Modoc Tax, School Vote Announced

ALTURAS—The Modoc County superintendent of schools, Clara Eddie, reported Thursday morning that the unofficial returns from the county-wide school board and tax elections were now completed.

On the school tax increase issues, two were voted on in the Arlington and Newell districts, with both over-rides passing. The Newell tax increase from 90 cents to \$1.25 passed 180 to 124. This increase is a permanent raise. Arlington voted 86 yes to 20 no for an increase from 80 cents to \$1.20 for three years.

A write-in candidate in the Arlington district, June Boyd, received 33 votes over her next nearest rival, also a write-in, Delbert Craig, who had four votes. Mrs. Boyd in ineligible to take the office, however. Although she is the winner from vote count, she was not a registered voter until after the deadline for registration. Craig, with four votes, will be the winner for the trustee post.

Fishermen Face Grim First Day

LAKEVIEW—A somewhat grim opening day faced anglers on the Fremont National Forest, according to a staff report. The recent storms have made impassable many of the roads that remained open through most of the winter. The saturated ground is hazardous for vehicle travel anywhere off the surfaced road and even shoulders are soft.

The Drews Valley, Thomas Creek, and Warner districts report that all streams are high and roily as of Tuesday, April 16. Warmer weather would result in muddy water below the 5,500 foot level on all streams originating within the southern portion of the Fremont National Forest.

The upper portion of Deep Creek, Dismal Creek, Willow Creek, Honey Creek, Coltonwood Meadows Lake, Dairy Creek, and other streams on the Thomas Creek District off surfaced roads are inaccessible. Paisley reports that the Chewaucan River road is passable to Marster Springs and the river is roily.

The personnel of the Fremont suggests that fishermen stay on paved or cindered roads only to avoid costly expenses involved in rescue work and serious erosion damage to forest roads.

Printing Error Found On Tulelake Ballots

ALTURAS—A printing error in the ballots caused doubt until late Wednesday afternoon as to the validity of the school board vote for the Tulelake Joint Union High School district.

Over 200 ballots were cast before it was discovered that some ballots stated the voter should vote for two instead of the correct three candidates. Election officers checked the ballots and found the first 100 were printed correctly with "vote for 3"

printed on the ballot. As soon as the mistake was discovered the election officials cautioned all voters to vote for three candidates.

It was assumed until a thorough survey of the ballots was made by the election board, the superintendent of schools office, and the Modoc County district attorney, Robert Barclay, that the election would have to be run over.

The investigators found that regardless of the incorrect directions on the ballots, all but four voters had voted for three candidates.

Barclay stated Wednesday evening after a complete study of the ballots, "I don't believe after inspecting the ballots that the validity of the election is affected. There would have to be 41 ballots voted incorrectly before the election could be successfully contested. This is due to the margin between the last winner and the next highest on the ballot."

The results when tallied were: Marie R. Boyden, 206; David L. Carmen, 200; Robert L. Baker, 188; Marion F. Palmer, 145; Jack Crawford, 79; Ray Oehlerich, 57; John Selezak, 21, and Sherman Milligan, one.

Three trustees were voted on in the election. Boyden, Carmen and Baker were the winners.

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
