

Suicide-Bent Prisoner Sent To State Hospital

A suicide attempt by an inmate of the Klamath County Jail resulted in the transfer of the victim to the State Hospital at Salem Friday afternoon, Sheriff Murray "Red" Britton has disclosed to the Herald and News.

The victim was Raymond Hoover, 30, Chiloquin, who slashed his arm below the elbow with a razor blade while occupying a cell at the county jail, about 1:30 p.m., Thursday.

When the incident occurred, Hoover had been an inmate of the jail less than 18 hours since he was returned to Klamath Falls from the state hospital on Wednesday. The defendant, indicted by the grand jury late last year for the larceny of an automobile, had been committed to the state hospital recently following a pre-trial sanity hearing in Klamath County Circuit Court.

Last Wednesday, a sheriff's deputy and jailer went to the Salem hospital and returned with Hoover after a representative of the institution informed District Attorney Dale Crabtree that the patient had been given a psychiatric examination and would be released.

The thwarted suicide attempt marked the second time that Hoover had sought to take his own life since he was apprehended by Reno police and held for sheriff's deputies last Feb. 9.

At that time Hoover, wanted in this county for jumping \$3,000 bail in connection with the larceny charge, slashed his arm in practically the same place as the more recent wound and was taken to a Nevada hospital, where he was treated and released to Klamath County deputies.

Prince Asks Safe Conduct

VIENTIANE, Laos (UPI)—Neutralist Premier Souvanna Phouma asked his pro-Communist half-brother Saturday for safe conduct to re-visit the critical Plain of Jars for a new study of the fighting there.

Souvanna said he and the International Control Commission (ICC) cabled Prince Souphanouvong, leader of the pro-Communist Pathet Lao which controls the plain, for his views on when and how the visit should be carried out.

In a communique, the premier said it had been decided that he, members of the ICC and the Soviet and British ambassadors should go to the town of Khung Khay for another on-the-spot survey of the dispute causing the fighting between the Pathet Lao and Neutralist forces led by Gen. Kong Le.

The effect of the cable to Souphanouvong, Souvanna's half-brother was to ask his permission for the visit. The "Red prince" is on the Plain of Jars.

Informed sources said the Neutralist-held airfield and other installations on the plain came under more artillery bombardment Saturday.

Military sources also reported some skirmishing at Vang Vieng, an important town on the highway between Vientiane and Luang Prabang, the royal capital.

Reports reaching Vientiane said Pathet Lao forces were shelling the vital airfield of Phong Savan in an all-out bid to drive beleaguered, outnumbered Neutralist forces out of their last big strong hold on the Plain of Jars.

Kong Le and his forces were driven to the edge of the airfield where they were reported holding out against overwhelming odds. The bombardment closed the airfield, and the nearest Neutralist-held airport was Muong Phan, about 100 miles away.

Full control of the Plain of Jars by the Pathet Lao would open the way for pro-Communist control of all of Laos.

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Knights Of Columbus Plan Hall Dedication On Sunday

After six months of remodeling at a cost of \$12,500, the Klamath Falls Chapter of Knights of Columbus will formally dedicate its new hall with an all-day program of events on Sunday.

Located in the Evans Building, 10th and Main, the hall features a spacious lodge hall, club room, 4th degree meeting room, game room, kitchen and dining hall, business office, coatroom, and restrooms. Two other rooms, one with 350 square feet and the second with 1,000 square feet of floor space, will be leased as business offices.

Work started on the hall in November and the finishing touches are expected to be completed in two months, according to Otto Smith, Faithful Purser. One contractor was hired to supervise the extensive remodeling job, but most of the labor was provided by members to considerably decrease the expenses, he said.

Providing the most modern accommodations in the community for banquets and meetings, the hall will be open to all local

clubs and organizations on a reserved basis.

The KC dedication festivities actually began Saturday evening with a dance in the lodge hall for members, guests and the current class of candidates, who will be initiated Sunday morning.

Plans for the Sunday program include mass and group communion at 8 a.m. in the Sacred Heart Catholic Church for members and new initiates, followed by a breakfast at the Winema Hotel. The group will adjourn to the lodge hall at 11 a.m. for the initiation ceremonies.

A cocktail hour at 6 p.m. in the

club room will precede the dedication banquet at 7 p.m. The dinner, to be prepared by members, is expected to draw approximately 250 persons. Guest speaker for the evening will be Edward J. Bell of Stayton, Ore., a past state deputy and currently state secretary of the Knights of Columbus.

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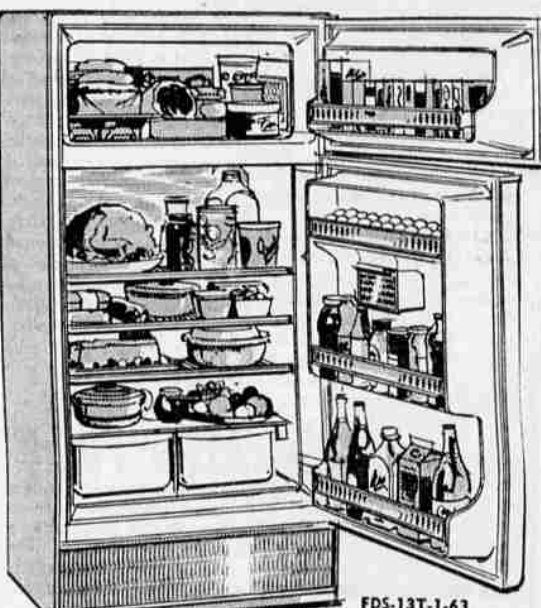
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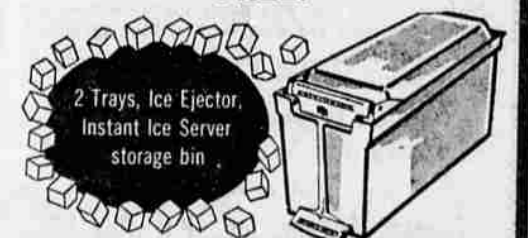
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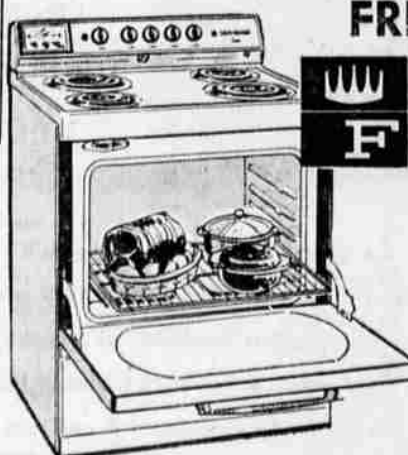
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
