

Vandalism Reported To Police

A case of vandalism was reported to city police Monday and Ray Howard, juvenile officer, disclosed that the thefts of two wrist watches from the gym locker room at KU were reported to him last week.

A large plate glass window at Calhoun's Floor Covering, 357 E. Main Street, was broken at about 3:45 p.m. when someone threw or shot some type of projectile through it.

The damage was estimated at \$150 and is covered by insurance. Store salesmen told police they spotted a car speed around a corner and out of sight moments after they heard the window crash.

Ray Howard reported that Jimmie Vetkos, 1542 Dayton Street, and Dennis Taber, 4318 Onyx Avenue, both reported the thefts of their watches on April 10.

Howard talked to several of the boys who were in the locker room at the time and although the youths denied taking the watches Vetkos' watch turned up in his gym basket two hours after Howard had approached some of the suspected youths.

Taber's watch has not been recovered yet, Howard said.

Bill Asks California Tax Study

SACRAMENTO (UPI)—An administration bill calling for a "top-to-bottom" study of taxation in California was introduced in the legislature today.

Gov. Edmund G. Brown, who called the bill one of his most important of the legislative session, put the problem this way: "The California tax structure is so tangled among all levels of government that tax revision is like a game of jackstraws. You can't be sure that changing one tax program won't throw undue pressure on another."

The governor used the property tax as an example of a levy that has carried "too much of the load for too long" and said he would like to relieve the burden but could not.

The bill's author, Assemblyman Robert W. Crown, said the results of the study should provide the governor, the legislature, boards of supervisors, city councils and mayors with recommendations to solve fiscal problems.

Crown outlined the problems as: —What are the fiscal requirements of California governments? —Which of them should be carried by cities, counties or the state?

—Who should collect needed tax revenues to finance these tasks? —What is the impact of the tax burden on various segments of the state's economy and society?

The bill, which appropriates \$150,000, would authorize the Department of Finance, chief fiscal agency of the state, to study and analyze all phases of local and state taxation.

It would allow the director of finance to employ technical and professional help for the study and require all governmental agencies to cooperate.

In addition, the bill creates a 20-man tax advisory commission to serve as an advisory body on the study.

The measure apparently was the administration's hope for rearranging taxes to avoid the possibility of new taxes during the next four years — which Brown said yesterday may be possible.

Dan Abraham, forestry graduate from Oregon State University, now working in the office of the superintendent of the Winema Forest, spoke to Seconchin Society, Children of the American Revolution on April 8 at Mrs. Bruce Polly's home.

Colorful slides showing the five uses of the Winema Forest, wood, water, forage, wildlife, and recreation, entertained the members. The forest covers 920,000 acres of land in Klamath County and is celebrating its second anniversary this month.

Mrs. William Wales Jr., past senior president of Seconchin Society, was presented a corsage in honor of her being chosen as senior state president of the Oregon CAR for the next two years.

A silver tea for DAR members will be at Mrs. E. S. Robinson's home on May 18 from 2-4 p.m. Also planned is a workshop at Mrs. Bruce Polly's home on April 27 at 10 a.m. for the members to make table favors for the regional convention on June 22 and 23.

Teen-Agers Oppose Raising Minimum Driver Age To 18

SALEM (UPI)—Teen-agers disagreed over proposals to raise the minimum age for drivers licenses from 16 to 18 before the House Highways Committee Tuesday.

Eugene junior Nancy Hinchliff, 16, said youthful drivers "lack responsibility," and should not be given a license until they are 18. John Borcher, 19, Seaside, said he polled about 40 classmates and "half of them said the age should be increased, the other half disagreed."

Mike Sellard, 6, North Eugene,

termed this a "mobile age," and added "driving teaches responsibility."

Sellard said he already had a drivers license, but he was taking a high school driver training course because he thought it would benefit him.

The committee held a hearing on three proposals to restrict youthful drivers.

Rep. Phil Lang, D-Portland, is author of a bill which would raise the age to 18, except where youths had completed a driver training

course. They would be able to get a license at age 16, but would be under curfew not to drive after 11 p.m. on pre-school nights, and after 1 a.m. on Saturdays and Sundays. Parking of cars near schools also would be prohibited.

A bill by Rep. Ken Maher, R-Portland, would have the 18 year limit except for a "provisional permit" that could be issued in some cases to those 16 and over.

A bill by Rep. Winton Hunt, R-Woodburn, would raise the age limit for instruction permits to 17, and for a drivers license to 18.

