Rail Tieup Lasts 17 Hours

DUNSMUIR—Through traffic on Southern Pacific's main Portland - San Francisco line was resumed about 5 p.m. Monday night after a tie-up lasting over 17 hours.

Sixteen rear cars of a northbound freight and two diesel helper units were derailed four miles northeast of Weed at 11:30 Sunday night. No one was injured.

The freight cars, mostly empties, remained upright except for one car, so damage to moving equipment was negligible, J. J. Willis, assistant superintendent of Shasta Division, explained at the scene of the mishap.

However, 1,200 feet of rail had to be relaid before the line could be opened. Extensive repairs will have to be made to about a half-mile additional trackage as ties were damaged when the derailed railroad wheels ran over them.

Over 50 men were called to assist in the repair job and two work trains were used to help clear the rail line. Southern Pacific officials at Dunsmuir attributed the derailment to mechanical failure on one of the cars.

Hart Lake Error Noted

LAKEVIEW—W. T. Frost, snow survey supervisor with the Soil Conservation Service, notes an error in the April 1 publication of the water supply outlook for Lake County.

The statement was made that "Hart Lake is spilling and water is flowing down to Bluejoint Lake." The corrected statement should read, "Hart Lake is spilling and is now flowing into Flagstaff Lake." Before the water flows into Bluejoint Lake, it must fill Upper and Lower Campbell lakes and Stone Corral Lake.

Frost notes in addition that the rain and snowfall since April 1 have combined with the very wet soils of Lake County to produce an excellent run-off, much greater than was expected. This has resulted in excellent inflow to Drews Valley Reservoir and in increased streamflow generally, which improves the rather grim water outlook previously reported.

The community chamber orchestra, under the direction of Normand Poulshock, will appear in concert Tuesday, May 14, at Mills Auditorium. Appearing in conjunction with the chamber group will be soloists. The concert will start at 8 p.m.

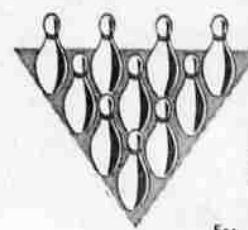
