From a technical viewpoint, says Martin Gilbert of Van Alstyne Noel & Co., the pattern which has been established indicates that the upward trendline will be extended with the possibility of an attack in the not too distant future, on the all-time high around 740 in the industrial average.

He De Lauchelle of Paine, Webber, Jackson & Curtis says a decline to 687-94 in the industrial average should stop any market reaction from here or higher levels. He guesses that any such correction will be delayed until the Dow works higher to around 720-25.

City Council Plans Paving Bid Opening

ding procedure. Mayor Veatch told him, "We have reason to believe there will be two or three bidders on the work this summer."

Estimated cost of the Avalon improvement which will provide a 60-foot wide street was set at \$30,394. The project would utilize present asphalt paving.

A resolution was approved by the council setting the date for public hearing on a proposal to pave Worden Street from Delta to Lytton. Estimated cost would be \$42,019. In the past, the council has agreed to assess vacant lots for improvements at two times their assessed value for bonding purposes. Owners of vacant lots, City Manager Robert Kyle said, would have to come in and sign up for bonds to the value of twice the assessed amount of the lots, and would have to pay cash for any amount over that or make some arrangement to pay the balance.

If they failed to pay the cash difference, he indicated, the council would have no choice but to foreclose on the vacant lots.

Hearing on the Worden Street paving was set for 7:30 p.m. on Monday, May 20. The city would be required to pay \$5,000 of the cost of this project since it owns Fairview Park which would be included in the project.

May 20 at 7:30 p.m. was also set as the date for a public hearing on the vacation of Henry Street.

Considerable discussion was given to a request by Paul McAttee for a variance of zoning requirements on property he is developing in Eldorado Heights. He has re-designed 10 lots into seven building sites, but several of these failed to meet the requirements of an R7.5 zone for total area.

Strachan Larceny Case Opens In Circuit Court

Attorneys for the state and the defense delivered their opening statements in the larceny case against Martin Lloyd Strachan, 23, which resumed in the circuit court of Judge David R. Vandenberg today following the selection of a jury early Monday afternoon.

Strachan is accused with four others of the theft of personal property belonging to Francis Hutchinson at the latter's Beatty cabin last Jan. 21. The accused and his co-defendants also had been indicted by the grand jury earlier this year for the assault and battery of Hutchinson which occurred at the same time as the alleged larceny.

Strachan was acquitted of the assault charge following a previous trial late last month. The others, including Thelma Aileen Huitt, 25, Chloquinn Perry Chocktoot, 30, Klamath Agency; Everett Ray Decker, 19, 1804 North Second Street; and Gordon Hickson, 41, Beatty, will have trials separately on the two charges later this month and during May.

Sam McKeen, deputy district attorney, told the jury during his opening statement Tuesday that the state would prove Strachan and his four companions removed saddles and personal property from Hutchinson's residence after the Beatty man was severely beaten.

McKeen charged that Strachan had acted as a member of the group in the larceny and therefore shared in the responsibility of the theft.

Later, the defense attorney told the jury that he would seek to prove that Strachan was not aware that a theft was being committed when the party of five removed Hutchinson's belongings from the cabin to an automobile outside. Strachan believed his

2 Slimmed Budgets Get Okay In House

SALEM (UPI)—Budgets for the state engineer and the State Soil Conservation Committee easily passed the House today without restoration of small watershed planning money.

The \$992,530 engineers budget passed 49-10. It was cut \$105,000 from the governor's proposal, including \$100,000 in watershed money sought by local groups.

The companion \$75,942 soil conservation committee budget, cut \$15,000, also passed. Both went to the Senate.

The two budgets appeared on the House floor earlier but were returned to the Ways and Means Committee for further consideration of the cut in watershed funds. It was considered a test of Ways and Means hold-the-line spending attitude in the face of local pressures.

IWA Gives To Hospital

I.W.A. Local Union 3-12 has pledged \$1,000 to the Intercommunity Hospital Fund.

Leslie Jarvis, president, and Otto E. Hall, business agent, announced the pledge in a resolution adopted by the union at a meeting on April 6.

In addition, the union urged all its members to support the hospital drive to the fullest of their ability by signing up for payroll deductions at the plants where they work.

The resolution stated that members of the union were contributing to this fund through payroll deductions at Weyerhaeuser Company plant and Ellingson Timber Company plant.
