Unblocking Play Wins

An unblocking play was of high interest in the Association of American Playing Card Manufacturers' Intercollegiate bridge tournament.

South's one spade opening is proper, although I imagine a lot of people would decide to pass. Still, North has enough for an opening bid and the North-South hands should be bid to four spades in any event.

West is directed to open the Jack of clubs and East and West are directed to lead clubs at every opportunity.

Of course, they don't get many opportunities because South will trump the second club and start to lead trumps.

He will stop for a moment when East shows out on the second lead and look around for a way to unblock the diamond suit in order to bring home five diamond tricks in addition to his five trumps.

It should not take him long to find the way. He must cash two of dummy's high diamonds. If West ruffs South is not going to make his contract, but West has to follow to both diamonds. Remember, that this is a par contest so that the right line of play is always going to work.

South cashes his last two trumps and discards the last high diamond from dummy. This unblocks the diamond suit and lets him make three more diamond tricks for his contract and his par.

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Slogan Set For Cancer Fund Drive

For the second straight year, the American Cancer Society's annual crusade slogan is "To Cure More, Give More." This year's crusade began April 1 and ends May 30.

"Cancer is an emergency problem," said Clifford McGinty, Klamath County Crusade chairman. "Every day lost in finding a cure for all cancers means lives lost. Unless we all get out to seek a cure for cancer and continue other essential projects, we are losing vital time," he stated.

"This is one of the reasons we say 'To Cure More, Give More,'" said McGinty. He announced that the long-time slogan of the American Cancer Society, "Fight Cancer with a Checkup and a Check," has been retained as a companion slogan.

"Basically," McGinty said, "we are concentrating on 'To Cure More, Give More,' which mirrors our stepped-up drive to: 'Reach more people with the lifesaving facts about cancer. 'Give more physicians the latest lifesaving facts on detection and treatment of cancers. 'Support more qualified scientists in their search for cures, better detection methods and preventives against cancer."

"Give more service to cancer patients, to ease the burden on them and their families."

Pointing out that cancer cures in the past 25 years have risen from fewer than one in five cases to one in three cases, McGinty urged all residents of Klamath County to make the 1963 Crusade the best ever so that more lives may be saved.

In the 1962 Crusade more than \$39 million was raised, for a new crusade record.

"We must try to exceed this total in 1963, for it is a fact that cancer progress goes hand in hand with the amount spent to fight the disease," McGinty said.

"Your contribution will help conquer a scourge which will, if present rates continue, eventually strike 46 million living Americans. That is why we say 'To Cure More, Give More,'" he concluded.
