

Koufax Leads Dodgers' Win; Maris Homers To Whip Senators

Giants, Cardinals Continue To Win

The most important figures in the National League today—far more significant than the mere standings—show that Sandy Koufax has struck out 28 batters and allowed only 12 hits in 23 innings. Add 'em up and they mean that the Los Angeles Dodgers' south-paw fireballer is fully recovered from the finger injury that cost the Dodgers the 1962 pennant and almost ended Sandy's career. They also mean that despite a faltering start the Dodgers are A-1 set for the long haul with Koufax and Don Drysdale to fire away as the league's best 1-2 pitching punch. Koufax, sidelined virtually the entire second half of the 1962 season and winless after July 12, struck out 14 batters and pitched a two-hitter Friday night to give the Dodgers a 2-0 victory over the Houston Colts.

The ratio of strikeouts to innings pitched has always been the way to judge Koufax because of his blinding speed. He struck out an NL record of 269 batters in 256 innings in 1961 and had 216 strikeouts in 184 innings when he had a 14-4 record halfway through the 1962 campaign.

The San Francisco Giants defeated the Chicago Cubs, 5-1, the New York Mets broke into the win column with a 5-4 victory over the Milwaukee Braves and the St. Louis Cardinals beat the Philadelphia Phillies, 5-1, in other NL games. Cincinnati and Pittsburgh were rained out.

In the American League, the New York Yankees defeated the Washington Senators, 8-4, the Boston Red Sox beat the Detroit Tigers, 3-1, and the Chicago White Sox topped the Minnesota Twins, 3-1, the Baltimore Orioles scored an 8-5 victory over the Cleveland Indians and the Kansas City Athletics swept the Los Angeles Angels, 3-2, in both games of a doubleheader.

Willie Mays hit his third homer of the season and Juan Marichal pitched a six-hitter for the Giants, who regained sole possession of first place with their seventh victory in nine games.

The Mets ended their eight-game season-opening losing streak with a two-run ninth-inning rally climaxed when rookie Ron Hunt

Duo Airs Purchase Of Eagles

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — Paul Brown, fired Cleveland Browns coach and general manager, and Herbert Barnes, a real estate tycoon, ran neck and neck today in what appeared to be a two-man race to buy the Philadelphia Eagles.

Owners of the Eagles put the club up for sale Friday with a price tag in excess of \$4.5 million and a proviso the team be kept here.

Frank McNamee, Eagles' president, said Brown indicated he was "interested a couple of weeks ago" in purchasing the club, which set an attendance mark of 420,000 last season despite a 3-10-1 record. At that time, reports had Brown bidding \$4.5 million for the Eagles.

Brown, kicked out by Cleveland last January, was not at the meeting. McNamee said the Eagles didn't know where he was.

"He'll see it in the papers and call us," the president said.

It was learned that before the stockholders met Friday to place the Eagles on the block, Barnes, who lives in suburban Warrington, Pa., made a \$4.5 million offer through attorney John Schwartz.

Schwartz reportedly said Barnes, a vice president and director of the William Penn Racing Association in Bucks County, Pa., was prepared to make a "cash deposit of any amount within 24 hours."

Schwartz was quoted as telling the stockholders Barnes wanted to keep the ownership in Philadelphia, instead of turning it over to "outsiders." Barnes was declared ready to buy 51 per cent of the stock and retain as many of the original stockholders who wished to stay.

McNamee and Mike O'Neill, a shareholder and president of the Liberty Bell Association, were authorized by the 65 stockholders to conclude a sale "as swiftly as possible." The current Eagles were purchased in 1949 by 100 men who put up \$3,000 each. The sale price sets the value of each share today at a minimum of \$30,000.

"We are instructed to carry on negotiations with people who have indicated they would buy the club," McNamee said. "The team will stay in Philadelphia, positively. There is no intention of ever leaving Philadelphia. Besides, the National Football League wouldn't let it leave."

Brown's interest in the Eagles has been known for many weeks. Other groups made tentative feelers, but it was apparent the NFL and Commissioner Pete Rozelle looked kindly in the direction of Brown, who made Cleveland an outstanding team.

McNamee said a "substantial majority" of the stockholders voted to sell, motivated by the price offered for the stock.

Unbeaten Horn Stops Garduno

EUGENE, Ore. (UPI) — Unbeaten Bobby Horn of Springfield, Ore., scored a seventh round technical knockout over Luis Garduno of Tucson, Ariz., in a scheduled 10-round middleweight fight Friday night.

Referee Harry Matthews stopped the bout at 1:55 of the round.

