Man Judged Not Guilty Of Larceny

Martin Lloyd Strachan, one of five defendants accused of the larceny of personal property belonging to the Hutchinson brothers of Beatty, was judged not guilty by a circuit court jury that deliberated 46 minutes late Wednesday before returning its verdict to Judge David R. Vandenberg.

The jury of seven men and five women, which began deliberating at 4:35 p.m. and returned with a verdict at 5:21 p.m., voted 10-2 for acquittal with two men dissenting.

The other four defendants charged with acting in complicity with Strachan in the alleged larceny will go on trial at different times this month and next. They are Everett Decker, 19; Perry Chocktoot, 30; Wilbur Hickson, 41; and Thelma Huitt, 26.

Following announcement of the verdict, Strachan was remanded to the sheriff to begin serving two consecutive three-month sentences he received in district court March 4 for pointing a firearm at another and, also, carrying a concealed weapon. Strachan was to begin serving the total six-month sentence at the conclusion of the larceny trial which ended Wednesday.

Strachan is also sought by Lane County police on charges of revocation of probation, which developed as the result of his arrests in this county. He had been paroled from the state penitentiary before coming to Klamath County.

Woman Held For Assault Klamath Falls Setting For Scenes In Movie

City police booked Julia Ann Pruitt, 25, 804 North Second Street, Thursday morning on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon in the stabbing of James Tupper, 30, 1715 Oak Avenue.

Tupper was stabbed in the abdomen with a hunting knife at about 3 a.m. Thursday at 205 West Oregon Avenue. He is in satisfactory condition after surgery at Klamath Valley Hospital.

Miss Pruitt told police that she, Tupper and Lewis Harvey Gibbons, who lives at 205 West Oregon, had been drinking together at the house and claims that Tupper was making improper advances toward her.

Miss Pruitt said she doesn't remember the actual stabbing, but said they began scuffling in the hallway and Tupper backed away bleeding with a wound in his abdomen.

Police have been unable to question Tupper who is still under sedation after surgery.

Gibbons was arrested for disorderly conduct and is being held in the city jail, but he has been unable to give police a statement concerning the stabbing.

Shortly after the incident, police received a call from Mrs. V. R. Harless, 235 Sequel Street, who said that a wounded man stumbled onto her porch seeking help. When police arrived at the scene they found Tupper bleeding profusely. He was taken to the hospital by Peace Ambulance.

Overhaul Of Traffic Lights Slated For Downtown Area

The downtown traffic light system is going to be completely revamped with signal heads being replaced in a thorough overhaul of the system, according to Mayor Robert Veatch.

Veatch reported that the Oregon State Highway Department, which has jurisdiction over the traffic light system, has agreed to pay half of the estimated \$24,000 cost and will supervise the drafting and calling for bids which is expected to take place in about mid-May with bid letting on June 4.

Veatch also indicated that the city has agreed to include its share of the cost in the 1963 budget. A big portion of this has been accumulated in a reserve fund, he indicated, from funds the council appropriates each year for replacement purposes.

He indicated that the trouble with the traffic lighting system stems from the fact that the cabling has worn out in many places, the shielding of the cable against the weather is nonexistent in some cases and the circuits are deteriorating.

As a result, he indicated, every time it rains or the wind blows strongly, trouble develops in the system.

"Our system is either the oldest or the second oldest operating in the state," Veatch said, adding, "We have made every effort to repair it where possible, but a recent survey of the entire system by the state highway department has developed that it is necessary to completely overhaul the system, including replacement of the cabling, new type double-

signal heads in accordance with accepted state law, and even replacement of the wait-walk signals."

In the past, the city has had to request highway department personnel from Medford to make repairs and adjustments to the master timing controls of the system and to the system lights. This has been time-consuming, Veatch indicated.

"The only cure," he said, "is to replace the entire system and that's what we're going to do."

Freedom Eludes Hoover; Trial Date Slated Soon

Raymond Hoover, 30, of Chiloquin, who jumped bail, perpetrated a hoax, and attempted suicide in an effort to elude a criminal trial in circuit court, was back in the county jail today following his release from the Salem State Hospital to sheriff's deputies, the Sheriff's Office has reported.

Hoover, indicted by the grand jury late last year for the larceny of an automobile, was released from the hospital into the custody of sheriff's deputies earlier this week and is to appear soon before Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg to receive a date for trial, according to District Attorney Dale Crabtree.

The defendant had been committed to the state hospital recently following a pre-trial sanity hearing in Klamath County Circuit Court. Last week, a representative of the institution notified Crabtree that the prisoner had been given a psychiatric examination and was to be released.

First Flu Case Reaches Oregon