All three said there was a direct relationship between ownership of an auto and school dropouts and lowered grades.

The committee will hold a work session on the bills Thursday.

Woman Takes Shot At Husband In Car

MOUNT SHASTA — The quick action of a visiting friend prevented a Mount Shasta woman from shooting her husband on the town's main street at 4 p.m. Monday.

The woman, identified as Mrs. Leland Parrish, was arraigned in justice court Tuesday and released on \$1,050 bail. The preliminary hearing was set for May 2.

According to Mount Shasta police, Mrs. Parrish, 31, came out of a doctor's office in the 300 block of Walnut Street and saw her husband entering the back seat of an automobile across the street. Walking behind the car, she stood in front of the open door and said to her husband, "Leland, you think you have won everything," and removed a .22 revolver from beneath her coat.

Mrs. Parrish was arrested at her home by three Mount Shasta policemen and a California Highway Patrol officer and charged with assault with a deadly weapon.

William Cox of Sacramento, who with his wife had been visiting the Parrishes, saw the pointed gun and grabbed her arm, forcing the gun down. She fired and the bullet struck the pavement.

Cox struggled with Mrs. Parrish and took the gun away from her, then instructed his wife to take Mrs. Parrish to her home on Lassen Lane.

Police said they were called after the gun was fired, but Parrish had driven away from the scene of the incident. A roadblock was set up and Parrish and the car were picked up a short time later. The gun was found on the back seat.

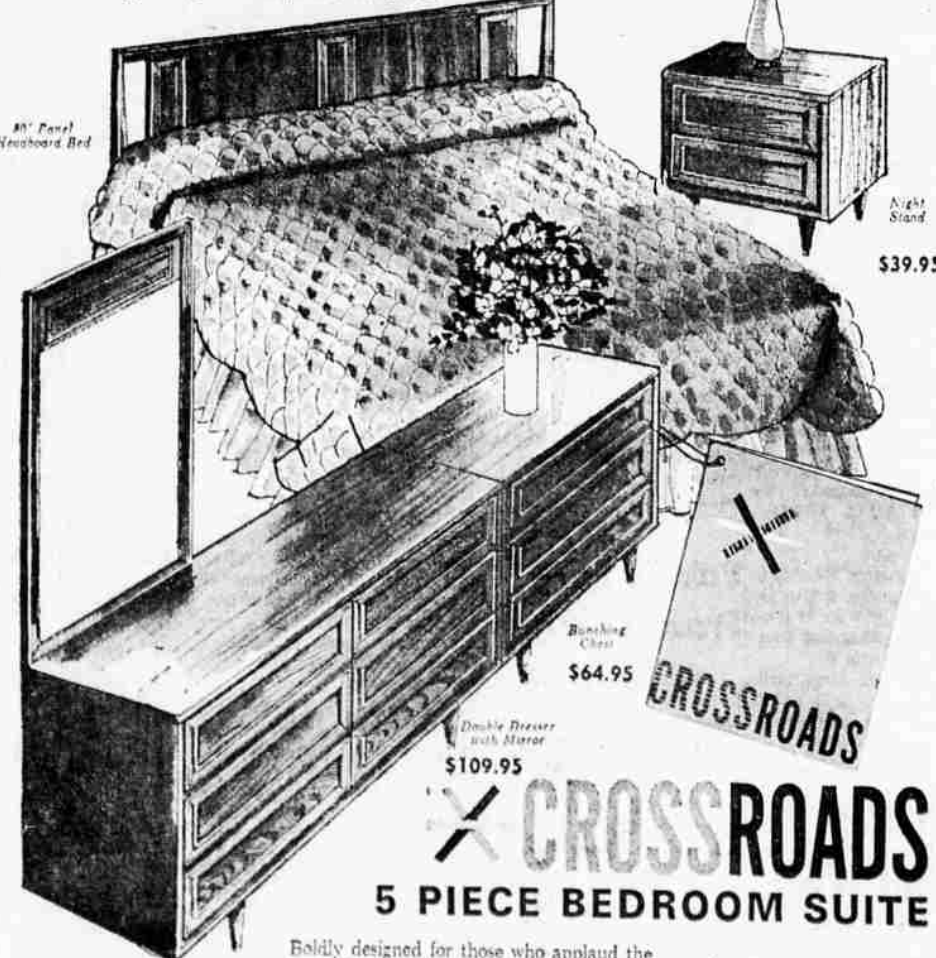
