

Pioneer Missionaries And Miners Contribute To Church Development

On foot, on mules, and by stage they came. One hundred and ten years ago the roads were trails and the trails were often unmapped, sometimes obscure, and always tough going. In spite of the hardships, the Catholic priests found their way to Northern California in 1853 and later established a mission in Mount Shasta. That mission grew into what is now St. Anthony's Catholic Parish.

The church actually began to function in the summer of 1853 when Rev. James Croke, working on the Oregon Mission, came as far south as Yreka to hold services in the camps and surrounding diggings. It was probably Rev. Florian Schweninger, a Benedictine monk and pastor of Shasta and Trinity counties, who made a pilgrimage to the camps along the North Fork of the Salmon River around the same

known as Etna, and through Fort Jones, where the military was stationed because of Indian uprisings in the area.

When the priests finally arrived in Yreka, the town had 6,000 inhabitants, a proportionate complement of saloons and gambling houses, and occasionally a lynching. But they immediately set to work and erected a frame church, which was replaced by a new brick church in 1866.

South of Yreka, the two priests visited Greenhorn, Deadwood, Fort Jones, Greenville, Etna Mills, and Callaghan. Other towns on their tours included Scott Bar, Somers Bar, Forks of the Salmon River, Sawyers Bar, Orleans, and Happy Camp. All of these communities were reached on foot or by mule.

In 1857 Rev. Schweninger was appointed a pastor at Yreka, but the following year the parish was without a resident priest. A Rev. L. Snyder took over in 1859 and held regular services at Hawkinsville, French Bar, and Scott Bar. In 1860 arrangements were concluded to transfer Siskiyou County into the newly formed Vicariate of Marysville.

After a succession of priests, Yreka was again with a pastor in 1863. In 1864 another new priest arrived and over a period of years many advances were made in the building of mission churches in Siskiyou County.

The town of McCloud was added to the list of missions in 1903, and an independent parish was created at Dunsmuir. The parish of Dunsmuir then took on the missions of Edgewood, Mott, Sisson (now Mount Shasta), Squaw Valley, and Upton. In 1912, McCloud and Sisson remained as Dunsmuir missions, but Edgewood, Mott and Upton became attached once more to Yreka.

Until 1919 a Rev. Carr was pastor of Dunsmuir, succeeded by Rev. Patrick Cronan, who stayed until 1922. In July of that year a young priest named Rev. Michael Myles assumed the duties of the parish for a few months. In those days the priest walked the eight miles between Dunsmuir and Mount Shasta as there were no roads, but on special occasions there was a train available.

Weed is mentioned as a mission of Dunsmuir during this period, and in 1937 it was made a separate parish.

Mount Shasta continued to remain a part of the Dunsmuir parish for several years, but in 1947 it also became independent and St. Anthony's Parish was formed. Rev. Edward Christen of Sacramento was named pastor of the new parish and said his first mass in Mount Shasta in Nov. 9, 1947.

He remained until 1955 when Rev. Myles, who had served the area many years before, was sent from Yreka to take his place. Rev. Myles is still with St. Anthony's and Rev. Christen is now back in Sacramento.

In the next few years, Parishioners pitched in to build a small hall, rectory, and a new church turning the old church into a hall. The new church was dedicated in 1954 by Bishop Robert Armstrong of the Sacramento Diocese, with which St. Anthony's has long been associated.

In 1954, the dream of the Bishop of the San Francisco Diocese almost 101 years earlier was realized. Through the efforts of dedicated missionary laborers and the hard work of pioneer ranchers and miners, St. Anthony's Parish and Mount Shasta finally boasted a modern brick church complete with mosaic windows. In 1962 a large mosaic was installed in the vestibule, adding an air of peaceful dignity.

St. Anthony's Altar Society also played an important role in establishing the present church. Many thousands of dollars were raised by the society over a period of years to attain the goal of a new sanctuary furnished with beautiful statues and altar cloths of expensive linen and lace, created by the women themselves. St. Anthony's today then is far removed from mule rides, gold diggings, and masses conducted in tents.

