Martin Lloyd Strachan was "parking something quite large" as he and four companions, their arms loaded with goods, left the Hutchinson house in Beatty, last Jan. 21, and loaded the goods into a nearby car. Moments later, the car sped off toward Klamath Falls as Francis "Bex" Hutchinson rushed from the house to Cookie's Cafe across the highway.

That was the scene observed by Ethel Walker, operator of the cafe, as she testified to a number of incidents which occurred before and during the alleged theft of two saddles and personal property belonging to Hutchinson and his two brothers.

Mrs. Walker was one of five principal witnesses who testified in the circuit court of Judge David H. Vandenberg Tuesday as the trial of Strachan, 23, charged with larceny, entered its third day.

Strachan and four co-defendants were indicted by the grand jury for the beating of Hutchinson and the subsequent theft of saddles and other property at the Hutchinson house. In an earlier trial, Strachan was acquitted of the assault and battery charge. The others indicted on the two charges will go on trial at various times this month and next.

Mrs. Walker told the jury that she first observed the five-member party, consisting of Strachan, Everett Decker, 19, Perry Checktoot, 30, Wilbur Hickson, 41, and Thelma Huitt, 26, in the cafe as she reported for work early in the afternoon.

Later, she looked up to note Strachan and Decker crossing the highway toward the Hutchinson house. Suddenly, Decker began pulling Strachan back toward the cafe, she said. Strachan resisted and broke away from Decker, she added.

Finally, the two men continued across the highway and into the Hutchinson house. About 15 minutes later, they left the building and returned to the cafe, where they huddled briefly with the other three members of the party. The group then left the cafe and entered the Hutchinson residence, where they emerged soon after with the alleged stolen property.

The testimony by Mrs. Walker corroborated some previous statements of Francis Hutchinson, who had been hospitalized as the result of a vicious beating he incurred prior to the larceny. Hutchinson related to the jury that he and the Strachan group, composed of four of his acquaintances, had "drank together" amiably the same afternoon. They later left for Cookie's Cafe and returned about one hour later when the alleged larceny and beating took place.

Continued reference to the beating by deputy district attorney Sam McKeen brought from the defense attorney a motion for a mistrial, which was denied by Judge Vandenberg.

The attorney argued that Strachan had been acquitted of the charge and continual reference to the incident was prejudicial, he said.

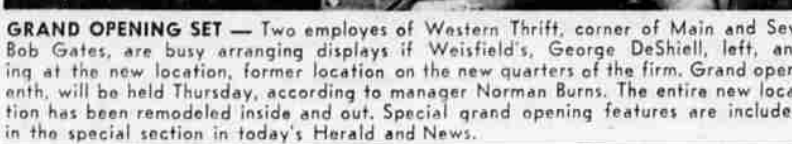
Testimony by Hutchinson's two brothers, Calvin and Louis, substantiated that the property taken from the Beatty house was removed without their permission.

Louis, Box 282, Beatty, told the jury that the saddles were valued at \$125 each and stated that a new medicine cabinet, lamps, and various clothing were among the items taken from the building.

As a sidelight to the case, Calvin Hutchinson, 4068 Shasta Way, related that Strachan and his companions stopped at the county fairgrounds, where he was watering some horses, before they proceeded to Beatty.

The witness told of a conversation he had with Checktoot but did not reveal the substance of their talk.

The other principal witness was Bob Thomas, deputy district attorney, who testified that a statement he received from the defendant at the county jail was given to him voluntarily. The trial resumed today in the court of Judge Vandenberg.
