pay for reconstruction of parts of highway 30 between Portland and Astoria.

Another delegation sought a \$17 million bond program for Highway 20 from Corvallis to Newport.

Both termed the improvements necessary to stimulate lagging economy.

The Highway 20 delegation favored an increase in license fees, and a 1-cent a gallon gasoline tax hike.

Spokesmen for the Highway 30 improvement included Fred Foshaug, St. Helens, who said the present road was dangerous.

Clatskanie publisher Art Steele said Clatskanie and Columbia counties were economically distressed.

"The tourist business is all we have left," he said.

But Steele said he opposed issuing bonds to finance the improvements.

Sen. Daniel Thiel, D - Astoria, said completion of the Astoria bridge, will "open up Northwest Oregon," and make highway improvements necessary.

The need for improvements to help the Lincoln County area improve its economic situation was strongly argued by the Highway 20 delegation.

Capitol Journal Reporter William Bebout, who recently authored a series of articles on Lincoln County's economic potential, said "lack of transportation was a critical obstacle."

He said the area feels it has been ignored, and now wants its fair share of highway improvements.

Dr. Kenneth Patterson, Oregon State University, prepared a study for the delegation showing it would cost \$17 million to finance the work through a bonding program, and \$11.3 million if the work were financed all at once from current highway department revenues.

The highway commission has repeatedly stated it does not have the money to rebuild the roadway. The commission also is opposed to bond financing.

Civil Defense—The House voted 32-27 to approve a stripped-down civil defense budget that would pay for a three-man agency instead of the 20-man department asked by the governor.

Taxation—The House Tax Committee indicated the new income tax bill may reach the floor Friday after approving a subcommittee recommendation calling for a graduated rate structure.

Cigarettes—House Minority Leader F. F. Montgomery said he will seek to amend the cigarette tax bill from 4 to 3 cents, with cities to receive 1 cent of the tax.

Workmen's Compensation—A much-amended three-way workmen's compensation bill was approved by the Senate Labor and Industries Committee, but Sen. Don Willner, D-Lake Oswego, said he felt he would file a minority report.

Prison Labor—A proposal to curb use of convict labor could cost the state \$1.3 million in the next two years. The Senate Public Buildings and Institutions Committee was advised.

Youth Shot In Medford Robbery Try

MEDFORD (UPI)—A gun-toting California youth was shot to death by a city policeman here Monday minutes after he attempted to rob a small grocery store.

The youth was identified as Roy C. Smith, 19, El Monte, Calif.

Policeman William Hall, 37, shot Smith twice after he arrived to investigate the attempted robbery. Hall said he spotted the youth about three blocks from the store and that the youth began firing with a revolver in each hand.

Smith was dead on arrival at a Medford hospital.

Mrs. Edith Lindley, proprietress of the store, told police that Smith entered the store brandishing a revolver but fled when she told him that her husband was in the store.

Police said the revolvers in Smith's possession were stolen from a local sporting goods store Sunday night.

Smith was a former Ashland area resident and arrived at Medford last Saturday to visit.

SIAC Bill Gets Okay

SALEM (UPI)—A three-way workmen's compensation bill was approved Monday night by the Senate Labor and Industries Committee.

Sen. Don Willner, D-Lake Oswego, and Sen. Alice Corbett, D-Portland, voted against the measure. Willner announced he would file a minority report.

The much-amended bill would allow direct responsibility employers to file a bond or surety provided by private insurance carrier to guarantee compensation payments.

The right to jury trial was retained in the bill. The committee also voted to allow an employer to appeal a case only if the employee appeals, except in cases where there is a legal question as to whether the employee was included within coverage of the law.

The bill also would increase compensation benefits an average of 17.7 per cent over the present amount.

Three Uses For Tongue Point Station Studied

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., said today that three possible uses for the Tongue Point Naval Station at Astoria, Ore., are under study by the White House.

—Transfer of Coast and Geodetic Survey staff personnel from the national capital to the Oregon site.

—Use of the site for the orientation of foreign exchange students.

—Use of the 672-acre base as a Peace Corps training center.

The Oregon Democrat told the Senate last week that a "serious scandal" was in the making because of the Kennedy Administration's failure to find a use for the \$14 million base.

Morse accused the General Services Administration, which is responsible for the disposition of surplus government property, of "complete inefficiency and malfeasance" in connection with handling of the Oregon property. He said the GSA should be investigated "from top to bottom."

Morse's comments and a heavy file of correspondence on efforts to reactivate the base filled 10 pages of the congressional record. The material included a letter from Commerce Secretary Luther Hodges, who said the GSA had erred in contracting for expansion of coast and geodetic survey facilities at Seattle rather than using the existing facilities in Oregon.

Among recommendations to the White House, Morse said, was one that the base be used as an orientation and special training center for foreign students from Africa, Latin America and other countries.

The committee is composed of lumbermen who have been working toward solutions to problems currently confronting the lumber industry.

Following the meeting there will be an informal discussion on what has been done about the industry's problems and what can be accomplished in the future.

BEND (UPI)—A graveside service was held today for Henry Nash Fowler, an Oregon newspaper figure since 1916.

Fowler died Saturday of cancer at the age of 73.

He was a former co-owner of the Bend Bulletin, president of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers Association, and a director of Oregon Tax Research.

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Macmillan Probes Leak In Security

LONDON (UPI)—Prime Minister Harold Macmillan planned to take personal charge today of the investigation into a security leak trumpeted by thousands of chanting ban-the-bomb demonstrators.

Security units were reported preparing a series of raids throughout the country to track down a group called "Spies for Peace." The group printed pamphlets containing a list of 12 underground regional seats of government purportedly planned for use in case of nuclear attack.

Macmillan, already in political hot water, was reported hurrying back to London from his Easter holiday in the country.

Some of the ban-the-bomb marchers Monday sang "I've got a secret, a lovely official secret" to the tune of the old Scottish song, "I Love a Lassie." Others shouted the location of one supposedly secret command post in Berkshire, named it on banners and had the location painted on jackets.

Although the majority of the estimated 35,000 marchers were orderly, there were numerous clashes between police and an element of jeering "beatniks."

Police arrested 72 persons, including 6 women. Two policemen and two civilians were reported injured.

Woman Guilty

PORTLAND (UPI)—Mrs. Star Elaine Wallace, 32, Portland, was found guilty of manslaughter by a Circuit Court jury Monday night. The vote was 10 to 2.

Circuit Judge Richard Burke earlier in the day revealed that two jurors were threatened over the telephone that they would be "cut up" if they did not vote for acquittal. He said the calls were made late Sunday night.

The jury deliberated five hours. Mrs. Wallace had been charged with second degree murder for the fatal stabbing of her husband, Jack, at their houseboat last year.
