

Klamath Wool Clip Sold For 54 Cents Per Pound

The directors of the Klamath Wool Pool sold their 1963 wool clip for 54.7 cents per pound, under sealed bids, on Wednesday to the J. R. Condren Company, Wickenburg, Ariz., who submitted the highest bid on the pool.

Robert Hunt, president of the pool, stated that there were three bidders present at the opening and one telephone bid was received on the pool. The second highest bid of 52.08 cents was submitted by R. C. Elliott and Company, Salt Lake City. The Elliott Company has been the highest bidder on the pool for the past

three years. They bid 50.53 cents per pound for the 1962 clip.

There are 20,000 fleeces of farm flock wool consigned by 150 Klamath Basin producers in this year's pool. The directors who manage the pool: Robert Hunt, Klamath Falls; Earl Mack, Klamath Falls; Lester Moore, Merrill; Warren Conner, Merrill; Henry Oberheide, Bonanza; Kermit Keyser, Bonanza; and Oliver Perry, Tulelake; were present for the opening of the bids.

If weather permits normal operations, the wool will be shorn and delivered around June 1. The buyer will receive the wool in two deliveries, one about June 15 and the other about July 1.

Indian Arts Festival Set

The fourth annual Indian Festival of Arts, is scheduled for June 21-24 at La Grande.

Head chief of all Oregon Indians, Gov. Mark O. Hatfield, will attend.

Also to be present is Junaluska, (Arthur S.) Cherokee playwright and producer of New York City, who will spend three weeks in Oregon prior to the festival to give dramatic lessons and train Northwest Indian young people, probably of college age, eight women and 12 men, to take part in "The Dance of the 12 Moons," a 45-minute presentation which he wrote, based on the authentic dances and rituals of many states.

The lessons will be financed by the festival board. There will be tryouts in La Grande the latter part of May or first of June. Anyone chosen to play a part must be able to maintain expenses in La Grande for two weeks.

There will be teepee space available so people may camp and food would be the only expense.

Tentative plans call for a tour with this group and the board would be interested in hearing from Jaycees or some similar group that might sponsor the appearance to help inspire and encourage the Indian.

State Capitol Dangers Noted

SALEM (UPI) — Rep. Clinton Haight tried to call attention to "dangerous" areas in the State Capitol on the House Floor Thursday, but was gavelled to silence by House Speaker Clarence Barton.

The Baker Democrat said the usually-crowded basement restaurant has only one exit into a hallway, and a fire could be disastrous, particularly if it blocked the doorway.

Haight said the capitol generally is badly marked. He said one door marked "exit" leads to a broom closet. And, he said, he followed "fallout shelter" arrows and found himself outdoors.

Haight tried to speak under a point of personal privilege, but Barton told him the point "is not personal to you" and the House has more important business to attend to.

Railroads, Firemen Talk Featherbedding Issue

CHICAGO (UPI)—Representatives of the nation's railroads and the firemen's union met jointly today for the first time since President Kennedy ordered an emergency board to get the facts in the featherbedding dispute.

Judge Samuel I. Rosenman, chairman of the presidential body, was "cautiously optimistic" that the meeting would be fruitful.

The joint talks followed several rounds of separate meetings between the board and the two sides both in Washington and Chicago.

"This is the first time they will

get together in real bargaining before the board," Rosenman told a special news conference Thursday night.

"It is significant in any labor dispute when you can get the two parties together. At least they will be getting each other's views."

Rosenman said "now things look a little brighter" for negotiations with the other four brotherhoods involved in the dispute with the nation's 195 Class 1 railroads.

The dispute between the railroads and the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers is the most crucial because the railroads have proposed eliminating 13,000 loc. active firemen's jobs within one year and 27,000 other firemen's jobs through attrition.

The controversy over featherbedding—jobs claimed to be unnecessary—has raged for more than a generation. It has been complicated by modernization in the industry, competition from other transportation industries, a loss in passenger fare, and a drop in the railroad work force from two million to 800,000.

Although the unions have not voiced the threat recently, they threatened last year to strike if the railroads impose vast, job-eliminating rules—revising changes.