Areas Gain In Members

ANDERSON, Ind. — Church of God constituency has reached a new high of 474,247 in some 40 geographical areas where the movement serves, leaders at the international offices in Anderson recently announced.

Rev. R. Eugene Sterner, director of the Division of Church Service, said adherents in the United States and Canada number 385,719.

Reviewing 1962 achievements, when the number of ordained ministers and missionaries of the church increased, Rev. Sterner said there is a growing trend within the Church of God to strengthen and consolidate smaller congregations.

Slight variations in leading state totals were reported last year, but substantial constituency gains over a five-year period are noted. Church of God growth in 1962 was most notable in Alabama, California, Florida, Indiana, Kentucky, Michigan, Mississippi, New Jersey, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, and Wisconsin.

Annual Report Shows Membership Increase

The annual congregational meeting of the First Methodist Church was held Tuesday evening with Rev. George Roseberry, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Medford, presiding. Following a buffet dinner, the 1963 activity reports were heard and officers were elected.

The membership report showed a total membership of 778, an increase of 60 over the previous year.

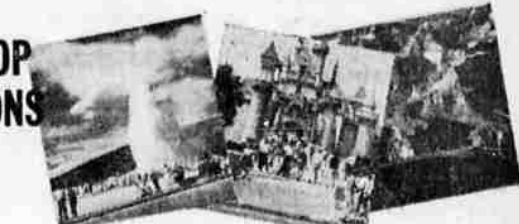

Presbyterian Missionary To Address Local Groups

The congregations of the First Presbyterian Church and Peace Memorial Presbyterian Church will meet together Thursday, April 25, to hear Miss Florence L. Logan, Presbyterian fraternal worker recently returned from Taiwan.

Beginning at 7:30 p.m., Miss Logan's program will feature slides on the work done in the Middle East. First Presbyterian will be the host church, providing child care and special films for children.

A family night potluck at 6:30 p.m. will precede the speaker. Mrs. Don Bauer, missionary education secretary, will be in charge of the family night arrangements.

Miss Logan, now in retirement, taught Bible and personal evangelism at the Presbyterian Bible School at Hsin Chee and also directed the self-help department. The school is under the direction of the Presbyterian Church in Formosa.

A native of the state of Washington, Miss Logan was graduated from the University of Washington, Seattle, in 1919 and spent the next two years studying at the Bible Institute of Los Angeles and Moody Bible Institute, Chicago. In 1921 she was appointed by the former Board of Foreign Missions of the Presbyterian Church, U.S.A. and assigned to China.

After language study she was stationed at Paoing, near Peking, for country evangelistic work among women and children. After her first furlough, during which she served as director of religious education at First Presbyterian Church, Everett, Wash., she returned to Paoing and continued in rural evangelistic work. When she returned from furlough in 1937, she found much destruction in Paoing as a result of the war with Japan. There were 700 refugees on the mission compound, and she helped to open Bible institutes for boys and girls, did relief work and home visitation, and led chapel services.

Miss Logan was in Paoing when the United States entered the war. Her activities were greatly restricted, but she kept in touch with many of her Chinese colleagues. In 1942 she was repatriated and for the next few years was on the staff of the Eastshore Community Church in Richmond.

Back in Paoing in January, 1947, Miss Logan again took up her evangelistic and relief work. She opened a hostel for refugee girls and a child welfare center, led hospital chapel services, and conducted Bible classes for students and businessmen. She and one other American woman were the only westerners in the city.

In 1952, Miss Logan was transferred to Taiwan to serve under the Church of Christ in Taiwan, through the Canadian Presbyterian Church, in evangelistic work among Mandarin-speaking refugees from the China mainland.

Her work centered in the Bible School, teaching Bible classes in both Chinese and English, and starting village Sunday schools, directing daily vacation Bible schools, and visiting a village of Christian aborigines who until recently were head-hunters.
