Searchers Find Prints

MURPHY, Idaho (UPI) — A search party started out at dawn today after camping on the edge of a creek 11 miles west of here where new tracks believed those of missing 19-year-old Delford Sharpe were found.

Tracks believed to be those belonging to the missing youth were spotted late Thursday, and were followed until dark.

Volunteer trackers were backed up today by additional aircraft flying search patterns over the rain swept foothills and snow-packed peaks of the Owyhee Mountains.

It was damp and cloudy in the area today, where the search for Sharpe has been going on since Wednesday.

Young Sharpe has not been seen since he left his parents' stranded car Monday morning to try to find help at Jordan Valley, Ore. The parents, Mr. and Mrs. David Sharpe, of Gayway Junction, Idaho, were rescued Wednesday.

Study Plans Stand Alone

SALEM (UPI) — The Ways and Means Education subcommittee voted Thursday to pull several special programs out of the basic school fund and have them stand on their own feet.

Among them are programs for the advanced, handicapped, mentally retarded and migrant children.

Effect would be to make it necessary for the programs to seek general fund money each session. As part of the basic fund they have been part of a continuing appropriation that does not need any legislative action.

The change would make the programs more subject to legislative control.

The decision would shift some \$7.5 to \$9 million now going to the programs from the basic school fund to the general fund.

There have been complaints that the Department of Education is skimming too much money from the basic school fund for special programs instead of channeling it directly to local schools.

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Taxpayers Plan To Send Delegation To Capitol

The Taxpayer's League of Klamath County met April 17, at the county courthouse for its regular monthly meeting.

Items on the agenda included a decision to send a delegation to the Senate hearings on April 23 and 25, concerning House Bill 1281, firemen's work hours and House Bill 1282, the vector control bill.

Legislative reports were submitted by Andrew Giegler and Richard Arnett.

Irene Tice, secretary, read reports by school board candidates to a questionnaire sent them by the league. Opinions were expressed on split schedules, overcrowded KHS and personnel.

Candidates answering the questionnaires were Frederick Hyde, C. O. Borsting, Robert Frederickson, Southwest Oregon, Blue Mountain, Treasure Valley, Clatsop and Eugene Community Colleges.

The committee rejected an amendment that would have let the Dalles squeak under the wire to go ahead with its proposed community college. The district plans to file its petitions this week. Pressure for its inclusion is expected to be strong and a change could be made to include it.

Other Highlights
Embezzled: A Ways and Means subcommittee approved and sent to the House floor a bill for repayment from state money of \$16,393 embezzled in 1959, 1960 and 1961, from patient trust funds at the State Hospital. The embezzler has since served a sentence.

Rep. George Filtrcraft, R-Klamath Falls, said "I hope there'll not be many bills like this. But I guess it's best to wash this linen out in the open." The bill actually is a bookkeeping measure as funds have been returned to patients. Board of Control Secretary Nick Peet said accounting procedures had been changed to eliminate possibility of a recurrence.

Education: The Ways and Means Education subcommittee voted to take special programs from the basic school fund and have them stand on their own merits.

Highways: The House Highways Committee approved a speed limit bill, okayed a bill requiring a photo on a driver's license, and killed bills to raise the driver's age and to require periodic reexamination for a driver's license.

Constitution: The House Committee on Constitutional Revision adopted a different legislative apportionment plan from the Senate committee. And two representatives said they will take a third alternative to the House floor.

Committee Approves Bill To Block Creating New Community Colleges

SALEM (UPI) — The Senate Education Committee approved a bill Thursday to stem the creation of new community colleges for at least two years without pulling the pins from under eight existing ones, and one budding one.

The bill was approved 6-2 and sent to the Ways and Means Committee. It also contains a provision that would require more local support for community colleges in Portland and Salem.

It carries a clause that would let Douglas County go ahead with its planned college.

The bill was approved in the face of community college growth in the past two years that threatens to cost the financially-pinched state increasingly large sums if not checked.

