

Griffith, Rodriguez To Fight

NEW YORK (UPI)—Ex-champion Emile Griffith will try for a third capture of the world welterweight crown on June 8 in a "rubber match" with champion Luis Rodriguez at Madison Square Garden.

Each will receive a guaranteed \$40,000 for the nationally televised (ABC) 15-rounder, which was announced Thursday night.

Cuban Rodriguez of Miami Beach won the 147-pound crown from Griffith of New York on a unanimous but controversial decision, March 21, at Los Angeles. Nevertheless, Griffith was installed a 7-5 favorite today.

Because of that Los Angeles controversy, promoters at Los Angeles, Miami Beach and Las Vegas, Nev., tried to get the fight, but the two boxers and their handlers finally compromised on New York.

Rodriguez' title victory over Griffith avenged the Cuban's defeat by Griffith in their non-title 10-round bout at New York, Dec. 17, 1960. That was before Emile first became champion by taking the title from Cuban Benny (Kid) Pareto on a 13th-round knockout at Miami Beach, April 1, 1961.

"BIG O" HONORED

NEW YORK (UPI)—Oscar Robertson of the Cincinnati Royals has been chosen the Hick athlete of the month for March. Gordie Howe of the Detroit Red Wings was second and jersey Willie Shoemaker was third.

In Central Oregon the popular Deschutes and Metolius will receive the heaviest angling pressure. Lakes available to anglers include the ever productive Wickup and Crane Prairie Reservoirs, Blue and Suttle lakes, Crescent, Odell, Big Cultus, and Rock Creek Reservoir and Squaw lakes. Lake of the Woods will open to early angling.

Many lakes and reservoirs in North and Southeastern Oregon are open to year around angling. Morgan Lake out of La Grande is set for the April 20 opening and should produce well. So, too, should Fish, Duck and Twin lakes if anglers can get rigs into the mountains. Good stream bets should include the Innahwa, Wena-ha, Catherine Creek, Eagle Creek, the Powder River above Baker and the upper John Day. Anglers shouldn't overlook the Wallawa, Walla Walla and the Umatilla. Angler success will depend on water conditions. Snow runoff may dampen opening week-end success.

Southeastern Oregon anglers should do well on the Malheur and Little Malheur rivers, the Blitzen, Emigrant Creek and Bear Creek. The Chewaucan and Dairy, Camas and Deep creeks should also produce. Again, muddy water conditions may hamper angler success.

Fishing Season Begins

Although the edge is taken off by all-season trout angling in some areas, the bulk of the trout fishermen will head for open waters this weekend, April 20, the date that marks the opening of the general angling season in most lakes and streams of the state.

The game commission reminded fishermen that this season date opens all waters of the state to trout angling except the high lakes within national forest boundaries in the Cascades, and the coastal streams in Zone 1. These areas will not be available to anglers until May 25 and include such streams as the Nehalem and its tributaries, Siletz and other coastal streams. All lakes in the coastal zone will open.

Good bets for the opener include the McKenzie, Santiam, and Clackamas systems in Northwestern Oregon. Detroit Reservoir should also produce well. In the Northwest region, anglers should not overlook smaller streams such as the Molalla, Luckiamute, Calapooya, Hills Creek, Breitenbush, and Row River. Most of the other smaller streams have been planted for the opener. Many of the lakes and reservoirs have also received pre-opening plants of trout. Lake Harriet on the Clackamas and Hills Creek Reservoir on the Willamette are scheduled to open early along with Fish and Lost lakes in Linn County.

In the Southwest some good bets for anglers might include almost any of the lowland lakes of the area. Loon Lake should be a good producer along with Eel, Empire, Floras and Tennille. Mercer, Munsel and Sutton are also good bets. Fish Lake and Howard Prairie have been good early producers along with Willow Creek Reservoir and Squaw lakes.

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Hornung, Karras Definitely Out For 1963 Season

NEW YORK (UPI)—Only one thing was certain today in the wake of the National Football League's betting scandal: That's the official line from the NFL today after an exhaustive study which failed to show anything more than that Hornung, Karras and four other members of the Detroit Lions made wagers on the outcome of regular NFL games betting on their own teams or on games in which they were not involved.

Whether or not they will play in 1964 or ever depends on their behavior, according to Commissioner Pete Rozelle, but from there on in, for all intents and

purposes the investigations into betting by players, which were triggered in January, are over.

That's the official line from the NFL today after an exhaustive study which failed to show anything more than that Hornung, Karras and four other members of the Detroit Lions made wagers on the outcome of regular NFL games betting on their own teams or on games in which they were not involved.

However, there is reason to be-

lieve that the matter will not die there as indicated. It's too early to assess fan reaction, but early samplings show most fans were shocked at the severity of Hornung and Karras' punishment. Most league officials, including general manager and coach Vince Lombardi of the Packers, agreed that Rozelle had no other alternative but to suspend Hornung, the league's greatest player, and Karras.

Breach Of Contract
Other officials, inside and out-

side of the sport, seemed to feel the same way, claiming that there was a definite breach of contract by the two players, and inasmuch as the sport depends on public patronage for its existence the players had to be suspended.

There are indications, too, that the Senate subcommittee headed by John L. McClellan, D-Ark., may call for a comprehensive report on the entire investigation by Rozelle as part of its inquiry into gambling and reported fix-

ing in football and other sports. Whether or not such an inquiry would involve the calling of witnesses is problematical. If, however, Hornung, Karras et al were called in then they would have to testify under oath. In the NFL inquiry they were simply called in by Rozelle, confronted with evidence and then admitted they had bet on games.