Horn, who weighed 156 pounds, improved his record to 15-0-1. Garduno weighed 157.

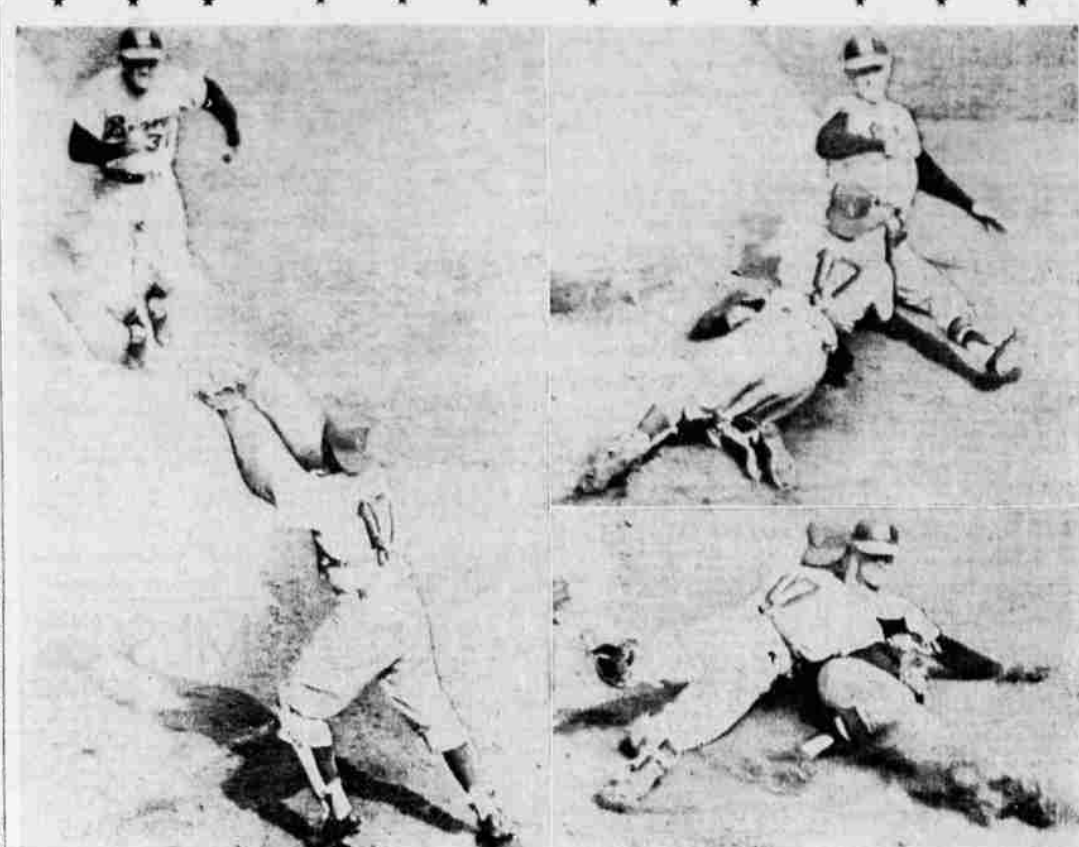
A crowd of 1,200 watched the fight.

Mets Finally Win Game; Leased Player Drives In Winning Runs

NEW YORK (UPI) — Leave it to those incredible Mets to win their first game with a lend-lease ballplayer.

He's 22-year-old second baseman Ron Hunt and he brought the Mets their first victory of the season Friday after eight straight losses with a two-run ninth-inning double that beat the Milwaukee Braves, 5-4.

Hunt is with the Mets merely on a conditional basis. They paid the Braves \$5,000 for a "look" at him last October and must shell out another \$20,000 by May 9 if they intend to keep him.

"We've just paid Milwaukee \$95,000 for that fella — cash," raved an elated Casey Stengel, moments after Hunt doubled off reliever Claude Raymond to snap the Braves' seven-game winning streak.

Pounded on all sides by his joyous Met teammates, who acted as if they had just clinched the pennant, Hunt fought for breath without fully realizing for the moment he enabled the Mets to better by one game their 0-9 season start of a year ago.

Hits In Clutch
"The boy hits very good in the pinches," Stengel was saying in his private office. "He looks very cool and he's very brave at the plate for a fella who hasn't been around major league pitching long."

The victory was a typical Met performance. First, they staked Roger Craig to a 3-0 lead, then allowed the Braves to go ahead, 4-3, with three runs in the eighth and one more in the ninth when reliever Ken Mackenzie walked son's frantic relay.

