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OTI Students Contribute 135 Pints At Bloodmobile Visit

Oregon Technical Institute students contributed 135 pints of blood at the second day operation of the Red Cross bloodmobile in the area: members of the Circle K Club sponsored the visit to the campus. Oregon Technical Institute participates in the inter-collegiate competition for Oregon colleges, and the April 17 drawing on the campus brings the school's total for this year to 323 pints, or roughly one-third of the enrollment. Red Cross blood chairman, Mrs. Winston Purvine, predicts this will take the school close to the top in the standings of Oregon colleges for the current school year.

A total of 378 pints of blood was garnered by the bloodmobile in April. The lumber firms and IWA led the contributors with 58 pints from Weyerhaeuser, Mouldingcraft, Metter Brothers, Modoc Lumber, Swan Lake and Jeld. Wen public utilities were second, with Pacific Power and Light edging out Pacific Northwest Bell fourteen to 12. Contributions from California Pacific Utilities and Oregon Water Corporation brought the division total to 31 pints.

Employees of Sears Roebuck, Millers Department Store, LaPointe's, Your Store and J. C. Penney participated, with LaPointe's furnishing the largest number of donors.

Four donors from the Herald and News represented their division.

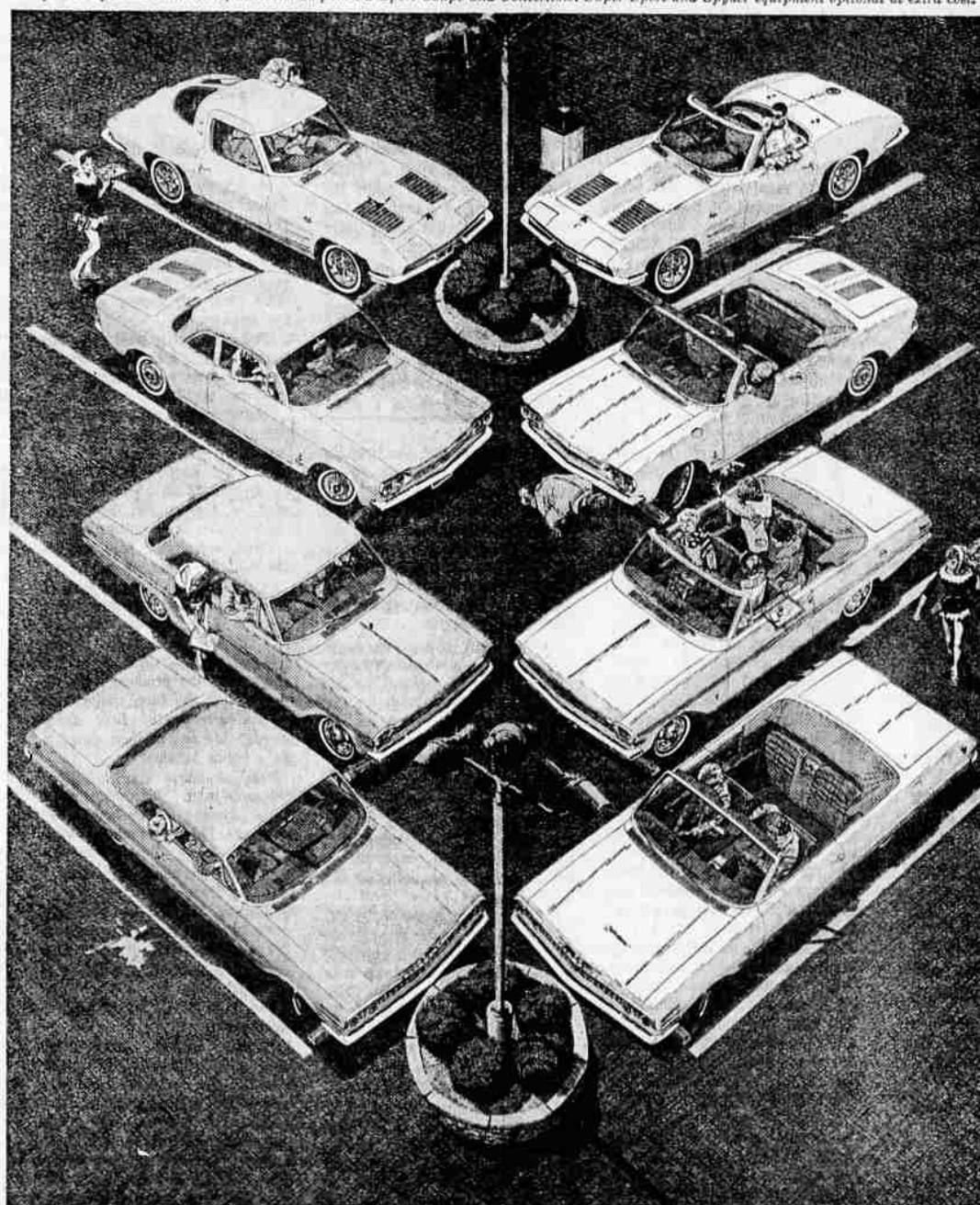

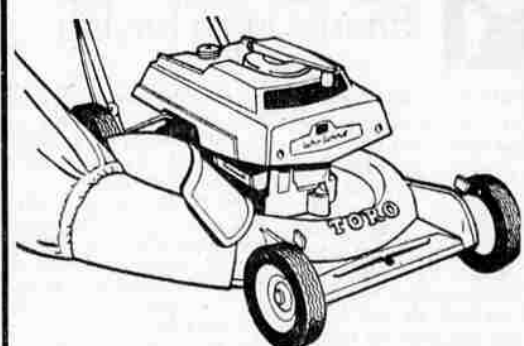
