Goldwater Advises Republicans To Avoid Appeals To Minorities

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., said today the Republican party should avoid trying to outbid the Democrats for minority group votes by making any "special appeal based upon race or creed."

His views were contained in a letter to the Young Republicans National Federation, sponsor of a three-day All-American Conference starting in New York Friday.

Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York and Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., are scheduled to address the meeting. Goldwater said in his letter he could not attend but wanted to express his thoughts.

"It seems to me that the whole subject of ethnic and minority groups and their relationships within our society has been talked to death," he said. "Political appeals to race and religion are, of course, commonplace."

"Cynical politicians are continually harping on the problems of minorities and offering glib solutions to them. The words they use refer to ending the divisions between our people, but I'm convinced that the net effect of this talk is to divide the American people and to inflame, rather than solve, the very real problems of our racial and religious groups."

Goldwater said the GOP need not apologize for its record on this issue but that its job is to sell that record.

"Politically inspired emotional gimmicks and fantastic promises are the trademarks of the Democratic party," he said. "We Republicans cannot and should not try to compete with them on their own shallow ground."

"The Republican party must seek the minority group vote in the only sensible and honorable way open to us. We must appeal to all racial and religious groupings with well reasoned arguments that do not insult them or their intelligence. We should avoid making any sort of special appeal based upon race or creed."

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Weather Bureau Checks Fort Rock Stations

FORT ROCK—Sidney Howick of the Portland office of the U.S. Weather Bureau made his annual spring check of cooperative weather stations in the Fort Rock-Lake area April 15. Stops were at the Lake station, where Jack Gillette is cooperative observer; The Poplars, where Bud Parks takes temperature and precipitation readings; and at the Fremont station, observed by Mrs. Floyd Branch. Howick, field aide in charge of hydrology climatology, calibrates thermometers which record high and low temperatures, checks recording rain gauge equipment, and provides any supplies needed by the stations. Daily records are kept by cooperating individuals as a service. The weatherman's tour of Central and Eastern Oregon began April 8 at the Brothers station. His Monday checks in the Burns, Wagonfire, Fossil Lake and Fort Rock areas were done in snow squalls. Plans were to continue on to southern Lake County before installing a new station at Warner Valley Stock Company's Klamath Marsh ranch. This will complete plans for providing good weather report coverage throughout this area of the state. The Hampton station, with Asa Goddard as observer, was installed in December. Cooperative observers send monthly records to Asheville, N.C., where new, high speed equipment enables greater efficiency and economy than was possible when processing was done at San Francisco. Weekly rain gauge charts are processed first at Salt Lake City. Selected stations throughout the state report to the Portland office to provide information for water supply forecasting, Howick said. At Lakeview, Howick was to visit Tuesday at the Follett Motel where the owner provides the services, by contract, of a second order weather bureau station. Follett's job is to phone to Medford every three hours a synoptic observation which is a part of the plan to obtain an instantaneous picture of the weather worldwide. His reports include information such as dewpoint, sky cover, types of clouds at varying levels, pressure change and amount of change, precipitation during past six and 24 hours, as well as high and low temperatures. Howick has been with the U.S. Weather Bureau for the past 16 years in Seattle, then Eureka, Calif., and in Portland since 1959.

Rail Hearings Resume

CHICAGO (UPI)—Rail management and union leaders today opened another chapter in their long drawn-out featherbedding work rules dispute with the threat of a nation-wide strike still imminently in the background. Hearings by a presidential emergency board resumed in Chicago, after being transferred from Washington following an Easter weekend adjournment. Nathan Feinsinger, one of the board members, and board counsel James Adler began brief, informal, but separate, meetings with officials of both the railroads and the five on-train brotherhoods involved. Feinsinger, who was unavailable for the earlier meetings, said today's morning sessions would be merely to acquaint himself with the issues. President Kennedy appointed the board April 3 to forestall the threat of the railroads to place new work rules into effect. The railroads took the action after a March 4 Supreme Court ruling freed them to make the changes. Creation of the emergency board automatically barred a nation-wide railroad strike for 60 days until the board reports to the White House. Both sides agreed at the Washington meetings that the 60-day cooling off period would end June 10.

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