The bill would:
— Put a two-year moratorium on new community colleges. After that, legislative approval for a new center would be required.
— Block state building money for new colleges until 1967, including Douglas County. Eight present centers, however, might get more building money.
— Revise the formula whereby the state pays as much as two-thirds of operating costs. Estimates say the change would increase Portland's local share per student from \$22 to \$48 and Salem's from \$15 to \$64. Unless their costs change, other parts of the formula would leave state support unchanged for Central Oregon, Southwest Oregon, Blue Mountain, Treasure Valley, Clatsop and Eugene Community Colleges.

Lutheran Rally Set

The ninth annual rally of the Southern Oregon Lutheran Women's Missionary League will be held in Grants Pass on April 23 from 10 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., with the society of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, Fifth and Evelyn streets, serving as host.

The rally will be conducted by the officers, Mrs. A. Henning, Jacksonville, president; Mrs. Herman Braatz, Klamath Falls, vice president; and Mrs. A. Johnke, Central Point, secretary-treasurer. Members from societies in Lakeview, Medford, Ashland, Tri-City, Sutherlin, and Roseburg will also participate.

Guest speakers will be Mrs. Richard Moeller of Cornelius, Oregon district president, and Mrs. William Fischel of Salem, who will show slides of the Holy Land. A luncheon will be served at 12 noon, and child care will be provided.

Couple Killed

CASCADE LOCKS (UPI) — A collision between a car and a flatbed truck took the lives of Frank Zamker, 67, and his wife, Vena, 66, of Wasco near here Thursday.

The crash occurred on the Columbia River Highway just west of Eagle Creek. The truck driver, Leo James Murphy of Portland, was not injured.

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Siskiyou Sheriff Recalls Deputies To Yreka In Overtime Economy Move

YREKA—Sheriff Al Cottar, Siskiyou County, is re-aligning his deputy force effective Monday, April 22.

Deputies in Tulelake, Mount Shasta, Happy Camp and Scott Valley will be called back into the Yreka office and will work out of Yreka instead of being stationed in a particular area of this widespread county.

Railroads' Crew Action Draws Fire

SALEM (UPI) — Trainmen charged Thursday that the railroads were attempting to amend the Senate-approved full crew law in hopes the legislature would adjourn before a House-Senate agreement could be reached.

The charge was made as the House Labor and Industries Committee conducted a hearing on the Senate measure.

The Senate-approved bill maintains the present requirement for three brakemen on main line freight trains.

Railroads want an amendment added that would allow the public utility commissioner to set minimum crew size after hearings. The railroads say only two brakemen are needed.

Railroads also object to the addition of the word "switching" in the Senate bill. The Senate measure changed the term "yard limits" to "yard switching limits."

Railroad spokesmen claimed yard limits were one thing, switching limits were another, and that railroad terminology does not include "yard switching limits."

The brotherhoods countered that the term "switching" was needed to keep railroads from setting up yard limit signs at the state's borders, and thus circumventing the full crew law.

The change is necessitated, Cottar indicated, because the Board of Supervisors failed to provide funds for a 40-hour week operation or additional personnel.

At present, Cottar said, many of the deputies are working 50-hours-a-week and more without overtime or compensatory time off, and the turnover in deputies has been alarming.

"We have had a turnover of 41-people in the last three years," Cottar explained, adding that the Siskiyou County Grand Jury had recommended an increase in pay as well as additional help for his office, but despite the fact that a Board of Supervisors committee be paid on the basis of a 40-hour week, the supervisors have made no such provision in their budget.

He said, "The supervisors have told me that we must eliminate all crime prevention effort. In other words we must let crime go, and then spend all our efforts trying to apprehend the criminal afterwards."

He added, "I have told the board that the only way I can operate under these conditions and keep down the turnover in personnel is to bring all resident men into Yreka, reduce their hours to 40 a week like the other 400 employees of the county. My department is the only one being handled in this manner."

Effective Monday, he explained, resident deputies will work out of the Yreka office. They will be on a 40-hour week, but having them all at Yreka will enable Cottar to provide a force around-the-clock.

However, he pointed out that Siskiyou is a widely spread county, and that there will be some time loss when activities call deputies to some areas of the county.

Dorris would not be affected by the reorganization since protection to Dorris is being furnished on a contract basis, Cottar explained.

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
