Reds Reinforce Berlin Wall

BERLIN (UPI) — Communist border guards and civilian workers were seen working on 10 other spots in the border area reinforcing tank traps. They were placing new concrete plates on tank obstacles already built on the east side of the wall.

Communist border guards opened fire Saturday morning in the eastern sector of Berlin and captured an elderly man as he was trying to scramble over the barbed wire to West Berlin.

Police said he was arrested just as he reached the first of four strands of barbed wire on the French sector border shortly after midnight. Guards fired four carbine shots at him but he apparently was not hit. Three more carbine shots were heard near the American sector, apparently fired at other refugees.

"This will hold any armored car or any tank there is," a West Berlin police officer said. He said a total of 80 Communist

Suicide Bill Gets Frown From House

SALEM (UPI) — The House refused Saturday to make suicide a crime in Oregon in order to help officers prevent suicides.

The House objected to a feature carrying a possible penalty for attempted or threatened suicide.

Oregon now has no state law against suicide.

It would have taken 31 votes to pass the bill. The vote was 28-29, with three absent.

Rep. Berkeley Lent, D-Portland, said the intent of the bill was to give officers the authority to go into a home or hotel where a suicide is threatened and stop it.

He said officers now lack such authority, since suicide is not a crime, and some policemen have tried to prevent suicides have been threatened with suits.

Rep. Robert Chappell, R-Portland, said "in addition to going in and turning off the gas, somebody has to restrain a person who wants to commit suicide until he gets over his despondency."

"This bill will allow authorities to reach people and help them," said Rep. James Redden, D-Medford.

But Rep. Grace Peck, D-Portland, and others objected to a section of the bill making it possible to sentence a person to a fine or imprisonment for trying to kill himself.

"This is a horrible bill," Mrs. Peck said. "I can't see when anyone becomes despondent enough to kill himself that we should punish him."

Lent said the bill is similar to Portland's present city ordinance, and Chappell said some penalty is needed to make suicide a crime, although "I don't see why it has to be so large."

The House spent the 97th day of the 1963 Legislature in its first Saturday meeting. The Senate did not meet.

The House passed and sent to the Senate a bill completely overhauling the law governing local budgeting.

A key feature is that more information must be made public. A budget message would be required, salary information would have to be given in greater detail, and publicity would have to increase.

The new local budget law also would:

- Broaden the definition as a municipal corporation to increase the number of units that must budget.
- Provide for use of modern accounting procedures.
- Tighten various budgeting requirements.
- Make the tax commission the interpreting authority for the local budget law.
- And let a citizens group seek a declaratory judgment to stop a budget action before it is taken.

Civil Defense Budget Fight Brews As House Cuts Funds

SALEM (UPI) — A new battle to determine what course federal CD officials might take. The co-chairmen of the Ways and Means Committee met Thursday with regional CD Director Charles Ralls, who first said the CD cutback would make Oregon ineligible for federal matching funds, then indicated aid might not be cut after all.

The House Monday approved a 50,000 CD budget for a three-person agency attached to the governor's office. Hatfield had requested \$195,000 to finance a 20-man agency.

The civil defense budget has not yet been assigned to a Senate committee. The assignment may hinge on what action federal officials plan.

Hatfield Friday issued a press release stating "ralls has flatly stated in writing that the proposed three-person budget would mean the end of the (federal matching fund) help for Oregon."

Hatfield said the federal cutback would take money from the CD programs in Portland, and Benton, Deschutes, Klamath, Lincoln, Multnomah, Polk, Umatilla and Washington counties.

Hatfield warned of the CD cutback, "If the state closes up shop, the counties will too."

200 Comb Mountain For Missing Youth

MURPHY, Idaho (UPI) — More than 200 men in air and ground parties combed a 75 mile long, 60-mile wide Idaho-Oregon borderland area Saturday for a missing Idaho teen-ager.

As the task force looking for Delford Sharpe, 19, Gayway Junction, Idaho, swelled, Owyhee County Sheriff Al Barberis said he had a growing feeling "We'll come up with him and he'll be alive."