Choo-Choo Coleman opened the last of the ninth with a single up the middle and the crowd of 3,101 rattled the rafters. Pinch hitter Tim Harkness flied to deep right but Jim Hickman sent Coleman galloping to third with a double to left.

Raymond then took over for Frank Funk and Hunt clipped his third pitch to deep left, scoring Coleman with the tying run and 4-3, with three runs in the eighth and one more in the ninth when reliever Ken Mackenzie walked son's frantic relay.

The face-busters had one more go, however. After the game Jim Baird of the Canucks exchanged punches with Seattle goalie Al Millar, and both teams returned to the ice for a final melee.

Seattle won the game when Jim Hay and Don Chitupka rapped in third period goals to overcome Vancouver's 3-2 lead. The Totems had gone in front in the first period but fell behind 3-2 on a goal by Vancouver's Dave Duke.

The deciding game in the division will be played Monday at Seattle.

San Francisco and Portland tangled in the seventh game of their 3-3 Southern Division series Tuesday night at Portland.

Seattle's George Konik and Adam Keller of Vancouver were the first to trade punches, but before long everyone was in the act, including the referee and two linesmen.

Peace was momentarily restored, but it was shattered again almost immediately when Vancouver forward Bob Kabeal and Seattle fan disagreed, with animation. Three disputatious fans were ejected.

The game, which saw the Totems square the best-of-seven series at three wins apiece, featured a third period brawl which included every player on both teams and a few out-of-uniform participants.

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Home Run King Returns To Fold

Everything's "Roger" today with the New York Yankees. Substitute straight baseball language for the Air Force lingo and that simply means that Roger Maris is back in the lineup and the world champions have a "big bomber" look again.

The modern home run king returned to the Yankee batting order Friday night after missing the first eight games of the American League season and celebrated with a game-winning ninth-inning homer that sent New York on to an 8-4 win over the Washington Senators.

Elston Howard had preceded the blast with a homer and the Yanks went on to score five runs and present relief pitcher Luis Arroyo with his first victory of the season. Arroyo was pitching in relief of Stan Williams, who gave up three runs in 7 1-3 innings in his second start as a Yankee.

Tigers Drop Two
The Boston Red Sox dealt the Detroit Tigers 3-1 and 5-1 losses. The Chicago White Sox beat the Minnesota Twins, 3-1, the Baltimore Orioles downed the Cleveland Indians, 8-5, and the Kansas City Athletics swept a doubleheader from the Los Angeles Angels, winning both games by 3-2 scores in other American League games.

In the National League, the New York Mets edged the Milwaukee Braves, 5-4, the St. Louis Cardinals beat Philadelphia 5-1, the Los Angeles Dodgers defeated the Houston Colts, 2-0, and the San Francisco Giants toppled the Chicago Cubs, 5-1. Cincinnati and Pittsburgh were rained out.

Howard led off the ninth with a homer that broke a 3-3 tie and Maris, sidelined until Friday with a muscle injury, followed with a drive into the left centerfield bullpen. The Senators rallied for a fourth run in their half of the ninth. Reliever Jim Duckworth was the loser.

Socks Two Homers
Eddie Bressoud hit two homers in the first game and Ike DeLoach pitched a two-hitter in the second as the Red Sox won their Patriots' Day morning and afternoon contests with the Tigers. Gene Conley went 7 2-3 innings to win the opener for the Sox. Dick Stuart's double and Lou Clinton's triple were the big blows of a four-run sixth-inning rally that won the second game. Phil Regan and Frank Lary were the losing pitchers.

Juan Pizarro pitched a five-hitter and struck out nine for the White Sox, who dealt Minnesota's Camilo Pascual his third straight defeat.

A homer by Al Smith and a double by Russ Snyder featured a five-run eighth-inning rally that enabled Baltimore's Wes Stock to post his second win in relief.

Norm Siebern and George Alusik hit homers for Kansas City in the first game as Orlando Pena went seven innings for his second win. The Athletics won the nightcap when Ed Charles' single with the bases filled drove in Gino Cimoli. Bo Belinsky and Bob Turley were the losing pitchers.

Laker Elgin Baylor tried to be a one-man team and he did re-live the locals to some extent and they finished the first half trailing by only six points—38-32. The Lakers made a rush at the finish but it was not good enough to overcome their third quarter collapse when they scored only 18.

Celtic Tom Heinsohn topped scorers with 33 points. Russell broke up numerous plays, scored 22 points and had 19 rebounds. Baylor finished with a total of 31 points.
