

## City Barn Sale Voted At Shasta

MOUNT SHASTA—City councilmen at their regular meeting April 12 passed a resolution to sell city property known as the City Barn. It will be put out for bid. Protests may be registered in the council room of City Hall at 8 p.m. April 25.

George Adams appeared before the council as representative of a group of property owners south of Mount Shasta to ascertain the best way to obtain water and sewer lines in that area, whether by annexation or forming a water association. He was advised that the city could not provide water or sewer lines outside the city limits. Five water users are involved at present.

Regarding annexations, the city will proceed with the Jefferson annexation as prescribed by law as protests were short on assessed value, less than 50 percent. Council heard the first reading on Hercules, Needles, and Hennessy annexations.

Herman Barry was appointed to assist Charles Echols in Civil Defense surplus material, and Echols announced that a team of experts will be in Mount Shasta on May 2 to inspect the 200-bed emergency Civil Defense hospital in storage here.

In other business, Echols reported the total cost of the south Mount Shasta sewer line was \$33,600, about \$10,000 over the original estimate.

April 22 - 28 were the dates set for the annual cleanup week. City crews will pick up trash left on curbs April 27-28. The trash boxes should not weigh over 50 pounds.

## Hospital To Observe Mental Health Week

In observance of Mental Health Week, the Oregon State Hospital in Salem is inviting the public to attend an open house from 1 p.m. to 4 o'clock Sunday, April 28, at the state hospital has disclosed.

The open house will be one of many nation-wide and state-wide events planned in observance of the special week, April 28 through May 4.

Unit Five, which serves patients from Klamath, Lane, and Lake counties, will be among various units open to inspection by the public. Groups and individuals will be shown through the buildings by guides and given an opportunity to discuss the hospital's program and operation with staff members.

Maps and programs will be provided at the Administration Building, as well as guides, to take visitors to other facilities within the hospital, such as the centralized kitchen, the Hut and Canteen, the school room and the sewing room.

Refreshments will be served in the Alberta Flynn room and in the Center Building auditorium. The Communications Office will manage a nursery in the basement of the Administration Building, as it did last year.

This year marks a historical achievement for the 80-year-old Oregon State Hospital because of decentralization of the treatment wards. After two years of preparation, the hospital is now divided into six semi-autonomous units, each serving patients from a specific geographical area, and a seventh unit for those patients who require extensive medical and surgical care.

## Livestock Graze Fee Announced

The 1963 grazing fees for livestock permitted on the former Klamath Indian lands, now within the Winema National Forest, were announced recently by A. E. Smith, supervisor.

A new rate for cattle has been set at \$1.45 per animal per month as compared to \$1.50 per month paid in 1961 and 1962. The rate for sheep, however, will remain at 32 cents per head per month, the same rate as in the two previous years.

The reduced rate of five cents per month for cattle was made possible through the application of a sliding scale formula which is based on market conditions. This formula is designed so that it will reflect in the annual grazing fees any yearly fluctuations in the price paid for livestock throughout the Western states. A drop in the average price paid for livestock in any given year results in a reduction of grazing fees for the following year. A rise in the average price would result in an increased fee.

The 1963 indices indicate a slight decline in the 1962 fall cattle market, while the sheep market did not fluctuate sufficiently to be reflected in the fees charged for sheep use of the range.

## Car Crashes Into Truck

**ALTURAS** — William Shuman, 48, Bieber, Calif., is in critical condition from injuries sustained when his car collided with a parked truck at 3 a.m. Sunday.

Floyd Graham of Carson City, Nev., had parked his truck on the side of the road to help another stalled car, with the truck pulled slightly onto the highway to syphon gas into the car. Shuman failed to see the parked vehicle in the dark and ran into the back of the truck.

He was hospitalized at the Modoc Medical Center for severe lacerations of the head and concussion, and was removed by ambulance to the Washoe Medical Center in Reno Sunday afternoon. His wife, Lillian Shuman, is hospitalized in the Modoc Medical Center for minor injuries. The CHP reported that Graham was cited for illegal parking.

Another accident caused by heavy snow and icy highway conditions hospitalized Mrs. Hugh Bell of Vancouver, B.C. The Bell car skidded on the icy highway five miles south of Alturas early Monday morning, running the car off the road and rolling over into the borrow pit. Bell was uninjured.
