

Reports Differ On Student Discipline Problem At UO

Contrasting recommendations for regulation of student conduct were distributed Tuesday to the University of Oregon faculty by the faculty's Student Discipline Committee. The recommendations will be the basis for a motion and amendments which is scheduled to be voted on by the faculty during its regular meeting May 8.

The report of the committee, which has been studying student discipline problems for a year, consists of a majority report and recommendations, a minority report and recommendations, and a third report and recommendations submitted by the committee chairman, Donald A. Watson, associate professor of finance.

The majority report calls for several basic changes in the approach to the regulation of student conduct "based on the premise that the development of responsible behavior is not effectively realized by policies which

unduly prolong dependence and maturity."

The majority report recommends that discipline be imposed when student conduct interferes with the basic purposes of the university, and describes these purposes as "the acquisition, transmission and application of knowledge and understanding together with the development of various aptitudes and skills."

The majority report states that the essence of this recommendation is that moral growth and character development are "possible outcomes rather than primary purposes of the university" and should not be included within the definition of the university's fundamental purposes.

The minority report, however, takes sharp issues with this philosophy and states that a discipline code "which assumes that moral growth and character development are consistent parts of the general goals of this univer-

sity is not only feasible but desirable."

Watson's report also contends that moral growth and character development are a desirable part of the educational process.

The majority report recommends that university disciplinary responsibilities should be distinguished from the control functions of the larger community. Explaining this recommendation, the majority report states that any action punishable under the state criminal code should not be treated as an offense which may result in university expulsion, that the university should not act as a "collection agency" for bills in the community, and that the university should not discipline students who have violated community rules in lieu of punishment by the community.

The minority report disagrees with this position, stating that university students have a dual position in society and that it is

possible for them to violate rules of both the university and the community at once.

Watson states, "I cannot agree that in all cases the university must follow a hands-off policy. It seems to me that this is one area where administrative discretion is needed."

The majority also contends that the conduct of female students should not be more restrictively controlled than that of male students, but the minority replies that "the enforcement of certain rules of conduct for women and not for men is consistent with practice and tradition in society generally."

Watson's opinion is that "the women themselves would be among the first to suffer and to complain about the dropping of the so-called 'double standard.'"

The majority urges that actions taken by the university's Office of Student Affairs be subject to

automatic review by a student-faculty committee when sanctions are imposed, but the minority does not agree with automatic reviews.

Instead the minority feels review should be limited to error in the disciplinary proceedings. Watson feels a committee cannot review all disciplinary action, although some cases could be appealed.

Establishment of a single committee to develop a code governing all phases of student conduct within the framework of their recommendations is urged by the majority. The minority agrees with this idea, but urges that it be amended to strike out the reference to making the code within the framework of the majority proposals.

Watson's report states he disagrees with some of the majority report and that the minority position is not acceptable because he feels "that referring everything back to an undirected committee" will not result in any real progress.

He recommends that a student disciplinary officer be appointed who is directly responsible to the university president, and that this officer would enforce a discipline code developed by a student-faculty committee.

Watson also recommends establishment of a student-faculty committee as an appeal body, and that as far as possible students be encouraged to formulate their own codes of behavior for living groups.

Although there may be little meteorological evidence of the arrival of spring in Klamath County and our flowers may be a little late in blooming this year, it is a foregone conclusion that the rackets that bloom in the spring will blossom right on schedule. Despite the snow, then, it would seem timely to pass along the annual warning against itinerant repairmen, pseudo gardeners and high pressure salesmen and gadgeteers. Some who do not represent reputable firms and who charge high prices for interior work and materials, take countless thousands of dollars from the unsuspecting public each year.

Among the hardy perennials to be on the lookout for are: the itinerant humus peddlers, whose "rich, black" material may be worthless or possibly even injurious to your lawn; the most pernicious of the spring pests — the itinerant roofer who "just happened to be in the neighborhood," the fag talking remodeling salesman who wants to use your home as a "model," or for "demonstration purposes;" and the floating tree "surgeon," who offers to trim or treat shade trees for a bargain price.

According to the Better Business Bureau—and the chamber heartily concurs—if you follow these precautions, you will be able to avoid the fakers.

Deal only with firms whose dependability and reliability can be established by an intelligent inquiry. Be sure the salesman represents the company he claims to represent. Don't sign papers before you understand the terms and conditions of the sale. Before you sign, be sure that the name and address of the firm is printed on the contract.

Watson's report states he disagrees with some of the majority report and that the minority position is not acceptable because he feels "that referring everything back to an undirected committee" will not result in any real progress.

He recommends that a student disciplinary officer be appointed who is directly responsible to the university president, and that this officer would enforce a discipline code developed by a student-faculty committee.

Watson also recommends establishment of a student-faculty committee as an appeal body, and that as far as possible students be encouraged to formulate their own codes of behavior for living groups.

The \$400 grant-in-aid was awarded to Lila Linhares Blandy of Sao Paulo, Brazil, to buy occupational therapy books and equipment to be used in rehabilitation work in Brazil. This equipment will be copied in Brazil for use in clinics, specifically in Porto Alegre.

RUSSIA BEHIND U.S.