The U.S. Supreme Court author-

ized the railroads to institute the changes in March, and Kennedy appointed an emergency board under the Taft-Hartley Act April 4. The board has 60 days to study the situation and make a report.

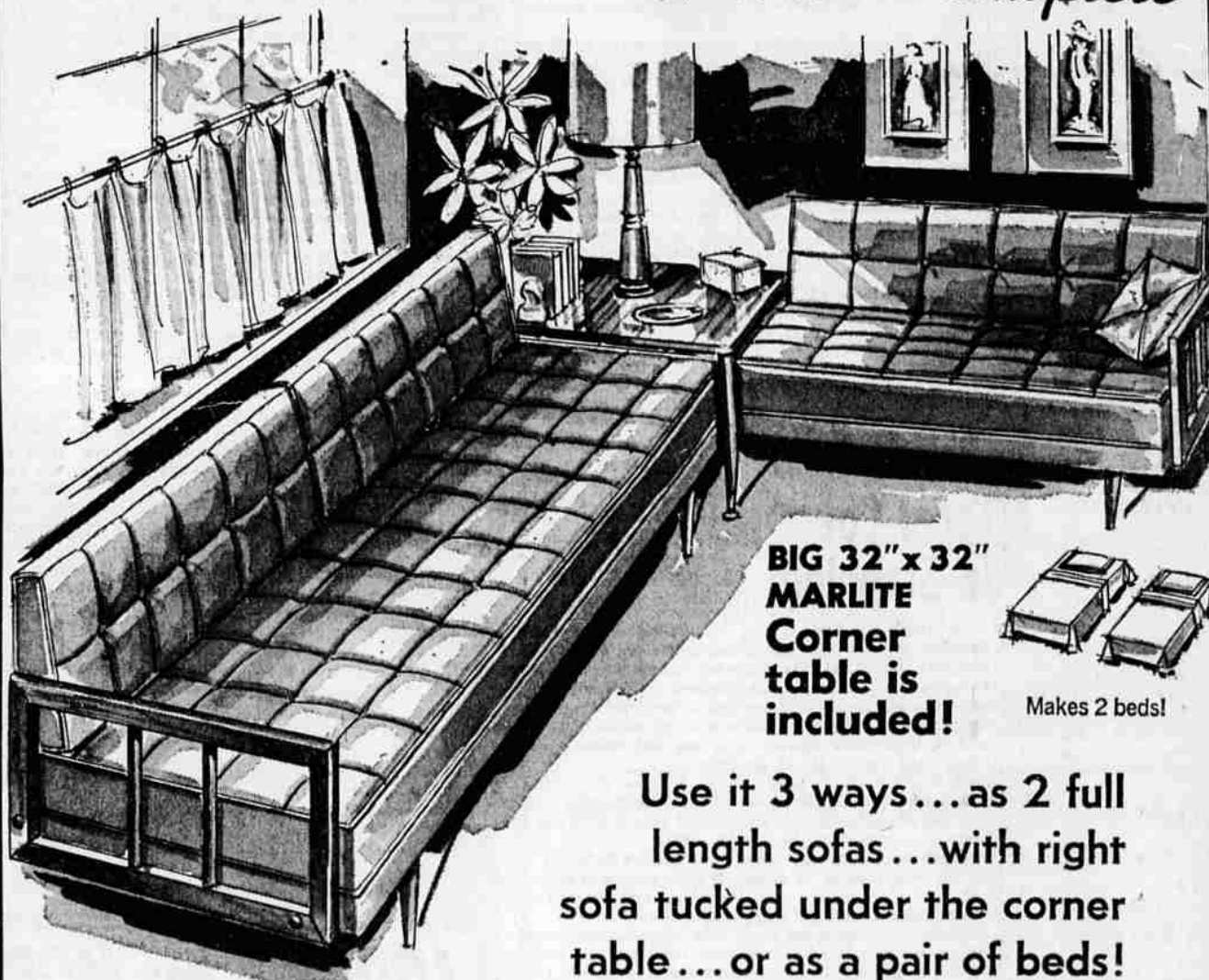