Hornung's genuine regret and honest admission that he had made a "terrible mistake" by betting on games more than likely gained him a point toward reinstatement. Karras, on the other hand, first hedged and then admitted he, too, had wagered on some games, but angrily snapped that as far as he was concerned "this thing isn't over yet. I am going to protest" the suspension.

Gets Good Offer

Ironically, Karras already has been made a \$40,000 offer to engage in a series of wrestling matches, and more than likely will agree. He wrestled once before under the name of "Killer Karras" and, because unlike Hornung who has invested his mon-

ey wisely, Alex needs an income while on the football shelf.

Hornung, who was paid \$30,000 last year by the Packers, and picked up additional money from testimonials, television commercials and personal appearances, has funds invested in several business and sports promotions. Karras is a partner in a bar in Detroit where he works in the off-season. However, since he does not earn the money Hornung does, Alex must find another source of income during his suspension.

"Alex could make more money in wrestling than he ever could in professional football," said Detroit promoter John Dyle. "This suspension will make him more popular than ever because he received such harsh treatment. Fans will turn out to see him wrestle."

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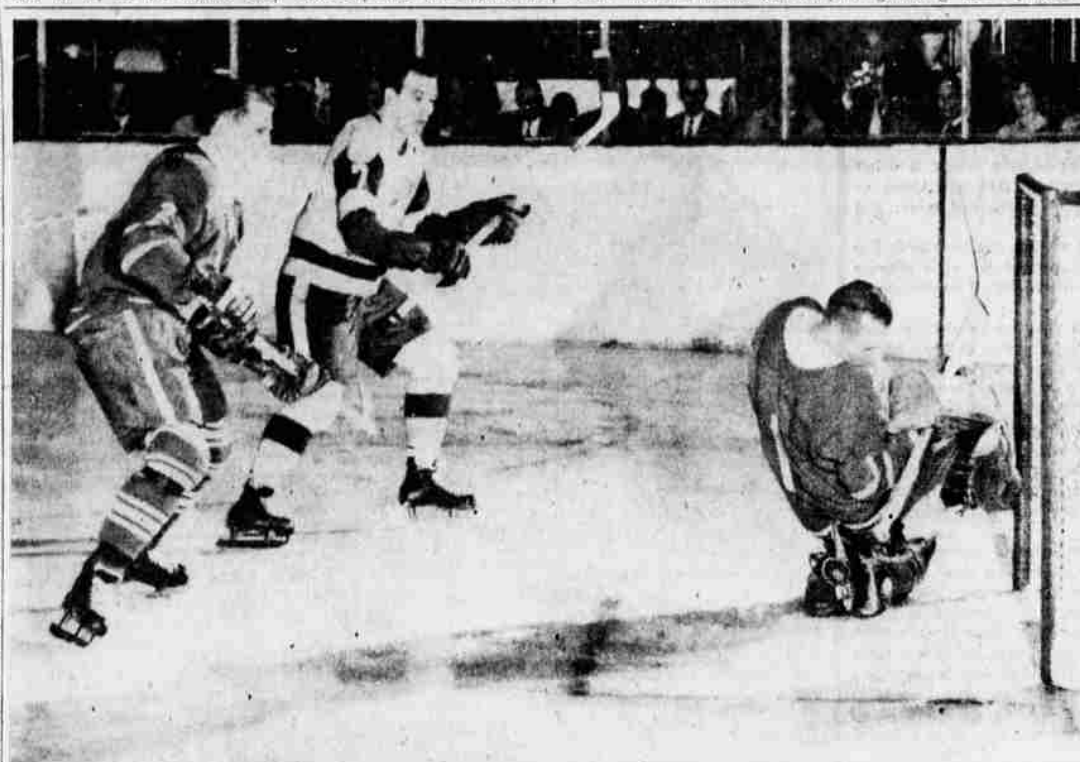

Toronto Maple Leafs Cop Stanley Cup Second Time In Succession

TORONTO (UPI)—The Toronto Maple Leafs had just completed a sweep of honors for one National Hockey League season and the word from champagne-guzzling players was that they all would be back next year.

That included goalie Johnny Bower, who hides his age like a woman but is at least 40 years, and David Keon, who has just begun to terrorize the NHL.

And, from the horse's mouth, came an assurance that manager-

coach Punch Imlach would return in his dual capacity although winning the NHL pennant and his second straight Stanley Cup was no an accomplished dream.

"I have no plans to quit," Imlach said between gulps of French vintage champagne. "Of course it's up to the players," he said but quickly added "I'm joking so don't take me seriously."

The players in question, the Leafs, who had just eliminated the Detroit Red Wings in five

games of a best-of-seven playoff, definitely wanted him back, even if he makes them work harder than any other NHL team.

"He makes us work hard, sure," said Bower, "but look what it gets us — the Stanley Cup and \$5,000 in bonuses. I'd play for him any day."

Keep, a 20-plus goal scorer each of his three years in the league, was one hero of the playoffs with seven goals against Montreal in the semifinals, and

Detroit in the finals. Bower shared the honors with only 16 goals against him in 10 games.

And Keon was the conqueror Thursday night with two goals on Toronto power plays, one of them with five-seconds left in the game that ended Detroit's just-missed bid for a tie. His first gave them a 1-0 lead, but Alex Delvecchio tied it up in the second. That set the stage for Eddie Shack.

Shack, showboat of the league and favorite of the Leafs' fans, tipped in the winner at about seven minutes remaining in the game. "Kent Douglas fired from the point," he said, "and I just tipped it past Terry Sawchuk." The Leafs won 3-1.

Imlach credited the Wings for "giving us a run for the money" but across the hall Detroit claimed they just didn't get the breaks and defenseman Bill Gadsby said Toronto "stole the series."

Manager-coach Sid Abel said "we played good enough to win—the Leafs just got all the breaks."