Thirty-five U.S. Marine Corps reservists from Boise reached the base camp along the Idaho-Oregon border early this afternoon to lend their efforts. The national guard at Homedale got clearances and men from that unit were expected by daybreak Sunday.

Fifteen airmen from Mountain Home joined the search Friday night.

The Air Force sent a helicopter into the rugged, mountainous area from Mountain Home AFB. Seven planes took to the air in between morning snow squalls and Barberis said three more were due in this afternoon.

"We are working from Murphy to Triamble to Jordan Valley, from Owyhee Reservoir to Douglas and back to Murphy," Barberis said.

Tracks believed those of the missing youth were found and lost again along Succor Creek.

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Two Elected To Offices

Two Klamath Falls residents who are employed in law enforcement branches of city and county government were elected to high posts at a dinner-business meeting of the Southern Oregon Police Officers Association Thursday night at Gold Hill.

City Police detective sergeant, Walter Conrady, was named president of the organization and Arlene Bowman, a secretary in the Klamath County district attorney's office, was picked as the association's secretary.

The association covers about seven of the southern counties and represents all branches of law enforcement, including county sheriff, state police, city police, juvenile officers and judges.

Police Hold 3 Suspects

Grants Pass police arrested a man and Yreka police apprehended a man and woman who had been on a shoplifting spree together and had accumulated about \$2,000 worth of goods collected in area stores.

The Grants Pass police notified Klamath Falls police that at least three stores in this city were among the trio's victims.

The car that was being operated by Raymond Dean Lewis, who was picked up in Grants Pass, was equipped with a false bottom in the trunk where all the loot was hidden.

Loren Phillip Beckett Jr. and Patricia Ann Larkin were the pair picked up in Yreka.

Beckett and the woman have been charged with larceny and Lewis was charged with possession of stolen property.

Political Predictions Tinge Governor's Meet

PHOENIX, Ariz. (UPI) — Three Republicans and two Democratic governors met Saturday to lay plans for a summer meeting of the National Governors' Conference.

But they found it difficult to keep their minds off the 1964 Republican presidential nomination.

Arizona Gov. Paul Fannin opened the issue Friday night by predicting flatly that Sen. Barry Goldwater, a longtime friend of Fannin's, will be the GOP presidential nominee next year.

Fannin, a 56-year-old Republican now in his third term, told a newsman he had "doubts" a few months ago that Goldwater could win the nomination, but added categorically "I now feel he will be the candidate."

Another Republican often mentioned for the nomination, New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller, was not present at the meeting of the National Governors' Conference executive committee. But Oregon Gov. Mark Hatfield, a possible vice presidential nominee and a Rockefeller supporter, was due to arrive Saturday.

Conference Program

Hatfield and other governors will begin Monday with the three-day Western Governors' Conference, featuring discussions on traffic safety, education and juvenile delinquency.

Fannin, the host governor of the conference in nearby Scottsdale, expressed a hope that the governors would not play politics at this conference," said Fannin. "We in the West do not have the same feeling regarding national office that seems to exist in the Midwest and Eastern states."

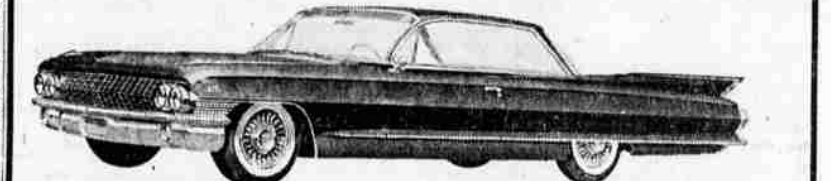
Fannin conceded that despite his close personal friendship with Goldwater, the senator had not told him yet that he would be a candidate for the nomination.

In fact, said Fannin, Goldwater "still insists he's going to be a candidate for re-election as United States senator next year."

Those Present

Attending Saturday's executive session of the National Governors' Conference were Republican Govs. Fannin, Robert Smylie of Idaho, and George D. Smylie of Utah. Democrats on the committee were Govs. John M. Dalton of Missouri and Albert Russellini of Washington, chairman of the National Governors' Conference.

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
